Extending the water pollution control act of 1948. This federal program will be next year unless Congress approves an extension. 2. The forest services have not been able to cope with the crowds (30,000,000) who crowded the areas for hunting, fishing and other recreation and the Tackett bill would provide 10 per cent of all receipts from timber sales for a program of wildlife and recreation development. 3. The key deer of Florida, numbering about 50, may die out unless a bill is set up to provide a refuge for the smallest deer in America. 4. A Robertson bill would make necessary the fishing and hunting regulations of the states involved on federal military reservations.
