

Truman Declares His Belief in Ike Serious Mistake

Accuses General Of 'Play on War'

ABOARD TRUMAN TRAIN (UP) — President Truman declared Tuesday he made "a very serious mistake" when he once thought Dwight D. Eisenhower qualified for the presidency.

"He declared that the GOP nominee has "betrayed every principle about our foreign policy and our national defense that I thought he believed in."

"It has been a sad experience for me," Truman said in a speech prepared for delivery to a train-side crowd at Colorado Springs, Colo.

'BIG RESPONSIBILITY'

Truman said the president "has the awful responsibility" of deciding whether to use the atomic bomb and must be a man "who can stand up to the political pressure when he has to make tough decisions."

He also accused Eisenhower of trying to win votes "by playing upon the casualties and sacrifices in Korea," and talking about "blunders" that led up to Korea when "he joined in the decision to pull our troops out of Korea in the first place."

Truman has acknowledged before Eisenhower's story in his book, "Crusade in Europe," that he told the general at Potsdam in 1945 he would support him for anything he might seek, specifically including the presidency.

But, he once told a news conference, he thought the general was a Democrat.

"In bitter language, Truman repeated the question he said people were asking: "Didn't you once think he (Eisenhower) was qualified to be president?"

"That is true," the President said. "I did." Then, he told the Colorado voters:

"But I made a very serious mistake when I thought he had the qualities needed for the highest office in this country. . . . I know he would have trouble in political life, as all military men do, separating the wheat from the chaff, and the political phony from the men who are really working for the good of the country."

"But I thought he would always stand up for the things he believed in—for the things his whole career had been dedicated to achieving."

'HELL-FOR-LEATHER'

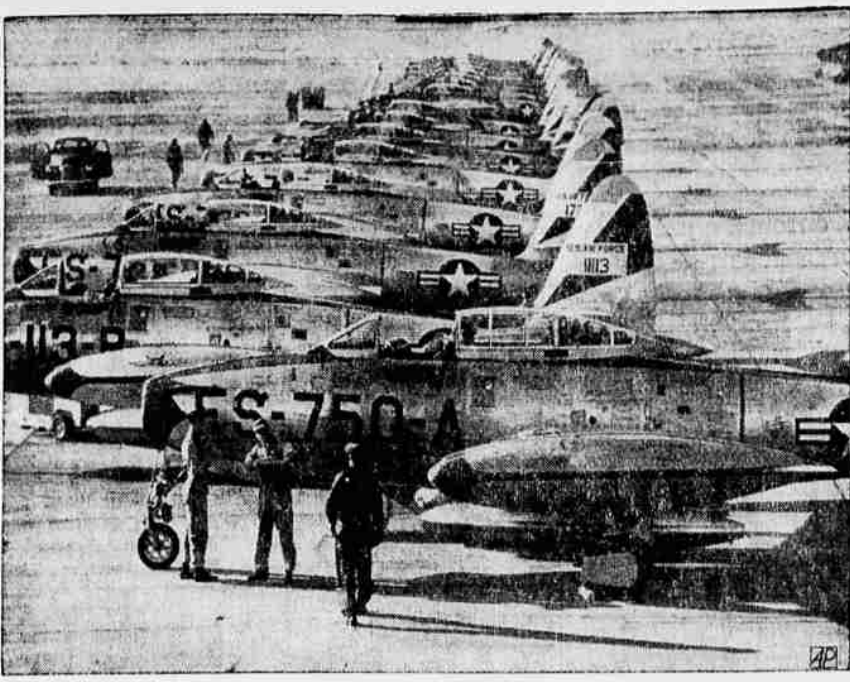
In a "hell-for-leather" swing through Utah Monday and on into Colorado Tuesday, Truman made a slashing attack on four senators backing Eisenhower for the presidency.

The President lathered Sens. Joseph R. McCarthy of Wisconsin, William Jenner of Indiana, James P. Kem of Missouri and Ohio's Robert A. Taft, all Republicans.

Truman said Monday he doesn't see how Eisenhower can be elected "with the crew he has got around him" and its "terrible record."

Key Democratic officials told reporters they are counting on the President's "give-'em-hell" presentation of the issues to train-side crowds not only to stir up interest among the voters but to lay down the issues for candidates within the states.

Moving into Colorado last night, Truman told a crowd at Rifle that his present tour is "only the beginning" and that a lot more of the Republicans "will be worried before I finish reading the terrible Republican record to the American people from one end of the country to the other."

'Poll-Happy' Residents Balk At Political Pulse Checkers

BALTIMORE (AP)—A prairie-ranging correspondent of the Baltimore Sun reports the badgered voters of Crook County, Oregon, are sick and tired of having their pulse taken by election pollsters.

Polls, they have decided, are a nuisance. So now they won't talk.

Crook County has been besieged by pollsters because in every election since 1880 it was voted in favor of the candidate who turned out to be the majority choice of voters throughout the nation.

The reaction of Crook Counties was reported by Thomas O'Neill, Sun special correspondent.

"For weeks," O'Neill said in a dispatch from Salem, Ore., "The people of Crook County—population 8,991, registered voters 3,233—have found themselves under the microscope."

"A knock at the door or a ring of the telephone became almost invariably the prelude to a single query: 'What presidential candidate will you support?'"

"A poll-a-day became a problem and irritated Crook Coun-

tians began refusing to state a preference, slamming the door on possibly priceless advance information as to what the nation will do Nov. 4."

One man the pollsters nearly always tackle is Steve Bailey, editor of the weekly Prineville Tribune at the county seat, Prineville, population 3,233.

"Bailey, who knows everybody in the county, decided to make a poll of his own," O'Neill reported.

The result of 183 inquiries appears in the current issue of the Tribune.

Eisenhower 68, Stevenson 36, undecided 39, won't tell 15, not registered 5.

"Bailey," O'Neill reported, "decided that his poll was less than conclusive, standing alone."

His check at the Courthouse showed the registration is 2,484 Democrats, 1,796 Republicans and 47 unaffiliated.

It also showed considerable changing or registered affiliation—at the rate of four Democrats changing to Republican for each Republican switching to Democrat.

Election officials reported most of those changing appeared under the delusion it is necessary to be registered as a Republican to cast a Republican ballot or as a Democrat to vote for a Democratic candidate at the November election.

Crook County gave a majority to President Truman last election while Oregon was going the other way.

O'Neill reported there are other signs Oregon is once more headed for the Republican column.

He quoted Mrs. Dolly Fessler, the Democratic chairman in Crook County, as saying she twice appealed to the party leadership for campaign material to use in the county but got no response."

Aly Says Rita A 'Homebody'

PARIS (AP)—Movie Star Rita Hayworth, a "fireball" of vivacity and emotion on the screen was pictured by her estranged husband, Prince Aly Khan, Tuesday as a "wet blanket" around the house.

That was Aly's answer to Rita's complaint that he is a "playboy" who spends his time and her money at race tracks and casinos while she slaves over hot movie scripts in Hollywood.

The Indian prince replied that Rita's idea of a big time is to get into something comfortable and just sit around the house all evening.

He described her, without flattery, as a "homebody."

The embittered one-time lovers exchanged their verbal blasts through their attorneys and from separate and guarded domiciles nearly two miles apart.

The only note of cordiality was Rita's statement she would call off the Reno divorce proceedings she promised to press Monday if Aly will grant her a separation and custody of their two-year-old daughter, Yasmin.

Rita said she has been disappointed in her attempted reconciliation with Aly because he preferred race horses and night clubs to the quiet home atmosphere she likes.

That, said Aly, is exactly the trouble—that quiet atmosphere.

Wife of Colonel Held in Killing

General's Daughter Confined in Hospital

TOKYO (AP)—Mrs. Dorothy Smith, daughter of Gen. Walter Krueger, has been charged with murder in the fatal stabbing Saturday of her husband, Col. Aubrey D. Smith, Gen. Mark Clark's headquarters announced Tuesday night.

The attractive woman, mother of two children, is held under observation in a Tokyo Army hospital.

'NORMAL PROCEDURE'

A spokesman in Clark's headquarters said, "This case will be handled in accordance with normal procedure. The charge is now being investigated as required by statute—namely Article 32 of the Uniform Code of Military Justice. Should the investigation establish that trial is warranted, the charge would be referred to an appropriate military court for trial."

The spokesman said, "a charge of murder has been preferred." It was reported unofficially that under Army regulations, should Mrs. Smith be brought to trial it would be held in Tokyo.

WIFE DAZED

A maid found Smith, 45, of San Antonio, Tex., on his bed vainly trying to stem the flow of blood from a wound in his right side. His wife sat on an adjoining bed clutching a knife.

Mrs. Smith was taken to an Army hospital for observation. She has not been permitted to see any outsiders, including members of her family.

The hospital commander reported Tuesday that she is in good condition. A previous report said she was becoming "more lucid."

Flying Saucer Picture Just a Shot of Jupiter

GOTEBORG, Sweden (AP)—On a night walk in the small town of Munkedal near here, a young Swedish fisherman saw what he thought was a "flying saucer" moving up and down in the sky.

Happening to have his camera along, he took a picture. The Swedish defense staff studied the photo and conferred with leading astronomers.

They concluded that the fisherman had taken an excellent shot of the planet Jupiter.

Fists Fly as Rival Candidates Debate Issue

WALTHAM, Mass. (AP)—Fisticuffs stole the show Monday night when rival candidates for state political offices—from governor down—met on the same platform to debate issues.

Democratic Atty. Gen. Francis E. Kelly threw a punch at a heckler who had come to the stage in answer to Kelly's "challenge to anyone who has made these cowardly attacks on me."

Kelly's opponent, who identified himself as John Marshalk, 25, of Newton, an office worker and father of a five-month-old daughter, was led from the hall by police after the incident. Kelly remained on the platform.

Later the 50-year-old attorney general told reporters he swung in self defense and struck Marshalk a glancing blow on the shoulder after hearing the latter say, "I'm going to punch that . . . in the nose."
