Seniors will register Sept. 8 at the same time.

School buses will run on those days. A bus schedule will be published sometime this week.

BETHEL SIGNS SEPT. 4

In the Bethel district, 52, all students will register on Thursday, Sept. 4, with a half day of classes scheduled for Friday, Sept. 5. Full day classes will start Sept. 8. Buses will run on the regular school-time schedule for registration.

All pupils living south of the junction of highway 99 and Bethel Dr., and east of the highway, will register at Bethel School. Pupils in the Gilbert and Petersen additions, Allison Park, Alfred's Platt, and Golden Gardens Way on Rodenhams Rd., will register at Clear Lake School. All other pupils living south of Marshall Ave. and west of Highway 99 will register at Denebo.

Those pupils living north of the south junction of Prairie Rd. and Highway 99 north of Rodenhams Rd. will register at Irving, with the exception of sixth graders in this area. They will register at Clear Lake School. They will take the Irving buses which will take them to Clear Lake.

All will be returned home by noon Thursday. Grades one through six will start at 9 a.m., DST, and grades seven through 12 will start at 8 a.m. DST, for registration.

Elsewhere in the area:

Cottage Grove—Grade schools in District 45, and Cottage Grove Union High, will open for full day of classes Sept. 8, at 9 a.m. First and fifth graders living east of Highway 99 will report from 9 to 12 a.m. Friday, Sept. 5, at Harrison School; first and fifth graders living west of Highway 99 will report from 9 to 12 a.m. Friday, Sept. 5, at Adams School; all sixth graders will report to Jefferson School from 9 to 12 a.m., Friday, Sept. 5. Other grade students do not need to register.

Buses will start regular runs on opening day, Sept. 8.

At Cottage Grove High, freshman registration is Wednesday, Sept. 3, from 2 to 5 p.m., with juniors registering the same day from 7 to 9 p.m.; sophomores will sign up for classes Thursday, Sept. 4, from 2 to 5 p.m., with seniors registering from 7 to 9 p.m. that day.

Delilah Valley and Saguinaw School will open at 9 a.m. on Tuesday, Sept. 2, Latham and Mt. View: Open Monday, Sept. 8, on regular schedule.

Juniper City: Elementary and high schools will open for the first day of classes Sept. 15, with buses to start running that day. Registration will be on Sept. 12.

Harrisburg: Buses start running on the first day of classes, Sept. 17. Registration is on Sept. 12.

Monroe: Sept. 8 is a half day at the grade school; Sept. 17 is the first full day at the high school, with buses to start running those days. High school students will register in the afternoon on Sept. 11 and 12. Grade school pupils do not pre-register.

Alvord: School will open for a partial day of classes Sept. 15.

Marcola: Classes will begin for a full day on Sept. 22, with buses to start running that day.

Wendling: Grade students go to Marcola.

Creswell: Grade and High students start full day of classes Sept. 8, with registration on Sept. 4 and 5. Buses start running Sept. 5.

Walker: Grade students go to Creswell; Grade School: High students go to Cottage Grove High.

Yoncalla: Classes and buses will start Sept. 8 for half a day.

Oakland: First graders will register Sept. 4, with ninth graders and new pupils registering Sept. 5. Buses will start running Sept. 4. The first day of classes, Sept. 8, for high and grade students will be half day of school.

Lorane: Buses start on the registration date, Sept. 8, but the first full day of classes is Sept. 8.

London: Classes and buses start Sept. 8, a full day of classes, for grade students. High school pupils go to Cottage Grove.

Shedd: Grade and high pupils start half a day Sept. 8, with buses beginning runs that date.

Mohawk: High School classes begin for a full day Sept. 8, with buses starting that day. Friday, Sept. 5, is registration date, from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Mohawk Grade School is in the Springfield School system.

Elmira: High school starts for a full day on Sept. 5; grade school, Sept. 8. Buses start those days.

Lyns: Grade school opens for full day Sept. 8, with registration and bus runs starting Sept. 8. High school students go to Elmira.

Noti: Grade school Sept. 8, with buses starting the same day.

Veneta: First full day of grade school classes, Sept. 8, with buses and registration scheduled for Sept. 5.

Crow High School: Registration and buses start Sept. 5; Classes open Sept. 8; day session, on Sept. 8.

Applegate: Buses and classes start Sept. 8 for half a day. High school students go to Crow.

Florence: Classes start in grade and high schools Sept. 8 for full day. Buses run for first time that day. Registration is Sept. 2 through Sept. 6.

Mapleton: Grade and high school students register during half-day session Sept. 8. Buses start that day.

Triangle Lake: Sept. 8 is first day of classes. Buses start that day, but registration for high school is Sept. 4.

Occasion for the meeting was the monthly instruction night held in the city jail by Police Chief Ted Brown. But Thursday the officers vied for pistol championship of the force and trophies and cash prizes given to the top shots. The watermelons were donated by

Pistol honors went to detective R. T. Nelson who fired a 241 out of a possible 300. He won possession of an emblematic trophy donated this year for the first time by Vern Hoffman, Eugene jeweler. He also walked off with the departmental first prize trophy and \$5 first place cash prize.

Sergeant Robert D. Mollett took second place with a score of 240. He won a \$3 cash prize. Winning third place and a \$2 cash prize was Detective Ed Bunch with a score of 234.

Pistol competition included time fire, slow fire and rapid fire from all the shooting positions. After the pistol competition and a talk from Brown which stressed teamwork and alertness, the officers addressed themselves to the watermelon.

fended the administration's "containment" policy in an address Saturday night to the Grand Rapids, Mich., convention of the American Veterans of World War II (Amvets).

The policy is not negative, as some Republicans contend, Sparkman said in his prepared speech. Containment, he declared, has "a wider, more creative, more dynamic purpose."

RESTORES FREE WORLD

"It stands for a halt to Communist aggression, wherever that appears. But even more tellingly, it stands for restoration of the strength of the free world as a warning to would-be aggressors."

Saturday brought two predictions of victory for Stevenson and one for Eisenhower.

James A. Farley, former Democratic chairman, visited the White House and afterward disclosed he had told Truman that Stevenson is going to win "a very substantial victory" in November. The Democratic Party has better unity than at any time since 1936, he said. Farley added he was ready to campaign actively for the ticket if asked to do so.

In Springfield, Monroe Sweetland, Democratic committeeman for Oregon, predicted Stevenson will score a clean sweep in Utah, Idaho, Montana, Washington and Oregon.

"Four months ago I thought Eisenhower might carry all five," Sweetland told reporters upon emerging from a conference with Stevenson. "Today I'm sure he won't carry any."

PREDICTS IKE WIN

In New York, however, Roy Roberts, president of the Kansas City Star, said there was no question. Eisenhower would win the election.

Roberts told reporters after calling on the general that Eisenhower's strength will increase in the next two months while Stevenson's will decrease.

He added he is convinced Eisenhower will carry Texas, Missouri and Kansas, and perhaps Oklahoma as well.

Indiana's Sen. Homer Capehart urged that Republicans blast away at the issue of graft and corruption in government as the Presidential campaign picks up speed. Capehart supported Sen. Robert A. Taft of Ohio for the GOP nomination. But talking to a reporter in Washington, he said, "we'll carry Indiana for Eisenhower."

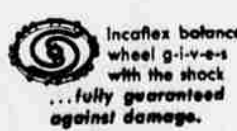

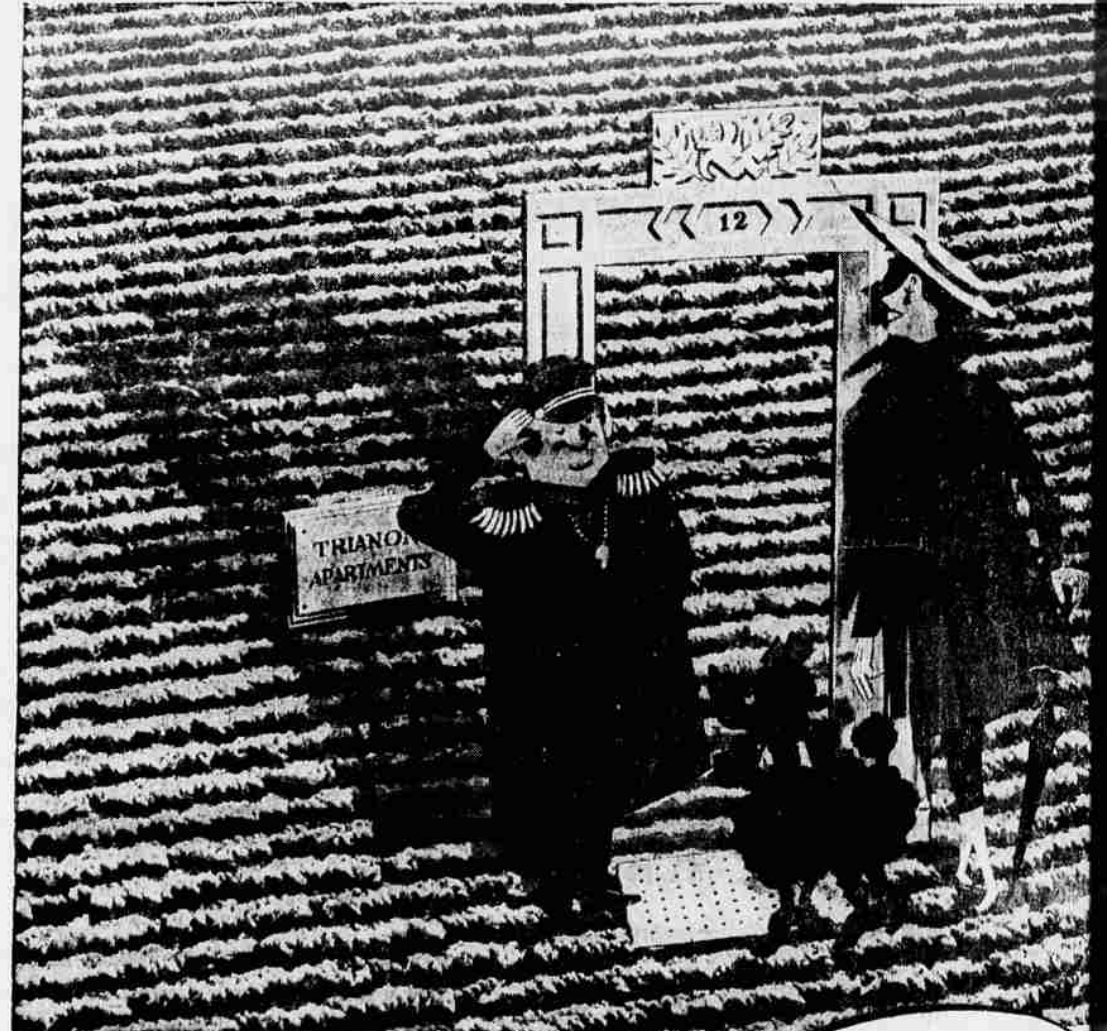
