Singer Suspended

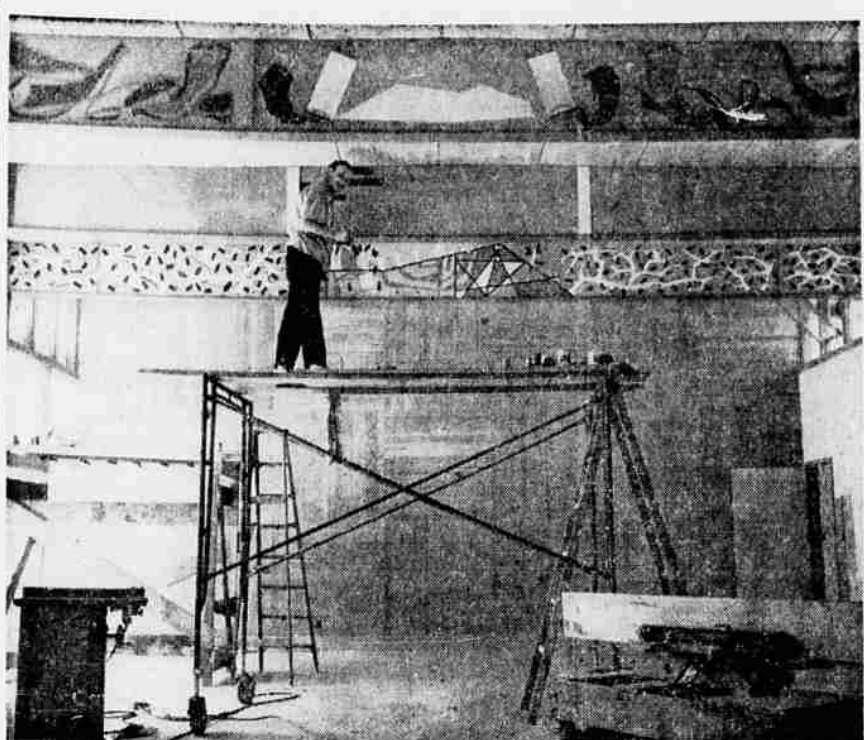

THE BROAD BEAMS which support the roof in the new Beth Israel Jewish Synagogue at 25th Avenue and Portland Street, are being painted in soft colors with original abstract designs symbolizing various objects associated with the Jewish faith. Artist is the building's designer, Heinrich H. Waechter, who is shown just beginning work on one of the massive beams. The leaf pattern on the background beam represents Succoth, the harvest festival, and in the center, the Star of David can be seen, also the stone tablets on which the Ten Commandments were engraved. In the "middle-ground" Waechter is working, and in the foreground can be seen the ram's horn, or shofar, which is blown at Yom Kippur observance, and the scroll on which the laws are written, called the Torah (center). Another panel not visible shows the burning bush which was a sign to Moses.

CC Man Urges Fair Exchange Of Canadian, U.S. Currency

Canadian tourists are coming to the United States for their vacations in greater number than ever before, and they now outnumber the American tourists going to Canada, reported James Mount, Chairman of the Visitors Service Committee, of the Portland Chamber of Commerce, on Saturday.

Undoubtedly this is due partly to the fact that the Canadian dollar has been continually climbing until it is now worth more than the American dollar. During the past week it reached the highest point on the foreign exchange market since November, 1933, and the Canadian dollar is now quoted at \$1.04 1/4 in U. S. currency, Mount said.

Korea Paid For Expenses

WASHINGTON (AP)—The United States will shortly pay around 35 million dollars to the Korean government for expenses incurred by American forces in the country.

This will be the second such payment for "goods, services and supplies" provided by the Koreans.

In making the announcement, the State Department said these dollar payments to Korea will "materially aid that government in developing a balanced import program which will supplement current United States and United Nations contributions of consumer goods and essential raw materials for the Korean economy."

Dollar payments to reimbursing South Korea for expenses of the American troops are made under terms of notes exchanged between the two governments last May 24.

Farm Team Named To Conservation Award

HEPPNER (AP)—A father-in-law, son-in-law farming team has been named as Morrow County's "Conservation Man of the Year."

Fred Mankin, the father-in-law, and Alvin Bunch, operate a 5,000-acre wheat and cattle ranch near here, including one of the largest strip-cropping projects in the state.

Mankin and Bunch will join other county winners in state competition for conservation man of the year in a contest sponsored by the Oregon Wheat Growers League.

Coal Miners Start 10-Day 'Holiday'

PITTSBURGH (AP)—Some 475,000 coal miners began a payless 10-day "memorial holiday" Friday night.

Already hard hit financially by the recent long steel strike, the UMW's 400,000 soft coal miners and 75,000 anthracite workers began closing the pits on the night shift.

Maintenance crews will stay on the job during the work stoppage, lasting 10 days.

'Miss America' Entrants Face Gruelling Week

WASHINGTON (AP)—The zany, or Miss America, season is upon us and we won't hear the last of it until the weekend after Labor Day.

There wouldn't be such a season if the pretty girls knew what lies ahead once—and if—they are selected to represent their state or city at Atlantic City.

They go through the tortures of the mis-behaved during that hectic week. The lucky, or unlucky, winner continues to go through the same for the rest of the next year. Sure, she may make as much as \$50,000 but she won't have much left after taxes.

MANY APPEARANCES

If she makes fewer than 300 personal appearances around the country—and often around the world—she is considered one who doesn't have her heart in her work.

Next year when the "Queen" returns to hand over her crown to the new winner, she may bump head-on into reality. All of a sudden she becomes a "former Miss America." The let-down is all too violent. She may even find that the committee forgot to reserve her a room.

I saw one worn-out "Queen" break out in a flood of tears when the master of ceremonies forgot to call her on stage for her number.

FACE RUDE AWAKENING

The girls are subjected to a gruelling week that would send most strong men to the bug house. After going through their county, district, and state contests they arrive at Atlantic City with their luggage and their mothers and fathers.

They find they can't even talk to a man on the telephone—not even their own dads. They must have breakfast with a dozen cruel-

eyed judges who make notes on whether they butter their bread on both sides or pitch their scrambled eggs down with a knife instead of a fork.

Most of them learn to know how to walk down a ramp properly. They can't balance their hips and their shoulders flip-flop. Some of them actually walk like a man trying to fumble his way out of a telephone booth.

STARES FROM 10,000

And as they go down the long board walk half naked in their bathing suits, always there are the stares from 10,000 people, including those eagle-eyed experts who judge them for talent, figure, and personality. One-third each.

The kids are so nervous that many of them start their songs half a tone flat or perhaps a couple of steps behind the orchestra when they try to impress the folks with a jig or a waltz.

I helped judge nine of the Washington, D. C., hopefuls in their semi-final contest. We picked what we thought were the three best who will compete in the finals soon.

The girl who got the most points was a cute brunette named Linda Welsbrod. Her measurements were just about right for a tall girl. Going from top to bottom they were: bust 38 inches, waist 23 1/2, hips 37, and shoe-size 7 1/2.
