

## Britain Proposes Humane Spear

### Electric Harpoons Kill Without Pain

LONDON — (AP) — Britain will propose that the humane electric whaling harpoon be adopted universally at the 17-nation international whaling commission conference now in session here.

The electric harpoon, it is claimed, kills without undue pain to the whale, with less waste of whale products, and slashes the average time for shooting, killing and tying-up.

EXTENSIVE experiments have been conducted with the new harpoon by British and Norwegian interests over the past five years. A report by the General Electric Co. said satisfactory shots produced immediate paralysis. Whales surfaced with no struggle and were dead inside of three minutes.

Another item the 17 nations—which include Britain, United States, Russia, Scandinavian and Latin-American countries—will discuss is a reduction in the present quota of 16,000 blue whales caught in a season, it is believed.

The main duty of the commission, a permanent body set up in 1946, is to keep under review and, if necessary, amend regulations governing whaling conduct by contracting governments. The regulations include complete protection of certain whale species; open and closed seasons and areas for others, size limits under which whales may not be killed, time, methods and intensity of whaling, drawing up catch reports and other statistical and biological data.

ANY PROPOSALS for amending the schedule are subject to acceptance by other governments within 90 days.

If no objections are received during that period, governments are bound to accept the amendments. In the event of an objection being raised, a further 90 days has to elapse.

## Kiwanis Meets In Convention

SEATTLE — (AP) — More than 10,000 Kiwanians representing 211,000 members in the United States, Canada, Alaska, Yukon Territory and Hawaii Sunday were registered on the eve of the 37th annual convention of Kiwanis International.

Claude B. Hellmann, Kiwanis International president from Baltimore, will preside over the convention's opening session Monday morning in the Civic Auditorium.

Following a reading of messages from the Prime Minister of Canada and President Truman, Clarence Manion, dean of the University of Notre Dame's college of law, will point up the convention's theme, "Liberty—Let's Keep It," with a speech entitled "The Key to Peace."

## Canadian Youth Wins Speech Test

LEWISTON, Idaho — (AP) — Rodney K. Hostman, 17, a June graduate of the T. J. Trapp Technical High School at Westminster, B. C., Saturday night won the Knights of Pythias Pacific Northwest regional public speaking contest here.

He was judged best speaker among the seven high school students from as many states and Canadian provinces. He will compete for the national public speaking title at Springfield, Ill., Aug. 20.

The week-long Girls' State is sponsored annually by the American Legion Auxiliary.

## 5 Miners Rescued After Week's Wait

NAGANO, Japan — (AP) — Five miners trapped 125 feet underground for seven days and six hours were brought out alive Saturday.

Rescuers, almost ready to abandon their efforts, heard them shouting behind a huge boulder blocking the shaft in which they were caught by a cave-in.

They had not eaten in the entire time but otherwise were unharmed.

## Pen Escapee Back in Prison

PORTLAND — (AP) — Lee J. Marsh, 33-year-old escapee from the state prison farm, was back in custody Monday.

State police captured him Saturday near Brightwood where he said he had gone to get pickers for his 37-acre strawberry farm near Gresham.

Marsh told police he had been to Montana and back since his escape last March. He was flown there by a friend and worked until he had enough money to buy a car, he said.

Police said he drove back to his farm at Gresham and was operating it at the time of his capture. He had a little more than a year of a three-year prison sentence to serve at the time of his escape. He had been convicted of larceny in Tillamook County.

## Four Students Conquer Peak

FAIRBANKS, Alaska — (AP) — Four University of Alaska students have conquered 17,130-foot King peak for the first time.

The peak, highest unclimbed mountain in North America before the Alaskans made the ascent last week, is near the Yukon-Alaskan border.

Al Paige, leader of the four-man party, returned to Fairbanks by plane Friday. He said his party had reached the summit and planted a University of Alaska flag atop the peak.

The Alaskans beat a Seattle mountaineering party to the honor of being the first to scale King peak. Nevertheless, the Seattle men said they would continue their plans to climb the mountain by a different route this summer.

## Communist Police Put Down Revolt

BERLIN — (AP) — Five thousand Communist police have quelled a spreading revolt by East Germans against their ruthless eviction from the border security belt facing West Germany, Soviet Zone sources disclosed Sunday.

Fighting between Volkspolizei (People's Police) and desperate civilians flared in 16 border villages in the past four days. More than 30 casualties were unofficially reported. Scores were arrested.

CENTER OF the resistance to the Red security measures was the Soviet-occupied border state of Thuringia.

Biggest clash broke out between 1,000 townsfolk of Kaltennordheim and 300 police reinforcements, called out last week to stop an attempt to liberate two families of "political untrustworthies" from the town jail.

Since then police detachments

rounding up so-called untrustworthies for deportation from the security belt have been ambushed or openly attacked on repeated occasions.

Their patrol cars have been smashed and burned as entire villages have resisted.

Heavy police reinforcements have been rushed to the Thuringian border to try to restore order.

Under the Communist law for "protection of the peace" those arrested may be punished by long prison terms or even beheading for defying government security decrees.

Enraged farmers at Streudorf, Thuringia, seized axes and scythes in an attempt to beat off a police patrol trying to evict eight families and send them to a secret destination in the interior.

THREE POLICE were wounded before riot squads arrived, routed the farmers and raised the list of deportees to 20.

In some localities deportees and sympathizers locked themselves in church when the Volkspolizei appeared.

With more than 10,000 Communist police now engaged in weeding out undesirable, latest reports indicate the back of the revolt has been broken.

## Boy Tumbles 1,500 Feet

LAKE ARROWHEAD, Calif. — (AP) — A 10-year-old boy tumbled 1,500 feet down a cliff Sunday and lived.

Kenneth Wright Jr. of Compton, Calif., was hospitalized with a cerebral concussion, head cuts and possible internal injuries. Doctors said his condition is serious, and marveled that he suffered no broken bones.

U. S. Forest Ranger Joe Austin, who headed a party which brought the boy out of the Lake Arrowhead park area on a litter, said the cliff is not vertical and young Wright rolled and bounced much of the way.

Shale formations jutting from the cliffside every few hundred feet kept him from any long free falls.

## Oregon State Forester Returning to Duty

SALEM — (AP) — Col. George Spaur, who has been on military leave since October, 1950, is expected back at his desk at Oregon state forester next week, the forestry department said Saturday.

Col. Spaur now is at Desert Rock Springs, Nev., as chief of staff of an engineer regiment on duty at atomic bomb tests. During the absence of Spaur his assistant, Dwight Phipps, has been acting state forester.

## Pilots of Jets Get Gray Fast

SYDNEY, Australia — (AP) — Jet pilots may run the risk of going prematurely gray.

That's what the men who fly Royal Australian Air Force jet planes are saying after they had found some RAAF jet flyers in their early thirties were getting gray hair.

"There's nothing mysterious about high altitude flying causing gray hair in jet pilots," said Prof. F. S. Cotton of Sydney University. He said the reason was simple: "Nervous strain of high speed flight in a form of flying which is still comparatively new."

Gray hair in jet pilots may become an "occupational hazard," a Sydney hair specialist said.

However, the director-general Kingsley Norris, disagreed. "The suggestion is ludicrous," he said.

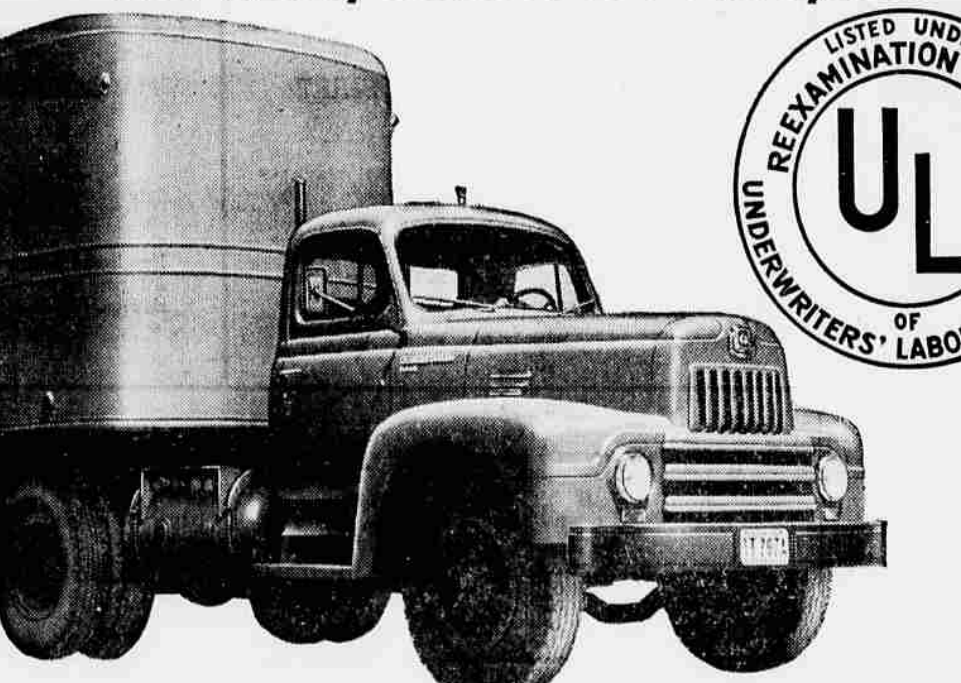
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
