WASHINGTON—(AP)—Cautious optimism stemmed Saturday night from continued negotiations between steel industry officials and Philip Murray's striking CIO steel workers.

But both sides maintained a complete silence at the end of an all-day session in the White House cabinet room.

The fact that they agreed to return for a fourth day of bargaining tomorrow at 10 a.m. (EST) appeared to indicate possible progress toward settling the six-months wage dispute and critical six-day nationwide strike.

French Navy Joins Crackdown on Reds

PARIS—(AP)—French naval authorities, trying to run down a reported Red spy plot to sabotage the nation's sea defenses, Saturday ordered raids on Communist front organizations in four big port cities.

Acting on Navy orders, police swooped down on headquarters of the Red-dominated general labor confederation in Brest, Lorient, Bordeaux, and Oran, Algeria.

Police also launched fresh raids on Communist headquarters in Paris in quest of papers to bolster the government's case against Red boss Jacques Duclos and 183 others charged with plotting against France's internal security.

Dean Little Named To Planning Body

Sidney W. Little, dean of the University School of Architecture and Allied Arts, has just been reappointed by Governor Douglas McKay to serve a four year term on the Capitol Planning Commission.

The commission was created by the state legislature three years ago and is responsible for recommending to the governor and Board of Control all items dealing with the development of the Capitol Plan in Salem. Its scope includes the location of buildings, sculpture, landscaping, development of the wall and all other pertinent items.

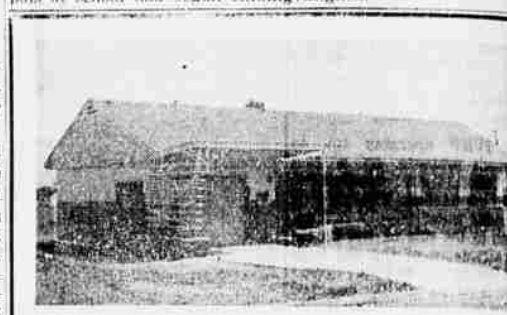
Young Cowgill was taken to Hillcrest juvenile home where he told authorities he had left home Wednesday with \$5 in his pocket, determined to find out what had become of his brother, Jack, 19, whom he had last seen last year in Downey, Calif.

The boy said that he and brother Jack were "great pals, we used to go fishing together," but he had no word from him for a long time and his mother would not tell him anything about his brother.

"I'm going to find my brother, no matter how long it takes," the little hitch-hiker said with determination.
