Truman Might Be Drafted

WASHINGTON — (U.P.) — The conditions making for a draft-Truman movement at the Democratic National Convention are developing smoothly from day to day.

A draft movement, real or phoney, comes only when there is no stand-out alternative candidate upon whom the party faithful can agree. There are some indications that such a situation is beginning to come about now among the Democrats.

Key man in a baffling situation is Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois. If Stevenson would drop a public hint that he would accept the nomination against any champion the Republicans may put up, the governor's band wagon shortly would be noisily overflowing, and apparently with Mr. Truman's approval.

If Stevenson balked at Chicago, the Democrats would be faced with a confusing variety of choices. Only Sen. Estes Kefauver among them has established any claim to a national following. Mr. Truman is cold to Kefauver's candidacy, powerful organization fig-

ures are against him and the White House gang, itself, has thumbs down.

No doubt of Mr. Truman's feelings toward Kefauver could survive Thursday's news conference when the President called the senator's presidential primary defeat here by W. Averell Harriman an endorsement of the administration's program.

After Kefauver comes a parade of sectional or favorite son candidates, Barring only Vice President Alben W. Barkley, they can claim

no more than good political connections in their own geographical areas. Barkley's great handicap is his 74 years.

Disease Hits Pig Production

CHICAGO — (U.P.) — A once rare disease is expected to cause heavy losses in the nation's pig production this season, officials of the American Veterinary Medical Association said.

The disease, which usually appears in baby pigs, has become so widespread it is now one of the most serious swine problems in the United States. AVMA officials said the disease, called infectious rhinitis, is taking a place with such problems as cholera, erysipelas and transmissible gastroenteritis.

Few animals are killed outright but rhinitis can stop gains to the point where hog raising is no longer profitable.

Unlike the non-contagious bull nose, which is frequently confused with rhinitis because of sneezing and pushed-in noses of the pigs, rhinitis is extremely infectious.

Association authorities said careful selection of breeding stock and feeder pigs from clean herds will keep rhinitis off the premises.

N. Delegates Have Reds Speechless

SEO, (Sunday) — (U.P.) — Allied negotiators agreed to the Communists in Panmunjom today to see if the Red delegates could explain away their "stand on the prisoner issue."

Allied negotiators left the Communists speechless with surprise Saturday by reminding the delegation that Soviet Russia the principle of voluntary repatriation of war prisoners during the last war.

Communists have violently repatriated as "voluntary" and a violation of the Convention to which they subscribed. Maj. Gen. William Harrison, senior U.N. negotiator, said his statement so shocked the Communists that Lt. Gen. Nam Il, the senior Communist negotiator, looked around in surprise. For once he was speechless and refused an Allied request for an "indefinite suspension" of talks until the Communists their propaganda tirades.

Truce talk will be a year at week, with the two sides only deadlocked on the issue of war exchange. There was no immediate reaction offer by Indian Premier Jawahar Nehru to help mediate a deadlock.

He said India was suitable for mediation because she is friendly with all countries involved, but he told newspapermen he said India would go all out to find some solution, that is as anybody can say. 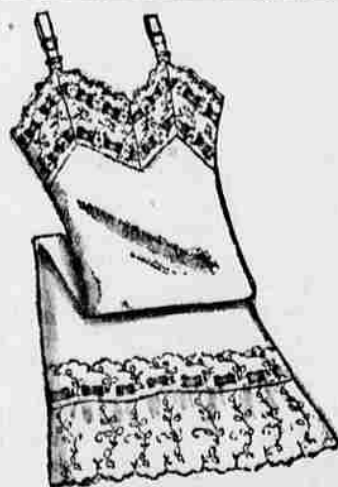
