

Enemy Protest New Bloodshed On Kojé Island

Gen. Clark Raps
Red Propaganda

MUNSAN, Korea.—(AP)—The Korean armistice talks resumed Wednesday with the Communists protesting new bloodshed on Kojé Island and repeating old accusations that brought about a three-day walkout by the United Nations delegation.

Gen. Mark Clark, U. N. Far East commander, told the top Red commanders he fully approved the walkout which obviously caught the Reds off balance and brought a stream of protests from them.

IN A LETTER delivered to North Korean Gen. Kim Il Sung and Chinese Gen. Peng Teh-Huai, Clark wrote:

"Delegates of the United Nations command have endured for many days your maliciously false charges based on distortions and half truths presented in plenary sessions only for propaganda purposes. Their patience at all times has been commendable. The manner in which they have conducted negotiations meets with my full approval."

A staff officer handed the letter to the Reds at Panmunjom shortly before the armistice talks resumed. It replied to a written protest from the Red generals two days earlier.

MAJ. GEN. William K. Harrison, senior U. N. truce delegate, said there was no progress Wednesday on the truce-blocking issue of exchange prisoners.

"We had hoped that they would use the three-day recess to make up their minds to accept our proposal but the session today was just as though we hadn't been away," he added.

At Communist insistence, negotiators will meet again Thursday at 11 a.m. (6 a.m. Wednesday, PST).

North Korea Gen. Nam Il, top Red negotiator, opened the 37-minute meeting by protesting Allied action in moving rebellious prisoners of war on Kojé Island Tuesday. He said:

"ACCORDING to information already made public, your side slaughtered 31 and wounded 139 of our captured personnel. . . I am authorized to lodge with your side a serious protest."

"Your slaughter of our captured personnel is absolutely not to be tolerated. Your side will be held fully responsible for the serious consequences of the massacre."

Allied authorities said at least 12 of the Reds on Kojé were slain by other POWs.

Meat Packers Served Notice

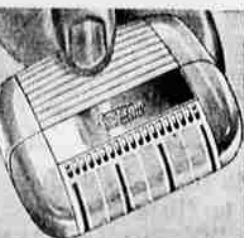
CHICAGO.—(AP)—The nation's largest meat packers have been served notice by the CIO United Packinghouse Workers that the union will terminate present wage contracts upon the expiration date, Aug. 11, the UPW said Tuesday.

A union spokesman said the UPW represents some 120,000 workers in the Big Four packers and the larger independents.

The union announced last month it would ask a guaranteed annual wage, a union shop, a pension and insurance financed by the company and a 30-cent hourly wage increase.

Top Sources Convinced Stevenson Won't Run

WASHINGTON.—(UPI)—The word is spreading here and in Illinois that Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson would refuse a Democratic draft for the presidential nomination.

No such word can be conclusive until Stevenson himself has said it. But the report is getting around and some usually well informed persons are convinced.

Stevenson has been widely regarded as fitted to hold together

on election day the essential elements of a strong Democratic combination because of his office, his political record and his geographical location. President Truman is among those who believe Stevenson could do that.

NO ONE DOUBTS Mr. Truman's genuine admiration for Stevenson. The President's effort to commit Stevenson to seek the nomination was ill-concealed. Some appraisers of politics believe that with Stevenson out of it and the possibility of Mr. Truman being tapped again would be considerably increased.

Sen. Estes Kefauver has the most delegates and Vice President Alben W. Barkley has party-wide popularity. Both would be in stronger position with Stevenson out. Kefauver has 251 convention votes and no other candidate has as many as 100. Needed to nominate, 616.

THE OTHER genuine candidates are W. Averill Harriman of New York, Sen. Richard B. Russell of Georgia and Sen. Robert S. Kerr of Oklahoma. Whether Mr. Truman believes any of them other than Stevenson could win will develop as convention business unfolds in Chicago.

Mr. Truman wants a winner. He will exert himself, it is necessary, to guide the convention toward a candidate he believes can win. Whether he would accept a

German Police Tighten Screws

Reds Shoot First,
Then Ask Questions

FRANKFURT, Germany.—(AP)—Jackbooted Communist Vopos (People's Police), apparently under orders to shoot first and ask questions later, tightened Red security screws all along the Iron Curtain in Germany from the Baltic to Bavaria Wednesday.

What was once a stream of refugees from the East Zone dwindled to a mere trickle. West German police said the whole border area seemed deserted, except for prowling patrols of the Communist Volkspolizei and their watchdogs.

BAVARIAN police said they have been notified they can claim the body of a West German farmer shot and killed Monday night by the East police.

Two West German farmers apparently had stepped briefly across the board on their way home from a church festival. The Communist police fired without warning, killing one farmer. The other was arrested.

Such shootings have increased recently as the Vopos clamped down tighter controls to stop East German youths from fleeing the threat of military conscription under the Reds. The plowed ground, fences with trip flares and the roving patrols, made flights for freedom an invitation to death.

ALONG THE border between Western Lower Saxony and Soviet Zone Saxon-Anhalt, the Reds had the situation under control and there was no sign of a refugee in the area where some managed last week to slip across to safety.

There was no figure available at present on the number of refugees who slipped across the border in the past two weeks, but authorities in Hesse said 3,000 sought safety in that state alone.

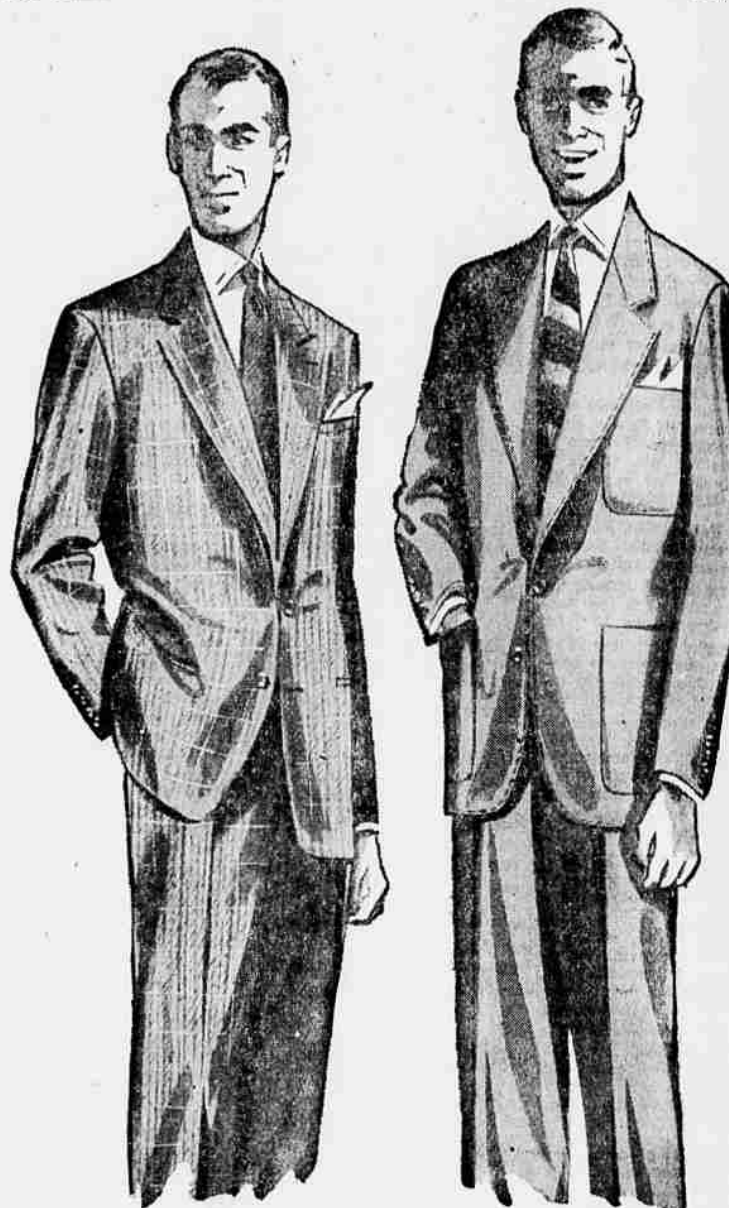
Twister Topples Trees, Shatters Windows in Virginia

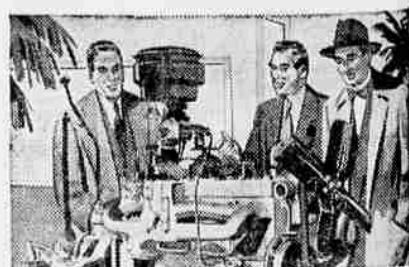

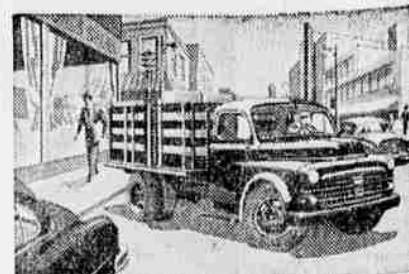
