

Hawn to Lead St. Mary's Drive

School Building Fund Sought by Church

A. LaVerne Hawn, Eugene investment banker, has been named chairman of the campaign to raise \$300,000 for the St. Mary's School building fund, according to an announcement Thursday by the Very Rev. E. J. Murnane.

Funds from the drive will be used to retire a \$100,000 parish debt and to build a \$200,000 addition to the present St. Mary's School at 11th and Lincoln.

"REPLACEMENT of the present wooden school building has been a matter of great concern to members of St. Mary's Church for many years," Hawn remarked. "The problem calls for immediate expansion of the school and retirement of the frame building because of its hazards and obsolescence."

Hawn pointed out that completion of the project, while for a Catholic school, will be a "distinct advantage" for the city of Eugene. "Few cities in the Northwest can boast of a \$350,000 institution such as we will have."

FIVE-HUNDRED volunteer parish workers are now being enlisted to carry out the campaign. Assisting Hawn in this phase are Edward J. Eberdt, Gerald Scherer, George Campbell, and J. W. Kennedy, vice-chairmen, and C. E. McLean, acting secretary. When complete, the parish organization will include 16 division chairmen, 80 captains and 400 workers. Division chairmen are Michael Burke, Dr. Thomas A. Kerns, Dale Cooley, Arnold G. Schmitz, Orlie Kingzett, Al P. Heup, Hugh Stewart, Robert W. Adair, Richard G. Bailey, Donald A. River Road Club Hears Civic Talk

RIVER ROAD — City Manager Orrin L. King spoke to members of River Road Civic Club Monday night at River Road clubhouse on the proposed ways of alleviating traffic congestion into Eugene from River Road, particularly at the Southern Pacific junction crossing at Railroad Boulevard and Van Buren Street.

HE RELATED progress of the three-way traffic survey recently completed by the joint effort of the state highway department, Lane County, and the city of Eugene. Results showed that more than 11,000 cars daily go into Eugene from the River Road secondary highway, old Hwy. 99. At the approximate point of Santa Clara, the number decreased to 4,000 cars, showing that the thickly populated area is in the River Road community proper.

Oakland Lights Get First Okay

OAKLAND — Plans for installation of about 37 new street lights were given initial approval by the Oakland City Council Wednesday night.

As outlined by R. L. Adams of California-Oregon Power Co., the street lighting project will provide 20 mercury vapor lights and about 17 incandescent lights along the highway and through the main section of town.

The Council also voted to pay Mrs. W. A. Manning, widow of the city's former chief of police, \$1,583 which had been credited to Chief Manning's account under the state retirement plan for municipal employees.

In other actions, hiring Newton Treadaway as a special police officer was approved. He will act in the place of Jack Hawn who recently resigned from his post as night officer. The Council also discussed possible widening of a curve on Park St. running east from town to the county road.

4-Year Portland College Requested

PORTLAND—(Special)—Pressure for a four-year state college in Portland was put on the State Board of Higher Education in Portland Wednesday. The board expressed sympathy with the motives of advocates of the new institution, but rejected action on what Board President Edgar Smith called "a legislative matter... a matter of budget."

THE BOARD at its June meeting heard Homer Allen, president of the Vanport Alumni Assn., who urged "immediate" creation of the four-year institution from the existing Vanport College and Portland extension center.

Allen appeared before the board to machine-gun a set of figures by which he sought to prove state schools in large cities were cheaper to operate than state schools in smaller towns.

Citing state board estimates that new educational facilities would be needed in the next 10 years, Allen said, "If we have to have new facilities, let's have them now, or we're not going to have them 10 years from now when we need them."

SMITH ASKED Chancellor Charles D. Byrne to put Allen straight on his figures. Byrne did, pointing out that cost was related less to location than to type of instruction and quality. Pointing out that the problem was "a matter of budget," Smith conceded that the board is "not unsympathetic with the logic of establishing such a school."

Approved by the board was a leave of absence of Paul M. Dunn, dean of the school of forestry at the Oregon State College. Dean Dunn will spend next year in Chile, helping establish a forestry department at the University of Chile, Santiago.

States Asked To Aid Seaway

LANSING, Mich.—(U.P.)—Governor Mennen Williams urged the states and Vermont to back a plan to build the St. Lawrence Seaway without federal funds.

"I urge you to use your influence with your congressional delegations to give the states the right to work out their own solution to their future," Williams said in a telegram to the governors.

The plan originally was proposed in Washington Wednesday after the Senate killed the Federal Bill for this session of Congress. Under Moody's plan, international states would form a compact with Canada, which it would proceed with the project independently if the U.S. failed to act.

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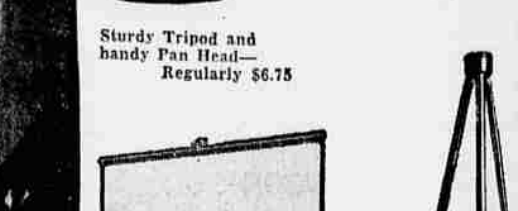
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
