SAN FRANCISCO — Edward Lewis, 28, died in an Oakland hospital Saturday from burns received when his wife poured a pot of boiling coffee over his head. Mrs. Willietta Lewis, 24, told police her husband came home at 6:30 a. m. on Sept. 21 bragging he'd been out with another woman and then beat her when she upbraided him. So she poured the boiling coffee over his head. She was arrested and jailed on a manslaughter charge.

Powers to Tell Need for Bonds

The \$200,000 bond issue to be voted on Oct. 21 by the people of School District 52 will be explained to the UTAs of three of the schools within the next two weeks.
Tom Powers, district superintendent, will explain the issue at Irving School Tuesday, Oct. 7; at Danebo on Thursday, Oct. 9; and at Clear Lake Thursday, Oct. 16.
Funds raised by voting the bond issue would pay for the first unit of a new elementary school in the district, plus seven high school classrooms. The first unit of the elementary school would consist of either four or six classrooms, plus office space. The number of rooms depends on the bid prices.

Class sessions start at 8 p.m. and will run until about 10 p.m. Edison school is located on E. 22nd Ave. near Onyx.

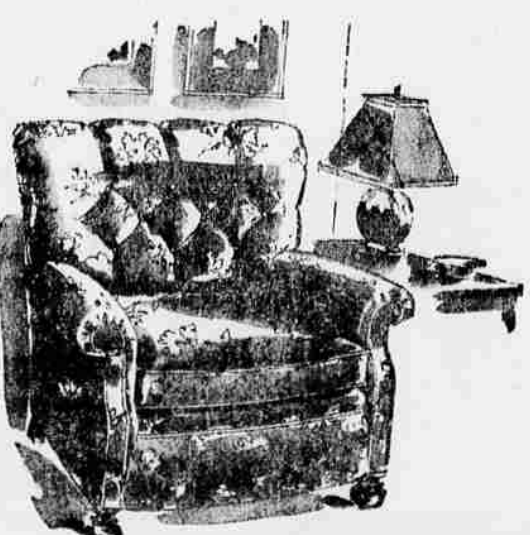
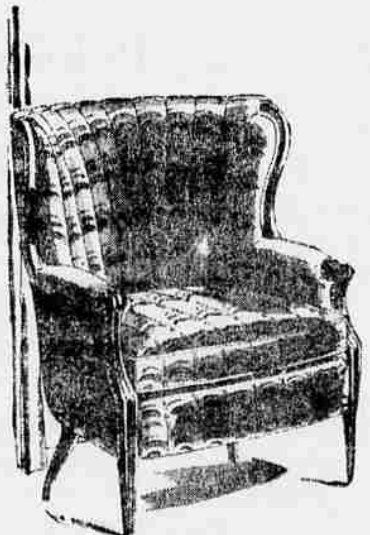
