

Occupation GI Be Executed

ate Held Guilty
Robbery, Murder

BERG, Germany—(U)—
States Army court mar-
tial sentenced Pvt. Richard A.
berger, 19, of Chula Vista,
to death Thursday for the
robbery and murder of two Ger-
man soldiers.
The court accepted the sen-
tence immediately and the
prisoner was taken to a rooming
house in an adjoining room by two
police men.
Pvt. John Vigor, 19, of
Goff's Falls, N.H., was
sentenced to death for the
robbery and murder of two Ger-
man soldiers by a court martial
in the same city.
The sentence is com-
muted to life imprisonment for
the two soldiers who were
executed. The means of
execution was not announced, but
it was carried out by hanging.
The court martial con-
sidered the defense counsel Austin
Berger, of Atlantic City, N.J.,
and a motion to save the
prisoner from the death penalty.
The U.S. Atty. William Canfield
asked that capital punishment
be exacted under German law
the court recessed to consider
the case.
Berger was charged in
connection with the April 19 slay-
ing of Lohar Schlosser, 26, and
Eckhart, 56, on a lonely
road just before dawn.

'Shoot-to-Kill' Zone Extended

Communist Boss
Issues Directive

BERLIN — (U)—The Soviet
Zone government decreed Thurs-
day an extension of its shoot-to-
kill security measures to include
the border around Berlin as well
as the frontier with West Ger-
many.

An order signed by Communist
boss Walter Ulbricht, deputy
prime minister, directed the state
security police to "extend gener-
ally" the measures begun at
first on the interzonal frontier to
"chicken the entrance of diversion-
ists, spies and terrorists in the
territory of the German Demo-
cratic Republic."

It provided sentences of at least
two years in jail for violators "un-
less they are not liable for higher
punishment under other regula-
tions."

The death penalty is already
provided for major violators of a
catch-all Communist law "for
protection of the peace."

The order came as the Western
high commission met in this
blockade-threatened city for a
discussion of the Communist
squeeze.

The commission's visit here
from Bonn was a gesture of Al-
lied support for the troubled West
Berliners, who have lived through
one Russian blockade and are
afraid the Russians may be plot-
ting another.

The West German government
did its reassuring bit, sending its
Finance Minister Fritz Scheffer
here to discuss plans for federal
economic aid to West Berlin's en-
dangered industries.

Roberto Furious About Epithets

ROME — (U)—Italian movie di-
rector Roberto Rossellini applied
Wednesday for permission to fly
to Hollywood and defend himself
against charges made against him
by Dr. Peter Lindstrom, first hus-
band of Ingrid Bergman.
U.S. consular officials said Ros-
sellini, waiting for the actress to
give birth to twins momentarily,
applied for a visa to visit the
United States.
The application "will go through
the regular channels," a consulate
source said.

Friends of Rossellini said he was
"furious" at charges made by
Lindstrom in a Hollywood Court
last week that the Italian director
is "a known drug addict" and "has
consorted with mistresses while
married to other women."
"Roberto could not let those ac-
cusations go by," one friend said.
According to his friends, only
the imminent birth had delayed
Rossellini's decision to go to Hol-
lywood.

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
