Duck Gridders Open Fall Practice Monday

Coach Len Casanova and 50-odd Oregon varsity football players began preparations for the 1952 season Monday at Hayward Field.

The Webfoot grid boss plans two workouts daily for at least the first 10 days as the Ducks concentrate on getting ready for one of the toughest early-season schedules in recent years. Oregon travels to Los Angeles to meet the powerful UCLA Bruins on September 20 and then moves into Multnomah Stadium on September 27 to tackle Bobby Reynolds and the University of Nebraska in a night intercollegiate.

The Ducks may get a breather in traveling to Idaho the following week, but then must face California at Portland on October 11 and Washington at Seattle on October 18. Coach Casanova said Saturday the caliber of the opposition in the first few games made it mandatory that rapid progress be made during the first two and a half weeks of practice.

19 LETTERMEN

The varsity squad for the 57th year of Oregon intercollegiate football is led by 19 lettermen from last year's club and one letterman, Emery Barnes, who played in 1950 but was out of action last fall. The remainder of the expected turnout is made up of graduates from last year's junior varsity club, non-letterman from the varsity, and a handful of transfers.

At the same time the coaching staff and players are getting into action the ticket office has scheduled public sale for all five home games in both Eugene and Portland. Ducks for the Nebraska and California games will be available Tuesday at J. K. Gill company in Portland and in Eugene the sale for all five games will be held at McArthur Court.

There is one staff change this fall for the Ducks with Vern Sterling starting his first season as line coach in place of Gene Harlow, who accepted a position at Tulane. Sterling, a former all-American guard from Santa Clara, faces a tough job in his first year with the Ducks.

Oregon's line is considered to be the weak point of the 1952 team. Losses have taken 14 lettermen from the interior line in addition to a pair of ends. Only Monte Brethauer at left end and Emmett Williams at right guard will be playing the same position as they did a year ago.

Rampaging Rams Defeat Cardinals

MULTNOMAH STADIUM, PORTLAND—The world champion Los Angeles Rams racked up their third straight pre-season football victory of the season here, Saturday night by defeating an undermanned Chicago Cardinal club 24-14.

It looked for a while as though the high scoring pros would play a scoreless tie before the largest crowd to see a pro game in Portland—28,112 spectators—that broke the scoring ice on a play that scored at the halftime gun sounded. It was a seven-yard pass to Tommy Kalmanir, the swift footed youngster who helped Nevada beat Oregon in Eugene in 1947. Waterfield's placement made the count 7-0 at intermission. He also booted a field goal from the 23-yard line in the fourth period after missing one from the 46 in the first period.

Most impressive player on the field was probably Charley Trippi, the 35-year-old "Georgia Peach," who was the only consistent player for the Chicago invaders.

The Cardinals have previously been beaten 38-14 by the San Francisco 49ers and weather conditions for the spectators looked perfect. A balmy evening of the shirt sleeve variety. The turf looked in perfect condition but may be thin for the long string of collegiate games to follow.

Most of the northwest players were in action early in the game. Neither club was at full strength and that the early date probably had something to do with the lack of sustained attacks in the first part of the contest.

Longest offensive plays in the first period were for 14 yards—a pass from Van Brocklin to Elroy Hirsch, and Woody Lewis' gallop on a handoff from Van Brocklin.

The Cards had Don Panciera, the ex-San Francisco Don, at quarterback early in the game, but the Card offense changed color with Trippi passing and punting. His early favorite receivers were Don Paul of WSC and Bill Gay of Notre Dame. Later it was Don Stonieser of Northwestern, who was on the receiving end of eight including one for a touchdown. He had two for 16 yards in the second period—to Paul and to Gay.

LONGEST PLAYS

Longest offensive plays of the first half came late in the game. A 24-yard pass from Waterfield to Tom Fears that set up the first scoring play.

The Waterfield-Kalmanir comeback pass for a touchdown concluded an 80-yard march in 13 plays.

Deacon Dan Towler was the big gun in the second Los Angeles touchdown. The drive included a 16-yard pass from Van Brocklin to Fears and a 24-yard run. The touchdown was a 16-yard effort to Carey, who took the pitch on the two—behind Don Paul. Waterfield's kick was good and the score came after 4:18 of the second half.

Trippi sparked the Cards' first touchdown drive. The tally came after 16 plays—on a four-yard pass from Trippi to Stonieser. Bob Allis, an ex-Michigan boy who recently joined the club on a trade from Detroit, booted the extra point. He had missed a 44-yard field goal in the second period.

With only seven points difference in the final period, the Rams again started to roll. The payoff came in the first three minutes and 17 seconds—a pass that Carey took from Van going away with his finger tips and he roared across the goal line and dived over a short fence into the dog track. It was a grand job of catching and a "strike" by Van Brocklin. Waterfield's placement made it 21-7.

Elmer Angsman, the ex-Notre Dame speedster, opened the second Cardinal offensive with a 28-yard run. Trippi passed to Stonieser for 9 and then to Ram Ramsey (Bradley Tech) for 43 yards and a score. Ramsey took the ball on the 10 behind Dick Lane and Herb Rice. Allis' kick was good and the Cards trailed only 21-14.

FINAL SCORE

Another Carey catch, this time from Waterfield, set up the final Los Angeles score—a 27-yard play to the Cardinal 15. The Rams failed to move and Waterfield booted the field goal.

The Cards again started to move with two plays netting 10 yards and then Angsman romped 30 to the Rams' 33—but was lightly injured on the play. And that was the ball game.

Van Brocklin connected on six of 15 passes for 81 yards. Waterfield six out of 18 for 54 yards. Trippi made 14 out of 22 for 163 yards. Angsman was the biggest Card ground gainer with 66 yards and Towler for the Rams with 74. Lewis carried the ball only three times, for a 4-yard average. Van Brocklin carried the ball on two plays for seven yards—one a sneak, the other a six-yard after being tripped.

Dick Daugherty played on offense most of the time for the Rams and recovered a fumble in the first quarter.

The Rams had previously beaten the Collegiate All-Stars 10-7 and the Washington Redskins 45-23.

NEW YORK (AP)—Performing before many of their old-time stars of past world championship teams, the New York Yankees demonstrated some 1952 batting power today as Mickey Mantle and Yogi Berra hit homers in leading them to a 6-4 victory over the Washington Senators.

Harold "Skinny" Brown, obscure right-hander of the Chicago White Sox, jolted Cleveland's pennant ambitions Saturday night as he gained credit for an 11-6 triumph over the Indians.

The defeat dumped the Indians two games behind the front-running New York Yankees.

In other games, St. Louis shadowed Detroit, 2-1, while Boston and Philadelphia were rained out after three innings of play with the Red Sox ahead, 6-0.

Bouchey Grabs Canadian Crown

VANCOUVER, B. C. (AP)—Flamboyant Larry Bouchey, a weekend belter from Inglewood, Calif., Saturday parlayed a referee's decision into his first major golf crown when he won the Canadian Amateur championship with an extra hole victory over Bill Campbell, Huntingdon, W. Va.

The Burly Californian won it on the 37th hole—but his break came on the 34th.

Bouchey, the favorite of 4,000 spectators, was handed the 34th hole when Referee Colin Rankin, president of the Royal Canadian Golf Association, ruled Campbell had picked up his ball without Bouchey conceding a one-foot putt.

At the time, Bouchey was two down with only two to go. The pair had split the hole with four's the ruling, however, left Campbell only one up.

ALMOST WATERLOO

The 582-year 26th, approaching a green ringed with spectators, was almost Bouchey's Waterloo.

He and Campbell were 280 yards straight off the tee, Bouchey went into a trap below the green while Campbell was in a gully.

Campbell chipped to the green, 20 feet inside Bouchey's third shot. Bouchey missed a 60-foot, falling five feet short. Campbell deliberated his 40-foot putt, rolled it up and was four feet heavy.

Bouchey just missed his putt and screamed as it rolled inches away.

Campbell, with the advice of his caddy, Kevin Riley, missed the five footer and both were down with a bogie six.

Bouchey, with new heart, rolled down a 14-foot putt to win the 35th hole and set the match even. Campbell sent the match down to the wire when he missed a heart-breaking eight-footer.

Campbell chose a wood to reach the green and then lay three, 85 feet off.

Bouchey drilled a putt four feet from the cup and Campbell sat 11 feet off. Campbell missed the desperation putt while Bouchey sank his. Campbell walked back to the clubhouse in tears.

"LUCKIEST BREAK"

Bouchey, father of two and a finance company collector for a used car dealer, called the official's ruling "The luckiest break I ever got."

"I was sunk when I missed that putt on the 34th. I guess Bill got rattled. I know I was," he said.

Bouchey was down three after the morning round, when he failed to get his putter working, although his tee shots rivalled Campbell's and his iron work was as brilliant as the Virginian's.

Campbell, a picture golfer and last year's captain of the U. S. Walker Cup, pulled two up over his opponent on the 32nd when Bouchey missed a two-foot putt that would have squared the match.

Eugene Sailor Third In Astoria Regatta

ASTORIA (AP)—Rough waters in the harbor here Saturday afternoon forced Astoria Regatta officials to decide winners of most of the motor boat races after only one heat.

The B-stock runabout event was the only one in which two heats were run. Carl Woods, Eastside, Ore., and Clay Fox, Tacoma, were first. Bill Larson, Portland, and Bruce Tinkler, Tacoma, were second. Drue Larosen, Eugene, and Jim Spinnaker, Seattle, were third.

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Pung Captures Women's Title

PORTLAND, Ore. (AP)—Jackie Pung, a 210-pound sawed-off block-buster with a fighting heart nearly as big as she is, came roaring back from the brink of defeat Saturday to capture the U. S. Women's Amateur golf championship.

Five down and apparently completely off her game at the end of the first 14 holes, the Honolulu mother pulled out all the stops as she came roaring back to whip the battling, but dead-tired Shirley McFeters of Long Beach, Calif., 2 and 1.

In the long run, it was a matter of stamina, and the 29-year-old Hawaiian matron played her game cleverly. She moped around the course during the morning round and generally slowed up the proceedings.

"I have to conserve my energy for the second round this afternoon," she said, "I couldn't afford to go all out this morning."

She was the slowest walker in the gallery during the first 18 holes. But Saturday afternoon, with the sun broiling the 3,000 fans following the match, she walked as fast as any of them. In fact, she led Miss McFeters in getting up to the ball most of the time.

At the end of the morning round, Miss McFeters, a 21-year-old junior at UCLA, had been three up. But, while she had played the first 18 without signs of nervousness, her iron and putting, usually her best weapons, started to weaken in the afternoon. She was dead tired from the tournament. She had to play two extra holes to qualify; in her first match she went an extra hole; on her quarter-final battle she had to go two extra holes; and in the semi-finals she had to go the same extra distance.
