## 'Luxury' Foods Decontrol Eyed

WASHINGTON — (AP)—Price of-  
ficials said Saturday they are  
considering suspending controls on  
some "luxury" items in the  
American market basket.

They made the statement after  
four large retail food organiza-  
tions called for price decontrol of  
233 food items which they said  
either are selling under ceiling  
prices, are in abundant supply or  
are unimportant to the cost of  
living.

The organization listed many  
canned and frozen vegetables and  
fruits, canned meats, dried fruits,  
fats and oils, poultry and eggs,  
dried peas and beans, peanuts,  
honey, dried milk and 169 other  
foods as "luxury" items.

Office of Price Stabilization of-  
ficials said they are considering  
suspending ceilings on some of the  
items included in the "luxury"  
list. They pointed out that OPS  
recently authorized wholesale or  
retail price hikes on a number of  
the more important items listed  
by the organizations.

## Pistol-Packing Landlady Gets 2-Year Term

CHICAGO — (AP)—The landlady  
whose apartment building was  
wrecked in the suburban Cicero  
race rioting last July went into  
court with a pistol and a demand  
"for justice" last week and got a  
two-year jail sentence for con-  
tempt.

**POLICE SAID** they had a tip  
before Mrs. Camille De Rose ar-  
rived that she had a loaded pistol  
in her briefcase and had threat-  
ened to "shoot up the judge and  
the court" unless she got justice  
in an embezzlement charge she is  
pressing.

Criminal Court Judge Wilbert  
F. Crowley first sentenced her to  
one year in jail for bringing a  
loaded weapon into court.

He doubled the penalty when  
she screamed: "Give me life. I  
want to read 'Cicero Landlady  
Gets Life for Being a Landlady.'"

**MRS. DE ROSE** denied that she  
had threatened to shoot anyone  
and said she carried the pistol for  
protection because she had been  
threatened.

Mrs. De Rose appeared as a  
key prosecution witness against  
George C. Adams, attorney indicted  
on an embezzlement charge in  
the purchase of a first mortgage  
for her on a West Side Chicago  
building a year ago. Mrs. De Rose  
claimed that after giving Adams  
the money, he failed to give her  
the mortgage, a trust deed or a  
refund.
