

7 County Roads Get Pavement

Estimated Cost
\$6,000 Per Mile

Lane County road crews are now improving sections of seven county roads with "O-11" treatment—a one and one-half inch thick combination of oil and gravel.

These roads are under improvement:

Crow road—From end of the present pavement to the junction with the state Territorial Road, a distance of 1.35 miles.

Coburg road—From just south of the county line for 2.75 miles. Davis Corners—Just west of the Cloverleaf Dairy for 2 of a mile. Jasper-Lowell road—For a distance of 3.8 miles.

High Pass road—From the Prairie Road to the state Territorial Road, a distance of 4 miles. Heceta Beach road—From the state highway to the beach, a distance of 2.3 miles.

Camp Creek road—For a distance of 2.9 miles.

Work is also contemplated on the Marcola road from the Juvenile Detention Home to Hayden Bridge, a distance of 1.7 miles.

Roadmaster Fred Smigley has estimated that O-11 oiling will cost approximately \$6,000 per mile this year. Oiling projects now underway will total about 18.5 miles.

Loiterer Caught At Actress' Window

HOLLYWOOD — (AP)—Howard Frederick Werner, 27, Riverside salesman, was fined \$25 in municipal court Tuesday for "loitering" outside actress Ann Sterling's apartment window.

Local Banker Named to Office

SALEM — (AP)—Godfrey C. Blohm, vice president of the U.S. National Bank of Portland, Eugene Branch, was elected president of the Oregon Bankers Assn. Tuesday.

The convention closed its two-day meeting.

Other new officers: Vice president, Clifford C. Clarkson, Portland; treasurer, Dwight E. Gard, Portland; executive committee chairman, Henry E. Shelton, Forest Grove.

Members of the executive committee, C. F. Adams, Portland; Joseph R. Delardin, Tatt; John B. Rogers, Baker; and J. L. Searcy, Hillsboro.

Rogers is the retiring president. Blohm also was elected Oregon's member of the nominating committee of the American Bankers Assn.

C. Francis Cooke, Roanoke, Va., president of the American Bankers Assn. warned the bankers to be on the alert against inflation, which he called "the second threat to the foundations of our banking system."

The first threat, he said, is government competition with the bankers.

Bethel Board Hires Six New Teachers

Six new teachers were hired by the District 52 (Bethel) school board at its Tuesday night meeting, more than balancing the three resignations which the board accepted.

One resignation was that of Marvin H. Smith, assistant superintendent of the district for the past year. Smith resigned, effective June 18, to accept an identical position with the Roseburg school district. He had been connected with the Bethel district for the past three years.

Other resignations were accepted from Velda Fennell and Marianne Wood, both second grade teachers at Clear Lake.

Hired by the board Tuesday for the coming year were:

WILLIAM JONES, as vice-principal and dean of boys at Willamette High School, where he will also teach mathematics. He will come to the district from Elmira, where he has held a similar post for three years.

Imogene Love, as physical education and homemaker instructor at Willamette High; Mrs. Elaine Berntzen, as second grade teacher at Clear Lake; M. H. Kariel, as fourth grade teacher at Irving; James Cox, as sixth grade teacher at Clear Lake; and Leslie Smith, who will teach both at Irving and in the seventh grade at the high school.

C&S Electric of Eugene was awarded a contract for bringing

lighting at Bethel School up to state standards. A survey by the state department of education showed that eight rooms of the school had substandard lighting. The C&S bid was \$1,789. Other bids were from A. E. Hamilton, \$1,823, and L. H. Morse Electric, \$1,895.

Superintendent Tom Powers announced that the district administrative offices will be open from 8:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. week days throughout the summer.

Man Confesses Mattson Kidnap

FBI Will Investigate
Fort Wayne Convict

FORT WAYNE, Ind. — (AP)—Sheriff Harold Zeis said Wednesday that a 51-year-old convict had admitted taking part in the unsolved kidnap-murder of Charles Mattson in 1935.

Zeis identified the man as Charles Edward Cramer of Fort Wayne. Cramer's criminal record dates back to 1924, Zeis said.

The sheriff would not comment further until the FBI checks Cramer's statement to determine its authenticity.

CRAMER MADE the statement Tuesday just prior to being taken to the state prison at Michigan City to begin serving a two to five-year term for robbery and parole violation. Zeis declined to speculate on whether Cramer might have made the admission in an effort to delay his transfer to the prison.

The Mattson boy was 10 years old at the time of his kidnaping the night of Dec. 27, 1935 in Tacoma, Wash. His badly beaten body was found 15 days later by a rabbit hunter near Everett, Wash.

The kidnaping and murder aroused so much indignation that the late President Franklin Roosevelt ordered an all-out investigation.

Local police were supplemented.

Federal agents entered the case in large numbers.

The victim's parents, Dr. and Mrs. W. W. Mattson, were attending a party the night of the kidnaping.

Solons Eye Radio Libel

WASHINGTON — (AP)—A bill to safeguard radio and television stations from libel suits based on broadcasts of political candidates went to a Senate-House conference Wednesday.

The legislation also would prevent the stations from charging candidates hiked-up rates.

And the House, in passing the measure by voice vote late Tuesday required that if a station sells time to one candidate it must make equal time available to his opponents.

One provision, offered by Rep. Horan (R-Wash.) specifies that stations may not censor the contents of political speeches.

The House refused by voice vote to knock out of the measure a provision which would prohibit discrimination against newspaper publishers seeking radio licenses.

A MOMENT LATER the man broke a window with a pistol butt. The children opened the door and he entered wearing a mask.

The man first demanded money of the children and when they could produce none, he grabbed Charles and fled.

During the time he was in the house, the man's mask slipped from his face, revealing a heavy beard.

The children later described him as middle-aged and stocky.

The kidnaping subsequently demanded a \$28,000 ransom. The boy's body was found a short time later. The ransom was not paid.

The FBI withheld comment on the case.

Tacoma Bakers Terminate Strike

Seattle, Portland
Strikes Continue

TACOMA — (AP)—AFL bakers Tuesday night approved a new contract providing wage increases, premium pay for Sunday work, and a health and welfare program and agreed to return to their jobs with the Sunday shift.

The first major break in the 46-day-old strike against wholesale bakeries in three Pacific Northwest cities came as union and management representatives in Seattle and Portland scheduled additional bargaining sessions. They were to meet in the two cities again Wednesday.

FRANK HOOVER, international representative of the AFL Bakery and Confectionery Workers Union, said the Tacoma agreement provides 40 cents an hour premium pay for Sunday baking; a health and welfare program costing employers \$3.40 a month for men and \$3.90 for women, and 22 cents an hour increases for wrapper, checker and janitors and 10 cents hourly for miscellaneous classifications.

Pay increases are subject to approval of the Wage Stabilization Board. The health and welfare program will be increased to \$8.66 monthly for all employees within a year.

THE UNION'S original contract demands for bakers called for Saturdays and Sundays off. Hoover said the premium pay for Sunday work clause was the first of its kind in the country and the bakers considered it of equal importance to their earlier demands.

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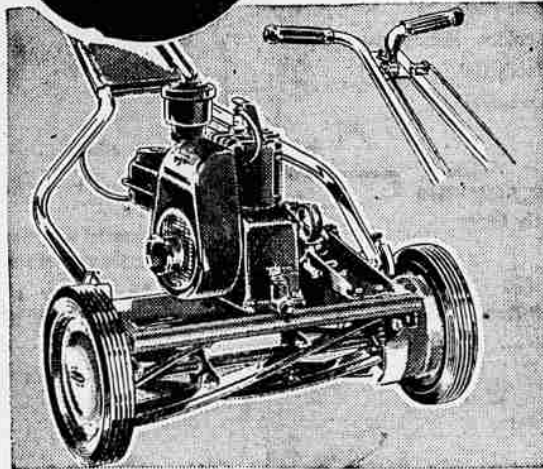
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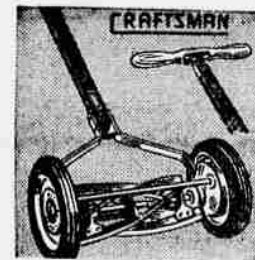
