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Seed Markets Continue Slow

Warehouses Report Buyers Lack Interest

Movement of seed from Oregon warehouses to consuming areas was below normal the past week, according to the weekly Seed and Specialty Crops Review prepared by the OSC Extension Service.

Growers' sales were also slow because dealers were either out of the market or growers were reluctant to sell at present offers. Most prices were unchanged from the previous week.

Common ryegrass seed continued to move from growers' hands at 6 1/2 cents a pound. The volume of sales by growers was not up to normal for this time of year. Dealers' sales to the consuming areas were also below normal volume.

Several dealers were reportedly out of the perennial ryegrass seed market during the week ending Aug. 18. While offers as low as 9 cents were reported, the few actual sales that were made were at 9 1/2 cents a pound.

No actual hairy vetch sales by growers were reported last week but offers ranged from 13 to 13 1/2 cents a pound. Growers' sales of common vetch were made during the week at 5 to 5 1/2 cents a pound. These prices are lower than a week ago.

Sales of blue tag alta fescue were very slow throughout Oregon last week. What sales were made by growers were within a range of 25 to 27 cents.

Dealers were either out of the market for chewings fescue seed or were offering prices ranging from 45 to 48 cents a pound during the week ending Aug. 18. No sales were reported at these quoted prices. These offers are unchanged from the close of the previous week.

Austrian peas were selling last week mostly on a feed basis. Offers ranged from \$50 to \$60 a ton, machine run, depending upon the amount of dirt content. Most sales were at \$55. Sales of Austrian peas on a cleaned basis ranged from \$3.15 to \$3.50 a hundred pounds. Most sales were at the \$3.25 level. Most of the sales were on a ton basis for machine run peas.

Filbert Surplus Set by Board

The Filbert Control Board has recommended that the salable percentage for this year's filbert crop be established by the Secretary of Agriculture at 66 per cent and the surplus percentage at 34 per cent.

The board estimated that these percentages will result in a 10 to 15 per cent larger offering of unshelled filberts than domestic outlets have taken in recent years.

A minority of the board favored still larger offerings in-shell at a meeting in Portland last Friday. However, the majority expressed concern that larger offerings would break the in-shell market and reduce returns to growers.

Salable percentages can be increased later, if warranted by trade demand. The recommendation is subject to review and modification by the secretary of agriculture.
