

Triolo Cites Need For TB Legislation

FLORENCE—“There is need for some sort of compulsory legislation for committing patients found with positive sputum and active tuberculosis for hospitalization and enforcing their stay,” said Dr. A. Triolo, Lane County public health doctor, in addressing members of Western Lane Tuberculosis and Health Assn., at their annual dinner meeting here recently. California and Washington already have such legislation, he revealed.

Lane Pioneer Families Picnic

Champ Grabs Soaring Lead

GRAND PRAIRIE, Tex. (AP)—Richard Johnson, defending champion from Starkville, Miss., took over the lead Thursday in the National soaring contest with a total of 710 points.

Johnson sailed into the lead after a 373-mile flight yesterday to Pittsburgh, Kan. That combined with a 290-mile goal flight to Lubbock, Tex., the previous day to put him out in front in single place plane competition.

Second place currently is held by Bill Evans, San Diego, Calif., with 680 points on strength of a flight to Arkansas City, Kan., 297 miles distant. Bill Coverdale, Chattanooga, Tenn., is in third with 670 points after cloud hopping his way to Ponca City, Okla., a distance of 278 miles.

Kashmir Plans To Elect Chief

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Kashmir is ditching its hereditary maharajahs for an elected chief of state to govern the disputed North Indian land.

The Indian radio announced Thursday that Kashmir's Constituent Assembly had unanimously adopted a resolution ending hereditary rule by the family of its maharajah, Sir Hari Singh.

The maharajah's son, 21-year-old Yuvraj Karan Singh, is considered the leading prospect for Kashmir's first chief of state. Yuvraj, however, appears reluctant to step in and the maharajah, now living in Bombay, opposes his son assuming the post.

The maharajah, a Hindu, acceded the predominantly Moslem state to India after the 1947 partition of the sub-continent which created India and Pakistan. Irregular border fighting developed and Indian and Pakistani forces each seized parts of the state.

A U.N.-sponsored truce was established but the dispute still is pending in the international organization.

Treasure Hunt For Bandit Loot

WILBURTON, Okla. (AP)—A miniature treasure hunt for robbers' gold was launched here Thursday after a couple found 99 old gold wedding rings while seining for minnows in a creek in Robbers Cave State Park.

Dave Bloxham said he and his wife first spotted a ring in the shallow water Wednesday and after digging around in the creek bed turned up 89 more. They returned Thursday and found nine more gold rings.

The Bloxhams took the rings to a jeweler, who gave them \$160 for the old gold.

The Robbers Cave area was the hideout of Belle Starr and a gang of notorious train bandits in pre-statehood days. Many oldtimers believe much of the robbers' loot still is buried in the rough, mountainous area.

Four Children Saved From Burning Trailer

ASHLAND (AP)—Four children were rescued unhurt by their parents from a burning trailer here Wednesday night.

The fire started from a candle used by Dr. and Mrs. Ralph Morris of Santa Barbara, Calif., for light while they connected an electric line to the trailer.

The trailer was destroyed with all its contents including clothing and money.

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Druggist Must Get Reds' Okay to Take an Aspirin

HONG KONG (AP)—A Chinese drug store owner who reached Hong Kong from Shanghai said Friday his store was so firmly in the hands of Communist workers “I had to ask permission to take an aspirin.”

The pharmacist is Carl Chang who attended the University of Wisconsin and Massachusetts Institute of Technology in the 1940s. He owned one of the largest dispensaries on Shanghai's famous Avenue Joffre.

ABANDONS HOME

He said he got out of the Red-controlled city on the pretext of going to Hong Kong to buy more supplies. Even so it took several weeks to receive an exit permit.

Once here Chang said he has abandoned his home and business and wants no more of communism.

He said his nine workers discovered that by allying themselves with a district unit of the Communist party, they could get control of Chang's drug business after a year. The owner said that while his store was making money, he was permitted to take only minimum wages, although he was forced to continue as operator and manager and take all responsibility.

REDS GET PROFITS

He said the profits did not go to the workers. They went to the Communist Party either through forced donations, fines or taxes.

Chang said he continued on his job, hoping for a turn for the better until a government campaign early this year against private owners. After that he said he decided there was no use and got out of China as quickly as he could.

Diplomats Told Korean Truce Terms Will Not Be Weakened

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Truman has assured diplomatic officials the United States will not weaken its Korean truce terms in order to gain a peace settlement before the November election, it was learned Thursday.

Authoritative sources said Mr. Truman privately communicated the promise to key officials some time ago, in order to lay at rest any fears that political pressures might induce the Democratic administration to “buy” an armistice.
