

CIO Protests Timber Sales

Resolution Raps Indian Bureau Policy

PORTLAND — The CIO Woodworkers protested this week against sale of large blocks of Indian-owned timber in the Pacific Northwest.

A resolution at the annual convention said the Bureau of Indian Affairs' policy of making large sales "has tightened the grip of the big timber monopolies on the state's dwindling timber supply, and has brought increased demands from the Indian people for full citizenship."

The resolution urged that the Indians be given full citizenship. Singled out was a sale of some 614 million feet of Quinalt timber in Washington to Rayonier, Inc.

The conditions of the sale made it possible for Rayonier, Inc., to be the sole bidder, acquiring the timber at a price which is at least a third below the going market price," the resolution said.

Another resolution proposed a merger of the Woodworkers and CIO Paper Workers.

Robert T. Creasey, assistant secretary of labor, told the convention labor's fight for better wages and working conditions had benefited the whole country. In addition he lauded the legislative program of labor, particularly for gains in social security, education for veterans, aid programs for foreign allies, and measures to stop Communism in Greece and Turkey.



BERN, Switzerland — Neutral Switzerland follows its neutrality in its radio broadcasts, and thinks it is winning audiences because so many listeners are tired of propaganda.



"We think that the airwaves have just about reached the saturation point in propaganda, so people within our range appear to be listening more to us, because they just want straight news."

At the same time, Tschannen said that the Swiss are not interested in radio competition; are not trying to steal listeners from anybody. Our idea is to put good programs on the air. We want to entertain and to inform, with no ulterior motives to our broadcasts. We don't lecture. We don't want to be boring."

Although the Swiss strive for perfection in neutrality, their broadcasts frequently are jammed by special jamming transmitters. Tschannen reports that the Russians have steady jammers. They monitor all Swiss transmissions, and if they hear something they don't want to get behind the Iron Curtain, they switch on the jammers.

This usually happens when the Swiss radio broadcasts editorial opinion from the Swiss press, which often is as critical of the Kremlin as American editorials.

In their overseas service, the Swiss broadcast in seven languages. They used to transmit in Russian, too, but ran into so much interference, that they decided: "There's no point in it." The regular languages: German, French, Spanish, Italian, English, Portuguese, and Esperanto.

They have no specific check on the number of listeners in the United States to their shortwave casts, but Tschannen reports that his office receives as many as 50,000 letters a year from America. "People like objective programs," he said.
