

Step 1 Completed in Aerial Survey

First step in Lane County's long-range timber land mapping program has been completed. The second step was the aerial photographing of 731,500 acres of timber land in Lane County. A small Cessna-170 airplane equipped with a 65-pound camera snapped pictures from an altitude of 12,000 feet. The mapping was done by Pacific Aerial Surveys of Seattle. The firm was awarded the project by the Lane County Court in July after submitting a low bid of \$5,998.46.

The county's three to five year program not only calls for the aerial mapping of 2,400 square miles of Lane County from a point near Oakridge to the Pacific Ocean, but also includes mapping and crusing of the huge area. H. G. Chickering Jr., consultant for the county, meanwhile, is obtaining horizontal control data necessary for preparation of maps. During the coming months this data will be assembled so that maps can be completed of the area photographed this summer. Next summer an additional portion of the county will be photographed. The rest will be photographed the following summer.

Main purpose of the entire program is to equalize timber land assessments. County Assessor George Stock has explained the survey will make it possible to place more property on the tax rolls, especially vast sections of "fringe" timber and second growth probably not on the present rolls.

Dentist Takes Planning Post

Appointment of Dr. John P. MacKinnon as a member of the Eugene Planning Commission was announced Friday by Mayor V. Edwin Johnson. Dr. MacKinnon will succeed John P. McGinty who has resigned from the commission because business interests require him to be away from the city a good share of the time.

A member of the city budget committee, MacKinnon has been in Eugene since 1930. He is a graduate of University of Idaho and North Pacific College of Dentistry. He belongs to the Veterans of Foreign Wars, Elks Lodge, American Dental Assn. and Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity. He attends the Christian Science church. During World War II, Dr. MacKinnon served 37 months overseas with the 41st Division after being called to active duty with the Oregon National Guard in 1940. He was a division dental surgeon and a major at the time of his discharge from service.

Other members of the Planning Commission include Eldon Johnson, chairman; Clarence M. Urey, John G. Foster, Walter Banks, Clare K. Hamlin and Mrs. Pauline Burris. All serve without pay to administer the city's zoning regulations and to prepare long range plans for major civic improvements.

Youths Charged With Burglary

Trespasser Claims 'God's Permission'

Two Vida men were arraigned in District Court Friday on charges of burglary in a dwelling. Sherman V. Burall, 28, and David W. Laffin, 24, were charged with unlawfully entering a dwelling near Martin Creek, in the Vida vicinity. Both men waived preliminary hearings. In a statement to the court Laffin said: "This is our first offense. We were wrong, that's all."

Judge Chester N. Anderson set bail at \$1,000 for each. The men did not immediately decide Friday whether to waive grand jury. Another defendant, William Protz, 34, Chicago, gave the court an unusual reason for trespassing in Southern Pacific railroad property.

When Judge Anderson asked Protz who gave him permission to trespass, Protz replied: "I have permission from God." Anderson then asked Protz where he was from. Protz answered: "I'm from on earth, from Chicago." Anderson fined the defendant \$20 and costs and instructed officers to investigate whether Protz is wanted anywhere before releasing him.
