Noodles Make Beef Go Further

When you can stretch one pound
of ground beef to feed six, you
have kitchen know-how. Part of
that know-how can be noodles and
cheese to combine with the small
amount of beef.

Beef and Noodle Casserole
(6 servings)
One pound ground beef, 2 table-
spoons finely chopped onion, 2
tablespoons fat, 1½ teaspoons salt,
¼ teaspoon pepper, 8 ounces wide
noodles, cooked, 1 10½-ounce can
tomato soup, ½ cup shredded
cheese.

Pan-fry onion in hot fat in a
skillet. Add ground beef and
brown thoroughly. Combine beef,
seasonings, noodles and soup in a
3-quart casserole. Top with shred-
ded cheese. Bake in a mod-
erate oven (350 degrees F.) for
30 minutes.

LIVER DUMPLINGS
(4 servings)
One-half pound liver, ¼ tea-
spoon marjoram, ¼ cup finely
chopped onion, 1 teaspoon salt, ½
cup soft breadcrumbs, ¼ cup flour,

1 egg, lightly beaten, 4 ounces
noodles, 3 cups beef bouillon.
Cook liver in salted water 10
minutes. Grind liver and combine
with marjoram, onion, salt,
crumbs, flour and eggs. Mix well.
Boil noodles in beef broth 8 min-
utes. Shape mixture into 1-inch
balls. Drop onto noodles. Cover.
Cook 10 minutes. Serve hot.

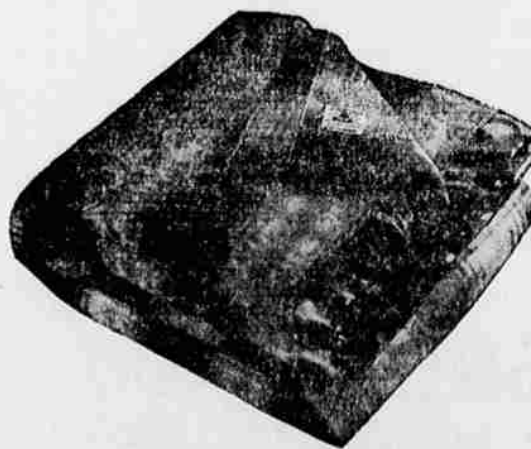
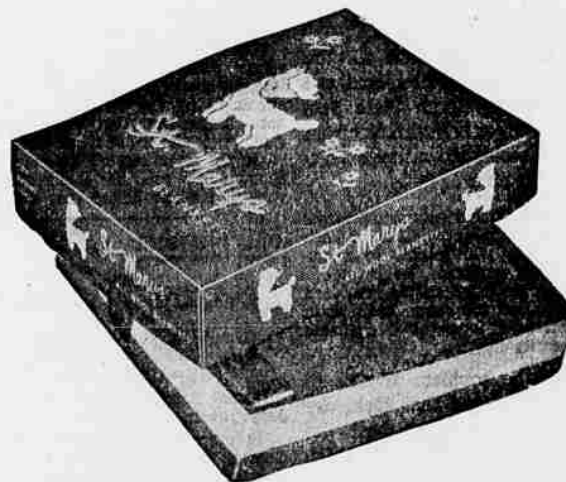
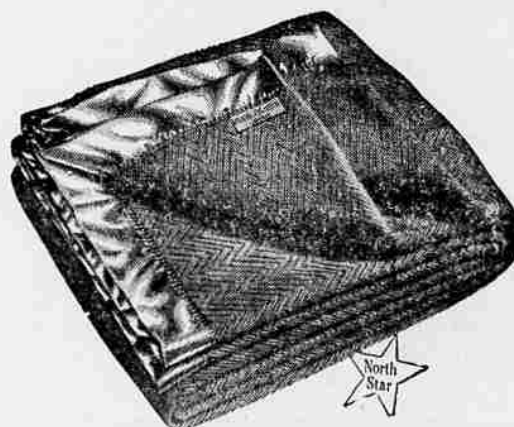
