Teachers' Workshop Begins on Sept. 2

COBURG — The Coburg Schools open Monday, Sept. 8. The date was set at a recent session of the school board. All school activities will be on standard time.

The Teachers' pre-school workshop begins Tuesday, Sept. 2. Miss Emma Henkle, Professor of Education at Monmouth College of Education at Monmouth, will lead the teachers in a study of the use of Phonetics at various grade levels in the teaching of reading and spelling. REGISTRATION FRIDAY

High school begins at 8:45 a.m. Standard Time, the upper grades of the grade school 8:45 a.m., and the lower grades 9 a.m. Pupils will need to bring lunches as the school lunch program will not be in operation for a time.

PHYSICALS REQUIRED

Parents are reminded that state law requires all first and ninth graders and all pupils new to this state to have a physical examination before entering school. Physical exam blanks may be secured at most doctor's offices or at the County School Superintendent's office in Eugene.
