

EC Contract
oes to Yale
School to Construct
Linear Accelerator
NEW HAVEN, Conn. — (AP) — President A. Whitney Griswold of Yale University today announced the signing of a contract with the Atomic Energy Commission for the construction at Yale of a new 20-mile linear accelerator and other important equipment.
The new machine is expected to produce a pulse beat of electrons with a considerably higher energy than that produced by any similar accelerator now in existence.
In announcing the contract at an annual alumni luncheon, Griswold explained that "it will inaugurate a whole new research program in the field of nuclear physics of the utmost importance to the Yale physics department and of great possible significance to the national defense program."
Yale research physicists plan to use the new linear accelerator to produce a pulsed neutron source as a means of measuring the absorption and scattering of various materials for neutrons in the high-energy range.
Such measurements are of vital importance for the design of future nuclear reactors. The machine will also be a powerful source of high-energy X-rays and neutrons for experiments on the structure of the nuclei of atoms.
Infantrymen
Smash Attack
SEOUL, Korea — (AP) — Infantrymen of the U. S. 45th Division today smashed an artillery-supplied Chinese attack on a hill position on the Western Front. The five-day old battle has cost the Reds more than 1,000 casualties.
The reinforced Americans pushed back about 750 Chinese in a bitter seven-hour scrap. The objective was the bottom of a T-shaped hill west of the town. U. S. troops held three peaks of the hill.
Fighting also continued at a stepped-up pace at other friction points on the 155-mile front. There were brisk clashes Sunday near Kumjong, Korangpo and Yonhju in the west; around Kumhwa, Kimson and the Pukhan river in the center; and near the North Bowl in the east.
U. S. Eighth Army staff officers offered no explanation of the stepped up fighting, the toughest in a year.
American Sabre jet pilots repulsed three Communist jets downed and one damaged in two days Sunday south of the Manchurian border.

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Three Assistants Get the Axe

McGranery Begins Shakeup of Legal Branch
WASHINGTON — (AP) — A broad reorganization of the government's legal branch, the Justice Department, appeared in the making Monday in the wake of three new resignations by top officials.

Out of office Saturday were exactly half of the six assistant attorneys general:
Hagold I. Baynton, 48-year-old Nevada who headed the Office of Alien Property. His unit had been under congressional attack.
H. Graham Morrison, 45, of

Johnson City, Tenn., and Bristol, Va., head of the Anti-Trust Division.
William A. Underhill, 42, of DeLand, Fla., chief of the Lands Division.
President Truman's new attorney general, James P. McGranery, announced in Philadelphia that the resignations of the three had been accepted.

McGRANERY succeeded J. Howard McGrath as head of the Justice Department at the crest of a corruption-in-government uproar that had led to the ouster of

still another assistant, T. Lamar Caudle, fired by the President himself.
The departure of the three others was less dramatic.
When McGranery took office May 27, all division heads submitted "courtesy resignations," so that the new chief might have a free hand in organizing his department.

McGranery announced Saturday, without elaboration, that three of these resignations were being accepted.
Rep. Hillings (R-Calif.), a member of the House Committee in-

vestigating the Justice Department, was among those forecasting additional top-level changes "in the very near future."

McGRANERY, at his Philadelphia news conference, was willing to say only that those leaving will be replaced by others "in complete accord with the policy of this attorney general."

He made one new appointment immediately—Rowland F. Kirk, 37-year-old dean of National University law school here, to succeed Baynton as alien property custodian.

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Local Songsters Attend Contest
