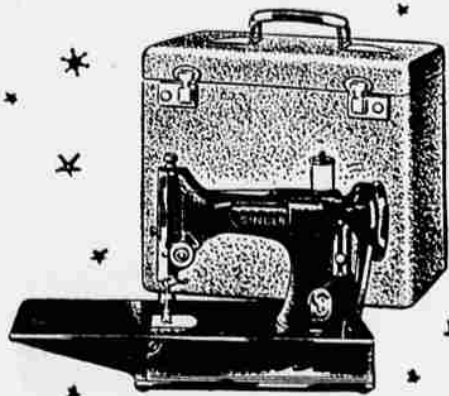
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Men's Kerchiefs Have New Fold

Men's handkerchiefs for suit breast pockets are not so difficult to fold. Styles most used now are the single fold, the casual fold and the straight across or television fold.

The single fold is made by folding the handkerchief into a square, turning the right and left corners to the center and folding in one of the resulting points. For the casual fold, the handkerchief is spread out flat and then picked up at the center. The thumb and forefinger circle it about half-way down and fold the bottom under. Just the points show when it is in the pocket.

The television fold is the newest, and is simply a small square tucked flat into the pocket. The straight line shows about a quarter-inch above the pocket rim.

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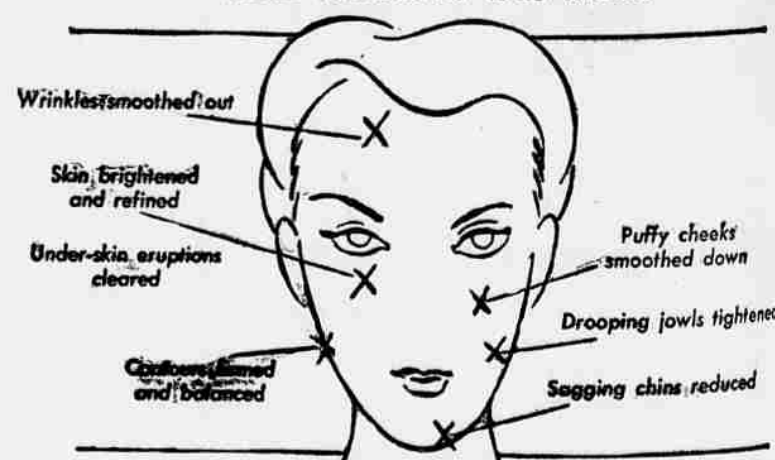
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
