These representatives were selected at a recent meeting of the club, when the president, Mrs. Johnson, read to members the official call to convention from the international president, Gladys Herrington of Saskatoon, Sask., Canada, inviting delegates from the United States, Canada, Mexico and Australia to attend. Theme of the convention will be "Happiness—Quota's Goal."

Delegates will meet at the hotel del Coronado in Coronado and select international officers, to work for the coming year under the international projects service to women and girls, and to the hard-of-hearing, and community work. Mrs. Herrington will preside at all business sessions.

Speaking at the opening luncheon will be Mrs. Belle Benchley, executive secretary of the San Diego Zoo, only woman in the country responsible for the direction of a zoo. There will also be an evening of ride and bus trips to San Diego and Tijuana. Newly-elected international officers and delegates will be installed following the closing banquet Saturday.

Housewife Must Watch for Stealthy Insects

Silver fish are insects that hide in linens and rayons, especially those containing starch. The silver fish prefer creases, stone buildings and damp basements. They also attack clothing. They are also found in wallpaper, bookshelves and types of clothing. They are not harmful to the body, but their haunts should be destroyed. These pests, the experts say, should be destroyed every two or three days by exposure to air detersives or powder's strength. A five per cent solution of kerosene also will kill them, but requires care because of high inflammability.
