## Woman Held In Gas Death

NORWALK, Conn. (AP)—A 32-year-old woman is held in connection with the gas death of her 72-year-old father, who was critically ill with cancer.

Detective Capt. George Risi said he ordered a 24-hour police guard at the Norwalk Hospital bedside of Miss Lois Curtis, overcome by gas fumes which police said killed her father Saturday.

Coroner Edward E. Krentzman said he ordered the woman held after what police described as a suicide note disclosed Miss Curtis may have killed her father by turning on all gas jets on a kitchen range, then remaining in the house in an attempt to take her own life.

Board decisions will be made at that time whether to re-advertise for bids, or cut out details from former plans to stay within the available \$150,000.

## Attack on GI In Austria Brings Protest

SALZBURG, Austria (AP)—United States and Austrian police opened a joint investigation Monday into an attack on an American Army soldier. A group of Austrians Saturday beat him and his wife and overturned his car.

Officials said Sgt. William Pennel of Turon, Kan., and his wife were bruised but not injured seriously in the brawl.

The incident occurred when Pennel drove through a crowd leaving a movie theater near his home. An argument started and blows were exchanged by the sergeant and an unidentified Austrian.

Pennel and his wife left their car in front of the theater and went to their home where Mrs. Pennel seized a rifle. The crowd overturned the car but Austrian policemen intervened to prevent further trouble.

It was the latest in a series of incidents involving U. S. soldiers and Austrians.

U. S. Army officials said they believed most of the incidents were traceable to an anti-American campaign by local newspapers, angered by the recent requisition of land to serve as a U. S. Army training ground.

They said such "inevitable" incidents were exaggerated by the Austrian press in an attempt to embarrass the Americans.

## Combat Pay Given To Fighting Troops

SEOUL, Korea (AP)—Fighting men of the 8th army in Korea received more than \$2 million in extra combat pay Sunday.

Some 44,000 soldiers were paid their first \$45 monthly bonus for serving in the war zone. The payments were authorized under a law signed by President Truman in July.
