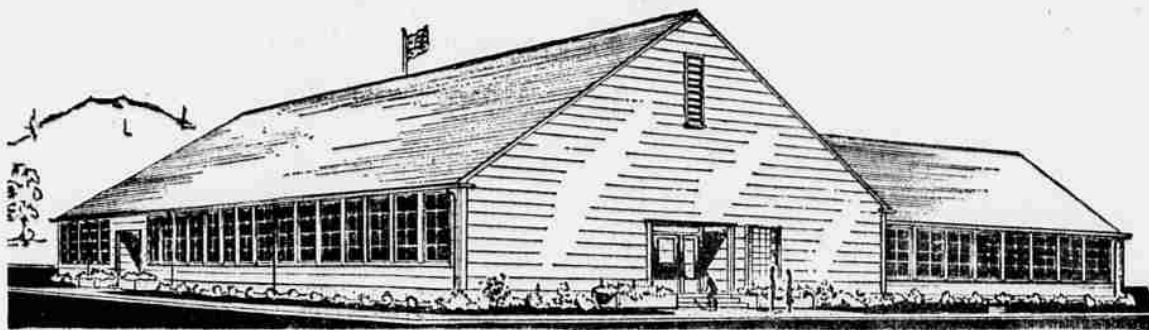


Primary Contributions Listed

Total of \$53,271.16 was spent in support of General Dwight D. Eisenhower in the Oregon primary election to secure his substantial victory. It was a near record for the state, second only to \$54,005.42 spent by Dave Hoover backers in 1950 senatorial primary.
The major contributions for Eisenhower and other presidential candidates—both Republican and Democrat during the 1952 primary election were:

Tillamook County committee, Beatrice G. Schmidt reporting, \$107.38, of which \$31.50 from sale of buttons, and the rest in contributions of under \$50, she reported. Sale of buttons in Wasco County, \$28; Sale of buttons in Klamath County, \$170.83.
Sales of buttons in all parts of the state totaled at least \$1,031.02. In addition, Jackson and Benton Counties loaned the money from sale of buttons with small contributions.

Soviet Troops Train in Asia

KUSHIRO, Japan — (AP) — Russian warships and planes are reported conducting war maneuvers off the eastern tip of Hokkaido, northernmost Japanese Island, Kyodo News Agency said Friday.
The agency said the report reached Kushiro national rural police from Nemuro, on the extreme eastern tip of the Island and only two miles from the Russian-held Kurile Islands.
The report said shell vibrations could be felt at Nosappu Point, on the tip of Nemuro Peninsula. Target craft of about 150 tons are taking part in the maneuvers, it added. Hokkaido crab fishermen are refusing to leave their ports during the maneuvers, Kyodo said.
