Thirty two Explorer Scouts, with their leaders, will begin a week-long adventure trek down the Umpqua River to the sea in four war canoes Sunday.

The scouts will start the trip from Roseburg at 2 p.m. Wally Quam, assistant scout executive in the Oregon Trail Council, will direct the trip. Quam has led the annual outing since it was inaugurated three years ago.

Explorers, older boys in scouting, from Eugene, Springfield, Oakridge, Roseburg and Toledo will make the trek.

The unique trip will end Saturday at Reedsport. A second trek has been organized for the same number of boys from June 29 to July 5.

The dairymen concluded that antibiotics, especially penicillin, inhibit the growth of organisms used in developing cultured products.

Pilot Finishes Lonely Flight Across Ocean

OSLO, Norway.—(U.P.)—Max Conrad, 48-year-old trans-Atlantic flier, landed Thursday at Sola Airfield near Stavanger, Western Norway, to complete the last leg of his long and lonely flight across the Atlantic.

He brought his light plane in at 3:38 p.m. after a 3 hour 29 minute flight from Stornoway, Outer Hebrides, Scotland, where he stopped earlier in the day for refuelling and a meal.

Conrad said the flight to Sola from Stornoway went smoothly with excellent weather all the way.

"I am only a little stiff after sitting in the plane so long," he told the mayor of Stavanger and other officials who greeted him.

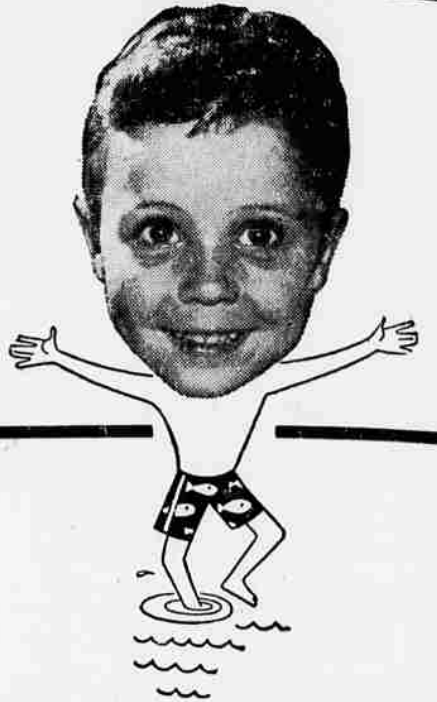
Miniature Mountains Exported by Britain

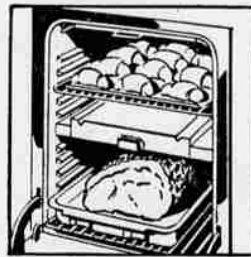

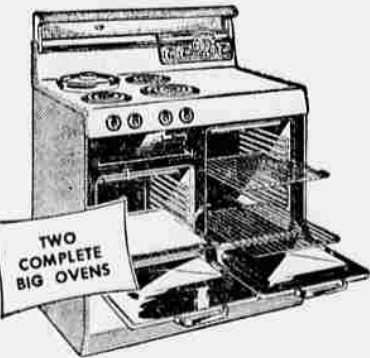
