**Men Study  
Fuel Charges**

WASHINGTON (AP)—Oil companies pored over a still-unclear report on inland oil cartels Thursday morning if they want to file charges publicly.

The report, prepared by the Interstate Commerce Commission, is due to be made public by the Senate Commerce Committee next week.

In an unprecedented action, the Chairman John L. Rankin offered company attorneys an opportunity for an adjournment at the 300-page document which was a closely guarded secret until its publication was ordered recently by President Truman for one company.

The Oil of California, took up on the offer immediately. They picked up galley after galley of the report Wednesday, taking an oath to keep it secret from company officials who must determine whether to ask a hearing on the matter.
