

Civic Unity Group Plans Work Session

Evaluation of work already done and outlines of programs for committees to follow will be discussed Thursday evening at a workshop of the Lane County Fellowship for Civic Unity. The meeting will start at 7:30 in the social room of the Congregational Church.

Edwin C. Berry, executive secretary of the Portland Urban League, and William S. Van Meter, deputy commissioner of labor for the state Fair Employment Practices Commission, both of Portland, are expected to attend and to be available for information and advice.

The program will include a short talk by Berry, showing of two movies on what has been done to combat prejudice in New York and on the nature of the problem; separate meetings of the committees with their chairmen; and reports of the committees to the general group for criticism and suggestion. Dr. Joel V. Berreman, vice president in charge of committees, will introduce the various chairmen.

The committee on education and public relations, under Mrs. Robert D. Clark, chairman, is in charge of arrangements, with the aid of the following committee chairmen: T. 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Supervised Play Programs Start Monday in Neighborhood Parks

Supervised play programs will open in Eugene's neighborhood parks Monday morning.

At 9:30 a.m., the summer's schedule of activities for youngsters — with adult attractions mixed in — will be initiated at Washington, Sladden, University and Fairmount Parks.

Through the summer, kids will be supervised and instructed five days each week at these play areas, from 9:30 'til noon each morning, Mondays through Fridays, and from 1 to 5:30 p.m.

Little tots will be gathered for story hours, finger painting, wading pool games and the like. Older kids will get baseball training, take part in ping pong tournaments, play tennis, try their hands at acrobatics and other means of releasing their summer exuberance.

At Washington Park, evening activities will be slated, too, with folk dancing for children from 7 to 8 p.m. on Wednesday and folk dancing for adults the same nights from 8 to 9 p.m. Tuesday nights will be square dance

nights on the Washington Park tennis courts.

Here, with information about class registrations, are outlines of the opening week schedules at the four parks:

WASHINGTON PARK—through this week youngsters will be registered for a series of classes and game groups, the selection ranging from tumbling and trampoline classes to arts and crafts instruction. Both adults and children interested in folk dancing should register for classes Wednesday night at the tennis courts.

UNIVERSITY PARK—Monday, 9:30 a.m. to noon, softball, croquet, horseshoes, badminton, swings, slide and coloring; 1 to 5 p.m., wading pool, story hour, organized games and checkers. Wednesday, same as Monday. Thursday, same

as Tuesday with group singing in the afternoon. Friday, same as Monday and Wednesday with running races in the afternoon.

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Eugene Firm Bids Low on Bank Work

The Eugene firm of Groesbeck and Hickson made the low offer for bank reconstruction work and channel improvement at the Hemlock and Veatch locations in the Row River in Lane County.

The Corps of Engineers Friday reported the low bid was \$28,414. The government estimate had been \$27,906. The high bid was \$38,309.

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
