

Drain Blasts Lowell, 43-0

DRAIN — End Dick Joslyn was on the receiving end of four touchdown passes here Friday night as Coach Ernie Correia uncovered a three-ring aerial circus that gave Drain High an opening 43-0 football victory over Lowell.

Jim Swearingin, Kenny Stoop and Jim Whipple were the passers in the contest that saw Drain complete 10 of 17 passes to supplement a hard-running ground attack that scored in all but the third period. The visitors were able to penetrate enemy territory only twice, one to the Drain 30-yard line.

Drain took the opening kickoff and scored on nine plays, Jim Swearingin passing to Joslyn from 10 yards out. Kenny Stoop's 19-yard run set up the second touchdown in the opening period, Jim Whipple scoring from the two.

A 21-yard pass play from Swearingin to Joslyn opened the second-quarter scoring. John Lovelace's 35-yard gallop scored the fourth Drain touchdown, and the half-time ended with Stoop passing to Joslyn from 20 yards out.

Following a scoreless third period, Ray McCormack intercepted a Lowell pass and rambled 35 yards for a touchdown. The final score was a 45-yard pass from Whipple to Joslyn into the end zone.

While Coach Len Casanova and his new assistant, Vern Sterling, were in Portland for a Duck Club session Friday, Jack Roche directed a no-contact workout on two departments of the game not previously touched on — punt receiving and placements.

With Monte Brothauer, Lou Novikoff and Ken Sweitzer doing the punting, the receivers were alternated in two-man teams that included Merritt Barber, George Shaw, Farrell Albright and Manning Barber.

Placements, both points-after-touchdown and field goals were attempted by Emerson Harvey, specialist of last year, and Novikoff.

The Webfoots had some competition from a herd of six elephants, housed on an adjacent field and Roche cast longing eyes at the elephants, any one of which could do something for Oregon's comparatively weak forward wall. The animals were here for a two-day stand with the Shrine circuit in McArthur Court.

Trainer Bob Officer cleared out the training room before practice and the squad personnel numbered 44, including one newcomer and three cripples. Merritt Barber, out of action only a day with a leg injury, reported along with Stan Gottschalk, 185-pound linebacker from Marshfield High, Coos Bay, a freshman on the 1950 squad. Pat O'Brien, sophomore tackle who was feared lost for the season with a knee injury, joined Linebacker Bob Sutton and Tackle Paul Jackson, who were suited up but took only conditioning work.

School Lunches To Be Delayed

Hot lunches for Springfield school children will be served starting Wednesday, Sept. 17, and not on Monday, Sept. 15, as previously announced, according to hot lunch supervisor Mrs. Maxine Cole.

Mrs. Cole was appointed lunch supervisor last week by the Springfield School Board. With a background of accounting and business experience, Mrs. Cole comes to the Springfield system after living in the city for a year and a half.

She expects that about 2,500 lunches a day will be served.

Lunch prices in Springfield were raised two and a half cents a day recently and now are 27½ cents a day for first through seventh graders and 32½ cents a day for eighth through 12th graders. However, lunches cannot be purchased daily, but must be paid for by the week, at \$1.35 for lower grades and \$1.60 for upper grades, or by the month.

Youth Receives Two-Year Term

Refuses Probation
In Check Case

An 18-year-old war veteran, who joined the army when he was 14 and was wounded in Korea, was sentenced Friday to two years in the penitentiary "because I want it that way."

The youth, Robert D. Middaugh, 531 West "D" St., Springfield, told Circuit Court Judge G. F. Skipworth he didn't want probation after pleading guilty to two charges of conspiracy to commit a felony.

George Langford, Middaugh's attorney, told the court the youth "dislikes the service so much, he won't go back. He would rather go to the penitentiary."

Skipworth then asked Middaugh to speak. The youth said: "I have five years left to serve on my enlistment. I might be able to go back and serve and again I might go AWOL again. I might just as well go to the penitentiary and get it over with."

Ed Middaugh, the youth's father, told the court his son had made up his mind and he, the father, could say nothing to change the situation.

The elder Middaugh said later that his son had enlisted in the army at the age of 14 and served four years honorably. "He was wounded in Korea and had to be flown back to the United States."

According to Langford, the youth re-enlisted for a six year period and later went AWOL.

The youth had been involved in illegal check writing activities with two other youths who have not yet been apprehended.

High Lumber Demand Seen

PORTLAND (UP) — The demand for lumber is expected to continue at a slightly better pace than in the first half of 1952, Walter S. Johnson, president of the Western Pine Assn., said Thursday.

He said that timber growth can keep well ahead of needs by "full development of tree farming on public and private lands." Johnson, head of the American Forest Products Corp., here to address a meeting of the association, said the major future problem of the industry would be holding lumber markets against such competitors as aluminum, plastics, glass and fiber.

Some progress toward getting more federal access roads in Western forests was reported by Leo V. Bodine, executive vice president of the National Lumber Manufacturers Assn., Washington, D. C. He formerly was with Potlatch Forests, Inc., Lewiston, Idaho.

Register Now

SALEM (UP) — Gov. Douglas McKay Friday designated the week beginning Sept. 28 as registration week in Oregon.

During that week, a campaign will be held to persuade Oregonians to register to vote. It will be the last week of the registration period for the November election.

The Governor said, "It is a sad commentary on our evaluation of our freedom that over a third of all Oregonians entitled to vote are lethargic or too lazy to exercise their franchise. Oregon ranks 39th in the nation in voter participation, and is lowest of all Western states."

Duden Slips to Third As Bulla Leads Open

BALTIMORE (UP) — Johnny Bulla, former airlines pilot, climbed into solo possession of the halfway lead in the Eastern Open golf tournament Friday by clipping seven strokes off par with 137 for 36 holes.

The 38-year-old Verona, Pa., veteran pro shook off Skee Riegel of Tulsa, Okla., and Bob Duden of Portland, Ore., who matched his 68 in Thursday's opening 18 holes. While Bulla took only one more stroke on the second 18, Riegel went one over par 72 for 141 and Duden slipped to 74 for 142. The pack chasing \$15,000 in total prizes still was hot on Bulla's trail, however.

Qualifying to Open For Oakway Tourney

Qualifying for Oakway Women's annual golf tournament will open this Sunday. The tournament is open to all women in the Eugene area. Defending champ is Mim Hope.

The qualifying period is Sept. 14-28. Gross 18-hole qualifying scores will determine flight and pairings. Match play will govern and all flights will play scratch. First round matches start Sept. 30. Entry fee is \$2.

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Detroit Dam Opens to Public

PORTLAND (UP) — The Army Engineers reported Thursday that Detroit Dam on the North Santiam River would be open to the public Saturday.

The dam, with a powerhouse at its base, is 49 miles east of Salem. Visitors will be taken on tours from 9 a. m. to 4 p. m.

Although pouring of concrete is about completed, work on the dam and reservoir will not be finished until next year. First power is expected in early 1953.

Although the fourth of the Willamette Valley dams to be built, it will be the first to produce power since Fern Ridge, Cottage Grove and Dorena are for flood control only.

Saucers Sighted At Cannery
