

Mary Clears Retired General

Quality Question Checked Politicking

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Army retired general, who said he was running for Congress because of questions about his loyalty, has been cleared of any suspicion of disloyalty.

He is retired Brig. Gen. L. Thorpe, one-time counterintelligence chief in the South Pacific and in Japan.

Thorpe, R. I., Thursday said he had withdrawn as a candidate for the House of Representatives because of questions about his loyalty.

He was the Army adjutant general, when queried, said he has been forwarded to the War Relocation Authority.

Army spokesman said investigation of Thorpe's state was distorted. There was no question of why the investigation took so long.

Expert Claims Eagles Can't Carry Lambs

PORTLAND (AP)—A federal biologist said here Thursday that a lot of talk about eagles isn't so. They aren't comparable to flying boxcars, for instance.

The biologist, Ralph H. Imler, who is regarded in the regional office of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service here where he works, as a top-flight eagle man, said it's this way:

"There is no evidence to show an eagle can fly off with anything that weighs more than it does. And most eagles weigh 9 to 10 pounds with a few Bald eagles getting up to around 13 pounds. Yet there are recurrent stories of eagles flying off with a lamb weighing anywhere from 30 to 40 pounds.

"Wholly impossible," said Imler, who has studied that particular subject all the way from Colorado to Alaska.

"Eagles have been observed carrying a full-grown jackrabbit weighing six to seven pounds. The flight was labored because the load was heavy," he said. "There is no actual record of an eagle carrying as much as 15 pounds. Ten pounds is near the absolute limit."

Imler said he was moved to comment because of a recent Associated Press story from Chehalis telling of Golden eagles killing lambs and flying off with those weighing 35 to 40 pounds.

Imler said that in the first place he would be more inclined to believe the eagles at Chehalis are Bald eagles—the national bird—rather than Golden. There are some Golden eagles around, but not as many as there are Bald eagles, he said.

Miners Serve Formal Notice

WASHINGTON (AP)—Government officials said Friday that John L. Lewis has given formal notice that his contracts with the coal industry will expire at the end of September. This set up the possibility of a nationwide coal strike at that time.

The Taft-Hartley labor act requires that the government be informed of a labor dispute at least 30 days before the work contract expires.

Lewis, president of the United Mine Workers Union, gave federal mediators the required notice that contractors with both the soft and hard coal industry will run out then, these officials said.

NO COMMENT

This could—as it has done before—precede a strike providing no agreement on a new contract is reached by the end of September.

The notice was signed by the union's general counsel, Welly Hopkins.

UMW headquarters here said it had no comment on the matter.

Lewis has been negotiating off and on since July 24 with Marry M. Moses, president of the Bituminous Coal Operators Assn., and Joseph E. Moody, president of the Southern Coal Producers Assn.

60 DAYS NOTICE

Sixty days notice is required before the expiring contracts between the UMW and the industry can be ended.

Lewis gave his 60-day notice to Moses, who bargains for 240 million tons of coal a year, on July 22. That means he could legally take his northern soft coal diggers out of the pits about Sept. 22.

His contract expiration notices to Moody and the anthracite industry were given on Aug. 1.

Thus Lewis' hard-coal miners and southern diggers could not legally strike for a new work contract until the end of next month.

Work Resumes At Atomic Plant

PADUCAH, Ky. (AP)—Construction work on the billion-dollar atomic energy project near here was expected to be back to normal this week after 10 days of labor troubles caused by two wildcat strikes.

Steps were taken by 19 AFL crafts and officials of F. H. McGraw Co., chief contractor on the vital defense project, to prohibit future wildcat strikes President Truman's atomic labor relations panel reported.

The strike was ended at noon Wednesday when the AFL Carpenters and Millwrights removed pickets they had posted last Friday.

AFL Pipefitters had just ended a four-day wildcat strike when the carpenters and millwrights set up pickets.

The labor relations panel reported that representatives of 19 crafts and McGraw Co. agreed that in the future any men staging a wildcat strike would be disciplined or fired either by the union or company.

Cafe Robber Gets Probation

A Eugene father who told Judge William G. East he couldn't explain why he robbed a cafe was put on probation for two years Friday morning. Judge East told John Alvin Owings, 29, that he would give him a chance to be a law-abiding citizen if he'd agree to stay out of trouble and support his family.

Owings pleaded guilty to entering the Lunch Club Cafe, 500 Garfield, in the middle of the day, July 4, and stealing \$4 in nickels and pennies, a bag of candy bars, a gallon of ice cream, and some cigarettes. Herman Hendershott was his attorney in court Friday.

Margaret Terms Charges 'Silly'

Says Guard Fracas Misunderstanding

HELSINKI, Finland (AP)—"I believe it must all have been a simple misunderstanding."

That was Margaret Truman's statement at a news conference Thursday over the ruckus kicked up by Swedish newspapers over alleged "tough guy" tactics used in Stockholm by her bodyguards.

The President's daughter had other descriptions, too, such as "much ado about nothing," and "It was really silly" about accounts in Stockholm newspapers such as the one published by Expressen, which said the bodyguards—members of the U. S. Secret Service—flung aside a photographer who tried to take Miss Truman's picture at Stockholm's central station.

LAW REQUIRES GUARD

Miss Truman stressed that she had been supplied with a bodyguard not on her own wish but because a U. S. law stipulates that members of the President's family must always be protected by such guard.

She said that no member of her entourage had ever forbidden pictures being taken of her.

Back home, Margaret's father defended the Secret Service men in reply to a news conference question of whether he would send new instructions telling them how to conduct themselves.

That is not necessary, Truman replied tersely. He added that Secret Service men need no instructions, that they are always right.

COMMENT "BARBED"

He gave a no comment reply to requests for a statement on the Swedish incident. He did say that he had read reports of the affair as they came to him.

Miss Truman arrived here Thursday on her European tour. Photographers snapped as many pictures as they wanted while her three-man bodyguard remained discreetly in the background. She plans a two-day stay in Finland.

Aftonbladet, Sweden's biggest newspaper, called the Secret Service men "gorillas."

It said they were uncouth and intercepted Swedes who wanted to pass 'any place where it pleases Miss Truman to be at a given moment."

Then Aftonbladet flung a barb: "Miss Truman is not in danger of her life in Stockholm... we understand that she is not going to sing here."
