

PI Dependent On Foreigners

Psychiatrist Tells
Rotarians of Trip

Eugene Rotarians Tuesday learned more about the Philippines. Speaker was a California psychiatrist who recently returned from the Islands, where he had been commissioned to set up recreational activities for children.

Dr. Herbert B. Chamberlain, who was in town to talk to a convention of elementary school principals, told Rotarians about the "great strides" the Islanders had taken toward independence in five years.

THEIR STRUGGLE for independence is made more difficult, he said, because of their dependence on foreign cultures and foreign economies. Their economy is pegged to American economy, their clergy comes from America and Europe, much of their manufactured consumer goods comes from Japan, and their merchants are largely Chinese, he pointed out.

The recent American practice of giving great civilian responsibilities to persons who formerly held high rank in the armed forces was blamed by the speaker for the Islanders' attitude that Americans are militaristic. This is compounded, he lamented, by the Filipino's natural respect for rank and authority.

MOREOVER, he said, Filipinos are likely to be confused by American emphasis on "efficiency" and "durability of goods," both concepts foreign to them.

It is strange, he said, that the American is the most immunized, vaccinated person in the world when he sets off on an overseas trip. Then he spends all his time overseas in constant fear that he may catch the itch.

most of us on the hill want zoning, but we want to understand better the problems involved." The meeting then centered on zoning proposals for the Goshen and Bloomberg Lane areas.

Most of the people registered strong opposition to zoning. When Buford asked how many felt some type of zoning was needed, no hands were raised. All hands went up when he asked if there were objections.

HERE ARE SOME random comments concerning zoning opposition:

"Most of the people are against zoning along Bloomberg Lane."

"We don't feel it is proper for outside sources to come in and tell us how to regulate the property we bought with our own money."

"Why didn't you go all the way down to Creswell with zoning?"

"There should be a meeting at Goshen and take a vote. Let the majority rule."

What if someone were appointed to the commission who is against zoning? How long would he last?

After more than an hour of discussion, the commission voted to postpone any action. Buford indicated he will be glad to attend a public meeting at the Goshen grange to explain the problem and answer questions.

Several Goshen people said arrangements will be made for the meeting.

Alcoholism Could Happen to Anybody

Alcohol-Allied Problems Studied at Special School

The things that happen to people who use too much alcohol, and what schools can do to teach children the truth about liquor, occupied the time of 40 persons attending the Oregon School of Alcohol Studies on the University of Oregon campus Monday.

Speakers were Ralph Henderson and Raymond G. McCarthy, both of Yale University, and Dr. John R. Montague, medical director of the Raleigh Hills Sanatorium, Portland.

DR. MONTAGUE lectured on physical diseases associated with alcoholism. Most of them, he pointed out, are caused not directly by the alcohol, but by dietary deficiencies caused in the alcoholic who would "rather drink than eat."

Most common of the diseases, he said, is cirrhosis of the liver, which is five times more common in alcoholics than in non-alcoholics. He mentioned others, too, such as Pellagra, beri-beri, and a rare one known as Wernicke's Encephalopathy.

In addition, he said, there are mental disorders such as delirium tremens, Korsakoff's psychosis, pathological intoxication, and acute alcoholic hallucinations.

The doctor explained these are diseases to which the alcoholic is

subject. He said there was little danger they would afflict the casual drinker, or the daily martini-before-dinner man.

DOCTORS AND medical schools, he observed, are becoming more interested in the alcoholic. They are getting away from the old idea that all alcoholics are bums.

Dr. Montague, medical director at a sanatorium which treats alcoholics, confessed that, when he began the work, "I was surprised to find what nice people I was dealing with."

"It can," he said, "happen to anybody."

McCarthy, executive director of the Yale Plan Clinic for Alcohol Study, reviewed state laws requiring alcohol education in public schools, and lamented too many of them call for education "based on fear."

TEACHERS, he pointed out, have to tell horror stories about people whose brains have rotted away because of alcohol. But, he observed, it doesn't take a very

smart high school senior to look around him and note that 60 per cent of the adult population drinks, apparently without harmful effects.

He called for more honest teaching of facts about alcohol, freed from prejudice and old wives tales. "Negative teaching," he said, "is not necessarily good teaching, especially at higher levels."

He urged dealing with the "whole question" of use of alcohol, not just with the horrible diseases associated with acute alcoholics.

TOO OFTEN, he lamented, the problem is exaggerated in schools beyond its real importance. He suggested the problem be treated "in the general framework of emerging adulthood."

"Uninhibited discussion" of social drinking, he said, should be undertaken at the high school level in an effort to remove the "halo" from social drinking.

Not much can be taught in the elementary grades, he said, except general education for good health and diet habits.

Advice Given Vacationers

A few words of advice for vacationers came Tuesday from Eugene and Springfield police chiefs.

Empty houses are easy prey for vandals and burglars, they explained, but a few precautionary moves can insure a happy end to a happy vacation.

Newspapers and milk deliveries should be cancelled to keep from marking an empty house. All windows and doors should be locked. If necessary, nail a lockless window shut.

Then call the police department. A prowler check will be made several times a night by patrolmen.

Joy Lee Duggins, reunion chairman, asks that those plan to attend notify her by calling 7-2290.

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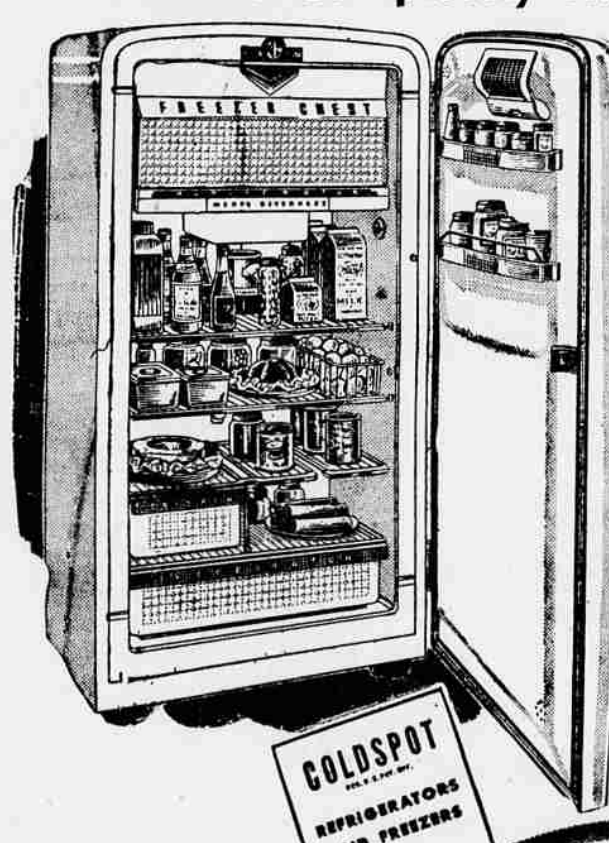
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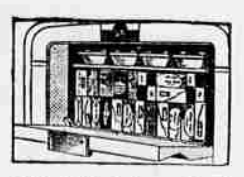
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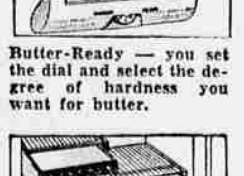
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
