

GOP Candidate Plans Another Southern Swing

MINNEAPOLIS, (UP)—Dwight D. Eisenhower flew Monday to woo Republican leaders in Sen. Robert A. Taft's home state of Ohio and announced plans for a new swing through the Solid South.

The Republican presidential nominee took off from Minneapolis at 7:10 a.m., for Cleveland, Ohio, where candidates and party leaders from Ohio, Pennsylvania and Maryland waited to confer with him.

The former general capped a day of rest in a northern retreat by announcing plans to attempt a repeat of his well-received swing through the South last week.

No definite date was set for the new appeal for Southern votes, but the trip was expected to start Oct. 1 or 2 and cover Texas, Louisiana, Oklahoma, Tennessee, and Kentucky.

Eisenhower will travel by air, as he did when he swept through Florida, Alabama and Arkansas last week with an appeal for a revolt against the "mess" in Washington.

REPEATS PLEDGE
Eisenhower flew to the home state of the man he defeated at the GOP National Convention with the welcome knowledge that Taft has returned to the political battleground and is ready to do "everything possible" for his former rival.

Taft reaffirmed the pledge he made after his convention defeat as he arrived Sunday at Washington from a Canadian vacation.

The general headed East after a week end of wooing farm votes, enjoying country cooking, and just plain resting up.

Saturday he stated his farm policies at Kasson, Minn., and enjoyed a farm woman's hospitality a few hours before his rival, Gov. Adlai E. Stevenson of Illinois, ate at the same table.

Sunday was devoted to relaxing on the Alexandria, Minn., estate of John Cowles, editor and publisher of the Minneapolis Star and Tribune.

'GOOD LISTENER'
The candidate attended services at the Lutheran Church in nearby Battle Lake, Minn., and heard the pastor warn of "shadows" hanging over the world.

The Rev. Norman C. Anderson said his sermon had no political implications, but complimented Eisenhower for being a good listener.

The candidate moves west into Indiana Tuesday, where he is scheduled to make a major speech in the evening.

Eisenhower was scheduled to arrive in Indianapolis at 8:30 a.m. lunch with the Indiana Republican Editorial Assn. and address a rally at the Butler University Field House.

The speech will be broadcast nationally over the National and American broadcasting systems.

137-Year Fight Finally Regains Officer's Honor

NEW YORK (AP)—The great grandson of a court-martialed naval lieutenant, who died in 1874, will receive a renewed commission for the dead officer Monday in a victorious end to a 137-year vindication fight.

Electus D. Litchfield, an 82-year-old architect, formally will be presented with a certificate restoring the rank of Lt. William S. Cox, who was cashiered in 1814. The certificate was signed by President Truman last month.

Cox was tried and convicted two years after he served in the war of 1812 as a 21-year-old third lieutenant aboard the U.S. frigate Chesapeake, which fought the British frigate Shannon off Boston.

In the battle the American ship was badly hit and most of her officers injured. Her commanding officer, Capt. James Lawrence, uttered the famous words "Don't give up the ship" as he lay mortally wounded.

But the British boarded and captured the Chesapeake.

The court martial accused Cox of misconduct in leaving the battle to direct crew members in carrying the wounded Lawrence below decks.

Cox's family fought to restore his good name, making pleas to President Theodore Roosevelt and Franklin D. Roosevelt. But an act of Congress was necessary to reverse the court martial. The bill was passed in July.

Two Boys Apprehended

Caudle Queried At Two Sessions

Solons Question Ousted Attorney

WASHINGTON (AP)—T. Lamar Caudle faced another barrage of questions Monday as House investigators attempted to learn whether "influential" persons have pressured the Justice Department into dropping prosecutions.

The ousted assistant attorney general was questioned behind closed doors by a House judiciary subcommittee for four hours Saturday night and for six hours Sunday in a nearly unprecedented Sunday session.

Caudle was reported to have shown the subcommittee Sunday a "Dear Lamar" letter he received from Mr. Truman last Oct. 29, thanking him for a gift cigarette case. That was just 18 days before President Truman ousted Caudle for outside activities "incompatible" with his office as the government's chief tax case prosecutor.

FRAUD CASE

Chairman Frank L. Chelf (D-Ky), who recalled Caudle for more secret questioning Monday, said the drawing North Carolina attorney was asked Sunday about "pressures" brought on high government officials by "influential" persons, "including congressmen."

Chelf said he was "not too satisfied" with Caudle's testimony on the Justice Department's handling of the 1946 Kansas City vote fraud case, and that Caudle would be questioned further about the incident.

During last winter's tax scandal investigation by a House ways and means subcommittee, Caudle testified he had been subjected to "tremendous pressure" from various persons, including congressmen, while he headed the Justice Department's tax division. He said, however, that no one ever had asked him to do anything improper.

PUBLIC HEARING

Members indicated Monday's session might be the last one behind closed doors before summoning Caudle to a public hearing.

Although Chelf (D-Ky) has declined to reveal Caudle's testimony, there were these developments:

● Rep. Kenneth B. Keating (R-NY) said the subcommittee questioned Caudle Sunday about dismissal of prosecution against 28 of the 29 defendants who were indicted in the Kansas City case, which involved theft of ballots from a safe in which they had been placed for a post-election audit.

● The primary purpose in calling Caudle to testify publicly, members said, is in connection with charges that the Justice Dept. sought to block a grand jury investigation into St. Louis tax scandals last year.

● Caudle was questioned Sunday about 11 cases, nine involving taxes. Chelf said three of them were aired by the ways and means subcommittee which investigated tax scandals, but that six were "new."

Mossadegh Hints Court Action

Oil Settlement Rejected

TEHERAN, Iran (AP)—Premier Mohammed Mossadegh flatly rejected Sunday night the British-American offer to solve the Anglo-Iranian oil squabble, but hinted Iran might agree to a court settlement of the muddled issue.

Blasting the recent Truman-Churchill proposal as the worst yet made in the dragged-out negotiations, Mossadegh told newsmen, "The solution proposed in this message is not only altogether inequitable, but more severe and impracticable than earlier proposals."

3-PAGE STATEMENT

Mossadegh's point-by-point rejection of the British-American offer was contained in a three-page statement read to reporters at his home.

Shortly after the news conference, George Middleton, British charge d'affaires, conferred for more than an hour with Mossadegh at the latter's home. He refused to divulge the nature of the discussion.

Mossadegh's statement was an expansion of his off-the-cuff rejection Aug. 30, when the joint offer was made. He has called a special parliamentary session Wednesday to frame a formal reply to Britain and the United States. Observers believe Parliament will echo the Premier's stand.

COURT SETTLEMENT?

However, some quarters pinned hopes negotiations might continue on Mossadegh's reference Sunday night to a court settlement. The Premier said it was possible Iran and the Anglo-Iranian Oil Co. could agree to submit the compen-

sation issue to a mutually agreed-upon court.

"The first condition of this agreement," he added, "is that the parties to the suit should determine the limit and the nature of their dispute."

The British-American proposal had included an offer for World Court arbitration of compensation due the British-owned AIOC for its nationalized properties.

Commenting on this, however, Mossadegh said:

"It is clear to all that after the International Court ruled it has no jurisdiction in the case, the Iranian courts constitute the only judicial authority in the world competent to investigate the present dispute."

Mossadegh, only recently recovered from an illness, read his statement in a firm voice. Assailing the British-American offer as completely inequitable, he said:

'SOVEREIGNTY RIGHTS'

"By imposing these terms the intention of the British and American governments is to destroy the fruit of all the struggles of the

Iranian government and the hardships it has suffered in defending its rights of sovereignty . . .

"Despite all economic and financial difficulties, the Iranian nation will under no circumstances submit to unfair conditions that may be prejudicial to its economic or political independence or, may God forbid, to the national honor and prestige of Iran."
