Lamblike Terriers Are English Breed

"Cory of Rowen Oaks," Bedlington Terrier of Mrs. Christine Knutson, recently was described as one of the best dogs of this lamblike breed in the west in a national dog magazine. She has not been shown this year at any of the dog shows, but expects to be on hand at the Eugene Show Sept. 1 (Labor Day) at the Fairgrounds.

Although Bedlingtons are not as well known as some dogs, they are not a new breed. Their ancestry can be traced back to 1782 to Bedlington, England, where they appear to have originated. They are hardy as hunting dogs, and they are the speediest of all terriers. The Bedlington can catch a rabbit on the run. Their mouths are so sensitive that they can be trained to carry an egg without cracking it.

The breed has a peaceful nature, but if provoked by another dog will come out on top in most cases. They are gentle family-loving dogs that prefer the complete family to any one person. They never shed and they don't smell doggy.

Local Bowmen Start Practice For Sept. Hunt

Cascadian Bowmen will have an annual shoot Sunday in Hendricks Park starting about 1 p.m. Twenty-eight animals (pictures of animals) are scattered through the woods above the park and will serve as targets for the bowmen. The Pope Young State Shoot is scheduled for Labor Day weekend at Roseburg. This event, a broad head shoot, includes the use of hunting arrows, of which most local ones are made of compressed Port Orford cedar.

Sept. 13 opens the archery season. This means that in certain areas throughout the state, anyone proficient with a bow has first chance at deer before the gun variety of hunters are permitted to bag the antlered animal. In addition, no sex or age limit of the deer is imposed on bow and arrow hunters.

Certain areas are open to archers, like those of the Tillamook Burn and Canyon Creek, just out of Canyon City. This year the Hart Mountain area, which is an antelope range but also has deer, will welcome the hunters. The Cow Creek region in Douglas county and the Clatskanie region in Columbia county, along with the Mount Emily area to the north-east in Union and Umatilla counties, also are to be open.

A bow and arrow hunter needs a special permit that doesn't cost extra, but is issued only after he has a regular hunting license. For elk, he needs a special tag.

If those who stalk the forests with feathered shafts do not down an animal during archery season, they may re-enter the field with a gun when the regular hunting season starts. Although some are proficient with both weapons, most people who show any preference for the longbow have forsaken the gun, according to Dr. J. E. Richmond.

Dr. Richmond, who is a member of the Cascadian Bowmen, plans to do his hunting in the Canyon Creek area this year. He also is proud that his grandson, Kenny Richmond, 10, like other youngsters of quiver and shaft addicts is becoming adept at drawing a bow with arrow and bow.

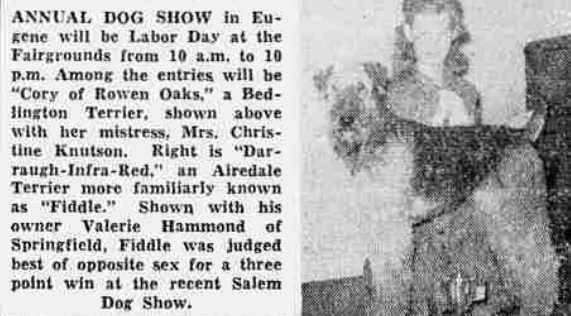

Politics Make Life Hectic For Mamie

DENVER (U.P.)—Mamie Eisenhower has assumed such a heavy schedule of campaign chores that she confessed today, "All I can think of is politics. I don't have time for 'small talk' now."

Mrs. Eisenhower, in an exclusive interview, said she has been working 10 and sometimes 12 hours a day since her husband, Dwight D. Eisenhower, received the Republican presidential nomination and she expects to keep up that pace through November.

Her biggest job is answering mail which pours in at the rate of some 100 letters daily. For this chore she has the help of a personal secretary, Mrs. Mary Jean McCaffrey of Washington, who was formerly chief secretary in Eisenhower's offices here.

Personal appearances, not speeches, have taken up a large part of her time. Mrs. Eisenhower said it is not uncommon for her to change clothes five times in one day.

"You just seem to naturally reassemble your life," Mrs. Eisenhower said when asked if it was difficult to step from the role of a general's wife into the political field, "I find the biggest difference is the fact that I must be available at all times."

Mrs. Eisenhower became very solemn when asked about her son, Maj. John Eisenhower, who was shipped to Korea last month.

"He has written me not to worry, but how could I do otherwise," she asked. "I feel just like any mother would."

The petite Mrs. Eisenhower said that much of her mail comes from other women who have sons in Korea.

"They write that they mention John in their prayers when they pray for their own sons."

Mrs. Eisenhower remained in Denver Wednesday, meeting appointments in the Eisenhower's smart, air-conditioned suite in the Brown Palace Hotel, while the general flew to Boise for a strategy conference with nine western governors.

She will pack about 11 bags Sunday and return to her home on the University of Columbus campus for the last two weeks of peace and rest she is likely to know until after the November elections.

She will accompany Eisenhower when he addresses the American Legion convention in New York City next Monday and after that she plans to spend several days "doing what every other woman does this time of year."

"I must store my summer clothes and get a fall wardrobe ready for the campaign tour."

She will not make the swing through the south with Eisenhower or scheduled for later next week, but said she "would be ready to go" when the campaign train takes off, probably about the middle of September.
