 Casey "The Prophet" Stengel leads his New York Yankees west Friday in first place—just like he said he would.  
 Stopping off in Boston on the way home from his first western swing, Stengel said:  
 "If we can win anywhere, it's at home. We should be able to go

up and grab the lead sometime in the next two weeks."  
 Stengel wasn't kidding. Once the Yankees got home they proceeded to blast away at a 12-of-15 pace, winning 10 of 11 from the western teams. Both the Yankees and Red Sox caught Cleveland—and passed them.  
 Young Tom Morgan popped up with a fine three-hit shutout in Thursday's Yankee Stadium finale, 3-0, over last-place Detroit. Detroit went home with a seven-game losing string to show for their eastern trip and nine-man deal with Boston.

**SID HUDSON**, acquired from Washington Tuesday, kept the Boston Red Sox in step with the Yankees, only 13 percentage points out of first place. Hudson needed relief help from young Ivan DeLoach in the ninth to subdue the enraged St. Louis Browns, 7-5.  
 The seething Browns played the game under protest because player-manager Marty Marion had been suspended indefinitely after Wednesday's argument with Umpire Bill McGowan.

Cleveland also clung on the Yankees' heels, only a half game back, by beating Washington, 7-4, for Bobby Feller's sixth win.  
 Chicago climbed past Washington into fourth place, only four games out, with a 10-4 verdict over Philadelphia. Chico Carrasquel's two triples and Sherm Lollar's two-run homer led the Sox's 14-hit attack.  
 In the National, St. Louis continued to mess up the league-leading Brooklyn Dodgers, 13-10, to make it three out of four for the series.

**THE LOSS** cut the Brooks' lead over idle New York to 3 1/2 games. The Giants' game at Cincinnati was rained out.  
 Chicago continued to scoot in pursuit with a 3-1 victory over the Phillies for the Cubs' 15th win in their last 19 games.  
 Lew Burdette pitched one-hit ball for eight relief innings after replacing Ernie Johnson with two runs in and nobody out in the second as Boston whipped Pittsburgh 11-2.

 Portland snapped Seattle's Pacific Coast League winning streak at 11 Thursday night.  
 The Rainiers bowled to the Beavers 2-1 and evened the series in Portland at a game apiece. Seattle could collect only six hits off Fred Sanford, three of them coming in the eighth inning when the Rainiers scored their only run. The Beavers picked up seven-inning Joe Brovia's second-inning home run—off Art Del Duca and Earl Johnson. Portland added the run needed to win in the fifth.  
 Hollywood grabbed a 2 to 1 victory over San Francisco, capitalizing on a walk, a sacrifice, an error and a force play to put over the winning tally in the seventh inning.  
 It was the tenth straight loss for the Seals, who skidded down into seventh place.  
 Another winning streak was snapped in Los Angeles, the Angels whipping Oakland, 5 to 0, after the Acorns had captured seven straight.  
 San Diego and Sacramento toiled 15 innings before the Sad Sacs won out, 6-5. The setback cut the Padres' lead back to one game. Linescores:

# Blue Devils Wallop Oregon State, 18 to 7

**OMAHA**—(AP)—Eastern teams made a clean sweep of first round games in the NCAA college "World Series" Thursday as Penn State nosed out Texas 5-3, Duke swamped Oregon State 18-7, and Holy Cross whipped Western Michigan 5-1.  
 Missouri walloped Colorado State 15-1 in the night-cap on the first round games.  
 Duke's "murderer's row" of

Outfielders Dick Johnson and Red Smith and infielders Dick Groat and Bill Werber crushed four Oregon State pitchers. Johnson smacked out a home run, two doubles and a single to pace the Blue Devils, tournament favorites, staged a rousing comeback to notch their victory over the Beavers.  
 After firing a first inning four run blast the Southerners saw their lead wiped out in the next inning when Oregon State pounded Duke's ace, Joe Lewis, for six runs on four hits, two walks and two errors.  
 Veteran Coach Jack Coombs refused to remove his pitching star and his confidence was well justified.  
 Lewis, boosting his season mark to 12-1, held the Beavers to four hits the rest of the way while he and his mates jumped all over Oregon State hurling. Lewis doubled to score three runs in the sixth to give Duke an 8-7 lead.  
 Oregon State was slated to make its comeback bid against Texas Friday.

# Hogan Trails In Open Golf

**DALLAS**—(AP)—Bespangled, balding Al Brosch, 40-year-old teaching pro from Garden City, N. J., fired a subpar 68 to take the lead in the opening round of the 52nd National Open golf championships Thursday.  
 That was one of two sub-par rounds manufactured by the field of 162 in the first day of play on the heat-blanketed Northwood Course. Ben Hogan, the defending champion and winner of three national open titles in his last three attempts, had a 69.  
 Three others fired even par 70's. They were Sam Snead, one of the three top favorites in pre-tournament reckoning; 44-year-old Horton Smith, the PGA president, and Dick Metz.  
 Another was Stan Mosel, the North Texas State College sophomore from Twin Falls, Idaho, the only amateur to crash the list of leaders.  
 Al Zimmerman of Portland, Ore., had a 78, and Bob McKendrick, Oswego, Ore., an 84.

# Thrill Circus Here Saturday

The world's greatest collection of fearless humans will gather under the banner of the International Stuntmen's Association and the Chitwood Auto Daredevils to offer more than two and a half hours of solid thrills, and every step has been taken to prepare for a recordbreaking crowd of thrill-seekers at the Fairgrounds Saturday night at 8:30 p.m.  
 In the 1952 International Open Stunt Championships, the world champion Chitwood troupe will compete with Bill Ward's Canadian Aces, Vancouver, B. C., last year's runner-up; Angel Lopez Diablos Del Timon, Mexico; Dutch Schnitzer's Circus of Death, Vienna, Austria; Lucky Walters' Hollywood stuntmen, and Aki Kimura's Dragon Drivers, Tokyo, Japan, in a score of events.  
 Included on the competition program will be broadjumping new automobiles for height and distance in an attempt to break the present world record of 88 feet four inches, held by Jole Chitwood and set in Soldiers Field, Chicago. The leap will be made each time over two or three new sedans racing underneath.  
 Crash-roll overs, four entrants trying to see how many times they can crash a car over and over in another competitive event, as is the precision driving. Points in these will decide the winner of the International Stuntmen's Association gold trophy and \$10,000 purse. The stunt meet will be sanctioned by ISA and its rules will prevail.  
 In addition to this, the Chitwood show will present such special events as the head-on crash of two stock cars while the drivers remain at the wheel and crash cars over, while Lucky Walters will top off the thrill circus by blowing himself up in a casket with 20 sticks of dynamite.

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# FISH TALES BY DICK STRITE

★ Veterans of the McKenzie River report more big fish feedings during the past week or ten days than at any time for years—a definite indication that Chris Jensen's plan is paying off. The resident biologist advocated a regulation prohibiting the "killing" of rainbow trout 14 inches or over in length, on the theory that the brood trout would provide better natural propagation than anything hatchery-planted trout could do in restoring the McKenzie to near its status of some 20 years ago.

Carl Baker, resident of the river who shares his time with his filberts, fishing, guiding, and training his new pointer, said that on a short trip earlier this week, he turned back three fish in one riffle. . . . Despite intermittent showers Tuesday, four anglers did real well on the McKenzie. . . . Tom Walker of New York City and Bob Bertsch fished with Baker and Bill Neal of Atlanta, Georgia, and the writer fished with Dick Helfrich. . . . Both groups boated seven fish, averaging between nine and 12 1/2 inches—Neal netted the largest in the riffle just above Rennie's, the very first time he had attempted to handle a dry-fly outfit. . . . Both Bertsch and the writer turned over several fish that would have gone over the 14-inch limit late that evening, in the deep curls in front of Walt Brown's cabin; the big trout were popping all over, apparently taking a small gray or blue fly. . . . Most of the fish were taken on a small caddis, goffer, blue, gray, red and coachman. . . .

It is a pretty good bet that McKenzie fishing will be spoiled during the next few weeks when airplane sprayers open their annual attack on the spruce budworms. . . . Last season, for weeks after the spraying operations, fishing on the McKenzie was terrible.

★ Jack Roche, John Warren, Harry Munsler and Bob Shisler had excellent fishing last week at Little Lava and East Lake. . . . Two-day limit catches of trout were taken at Takhenitch by Mrs. Guy Day of Drain and her son and son-in-law. . . . Dick Mundy of Fall Creek caught a 14-pound 2-ounce Chinook in the Willamette just below Lookout Point dam. . . . The fish measured 33 inches.

Barney Cable took the largest trout of the season in Gold Lake last weekend, measuring 21 inches.  
 Fishing Winchester Bay near Gardiner for striped bass, Clyde Laufer and Carl Lund both hooked and released sturgeon. They were using 45-pound test braided nylon line, using live herring as bait. . . . Laufer caught one about 4 1/2 feet in length and Lund had one that was estimated at more than 6 feet.

Virgil Poissant and family, wife and son, had good fishing at Crane Prairie last weekend. The first day they caught 15 and kept only four for the evening meal. The next day they brought home a limit, besides turning back 17. The average, taken on various spinners and lures, was about 12 inches, the largest 17 inches and about 2 1/2 pounds—rainbows and eastern brook.

★ Lack of co-operation from sportsmen's groups has prevented Al Dahlen, sports director for the Eugene park and recreation bureau, from establishing a juvenile angling area near Eugene. . . . Al was extremely enthusiastic, but with every reversal he gradually became less enthused and has now dropped efforts to establish such a program here. . . . Other sportsmen and civic groups have been thinking of establishing such areas in the McKenzie, Willamette, Cottage Grove and Florence areas—mostly stream fishing. . . . The leader in the Monterey Peninsula fishing derby not only has the inside track for the Austin A-40 four-door sedan with a 40-pound, 8-ounce Chinook salmon, but he recently won a weekly award for the smallest octopus—one-half ounce in weight.

★ The Willamette Valley Retriever Club will hold a joint meeting and picnic trial with the Portland club Sunday, with Eugene members invited. Two stakes will be run, a derby and open all-age. The event starts at 9 a.m. at the usual location—leave Highway 99 at the Jefferson overpass junction north of Albany and turn left at the gravel plant road. . . . Ducks Unlimited report a good early hatch. . . . In Manitoba, one 47-acre project shows 126 breeding pairs, a 10-acre area 95 pairs, and part of a 90-acre project indicated 175 pairs of family-conscious ducks.

Halbrook, who scored 1,035 points in 27 games last season and led his team to the state championship, said he thinks OSC Hoop Coach Slats Gill can "help him a lot."
