History of Liturgical Music Is Traced

A mixed choir of 25 voices presented examples of all periods of church music at a recent meeting of the Catholic Daughters of America in Columbus hall.

Dale Cooley, who directed the group, traced the development of liturgical music from the time of the Apostles.

"Singing by the cantors was included in Jewish services before the time of Christ," Mr. Cooley said. "The first Christians continued the practice and devised suitable accompaniments for their own services."

Gregorian chant was the exclusive church music for centuries, Mr. Cooley said, and still is considered the supreme liturgical music model for modern composers. Modern composition is encouraged, he said, but not all modern music is suitable for church use.

County Democratic Women Elect Mrs. Hyde President

Mrs. Clarence Hyde was elected president of the Lane County Democratic Women at the annual meeting Thursday evening. Mrs. Hyde is well-known in Eugene for her church, social and political work. Other officers elected were Mrs. R. D. Randolph, vice-president; Mrs. V. N. Freeman, secretary, and Mrs. R. T. William, treasurer.

During the evening, Mrs. Freeman, who was a candidate for the state legislature, spoke on "How We Voted in November." Using large charts of each Lane County precinct, she compared the vote in the primary election to the general election percentage-wise.

"In order to find out how many Democrats went to the polls it was necessary to count them from the poll books," she said. According to the count, 26,056 Democrats went to the polls, out of 32,262 registered for 81% in Lane County; in Eugene 82% of the registered Democrats voted; in Springfield 75%, Cottage Grove 79%, and in the rest of the county 81%. Of those going to the polls in November, 46% were Democrats, 31% Republicans and 23% Independent and others.

Robert Y. Thornton, successful candidate for attorney general, was the only Democrat to receive more votes than the total Democratic

vote of 26,056. He received 21,307. Runners up were Dale Harlan, candidate for state representative with 24,897; Edith Green, candidate for secretary of state with 24,729.

Mrs. Freeman concluded that "from these figures it would seem that Democrats do not support their candidates even though those candidates were equal to, or superior to their opponents." She reported the following precincts had 90% or better Democratic vote: Eugene No. 44 and No. 48, Junction City No. 1, Alvadore, N. Davis, Fall Creek, Herman, Minerva, Mohawk, Walton, Wendling and S. Zumwalt.

Following the talk by Mrs. Freeman the group discussed the districting of counties for legislative representation.
