

Classes Begin Tuesday at UO

First Week

will begin Tuesday for the Summer Session at the University of Oregon following classes on Monday, June 23. In addition to the usual eight academic effort students offered a varied program of recreational and cultural activities.

Informal president's reception and open house for summer students and faculty has been held for 8 p.m. Tuesday in student union as the first major event of the term. A dance from 8:30 to 10:30 p.m. will follow. The recreational activities will be open during the hours.

During the entire summer the University Theatre production "Rhythmia" will present the story of jazz as conceived by writer-director Marvin Hamlisch. Students will be at half price upon presentation of their season tickets received at registration. Curtain will rise at 8:15 p.m. Monday through Friday.

Dr. Abramowitz, talented pianist, returns to the campus to present a series of recitals during the course of the summer session. On Wednesday he will feature Bach, Mozart, Beethoven, and Brahms, and on Friday he will play selections from the works of Mozart, Schumann, Debussy, and Chopin. PORTLAND — (AP) — A plane that was mosquito breeding on Sauvie Island crashed today morning and was destroyed but the pilot suffered no leg fracture and cuts.

Pilot, Roy I. Darby, 38, Milwaukie, was thrown into a swamp and clambered on the over-crowded plane's fuselage and was rescued.

He was one of three pilots who were under contract for the time of the accident. The other two saw him make a crash and failed to reappear, and he helped.

Expert on Family Sees Danger In Too Much Individualism

Individualism is being overemphasized in America today according to Dr. Lester A. Kirkendall, director of the workshop on marriage and family life currently in progress at the University of Oregon.

Dr. Kirkendall, associate professor of family life at Oregon State College, stressed the importance of the interrelationships between people as contrasted with a self-compromising individualism and its lack of group consideration.

Sitting in on the first week of the workshop sessions were nearly fifty high school teachers, counselors, and administrators interested in inaugurating or improving a program of family life education. The two week program offered by the University of Oregon in co-operation with the E. C. Brown Trust will end Friday.

Dr. Kirkendall pointed out that the process of developing understanding of marriage and the family is continuous, starting in the home and continuing through school and adult life. With this in
