

Heilig to Show '3D' Films

dimensional movies will be shown at the Heilig Theater, it was announced this Friday by Manager Jack Heilig. The presentation will be a series of short subjects to the audience what the new can do. On the same program will be a conventional, flat "Rogue's March," filmed by the Khyber Pass and starring Peter Lawford.

PROJECTORS

3D films will show here for the first time from Friday through the weekend. The Heilig Theater is installing permanent installation of three-dimensional projection screening.

At the same time, it was learned the Evergreen Theater chain, which is the McDonald Theater, is installing plans for permanent installation of Natural Vision systems, at that theater, the projection equipment to synchronize two projectors remodeling of the booth soon may start.

Continuous three-dimension projection requires four projectors, more than the usual number now in movie booths.

The Heilig, in its demonstration next week, will have only the two projectors, so will call a three-minute intermission between each short subject for reel change.

SPECIAL GLASSES

Both Natural Vision and the system which will be utilized by the Heilig Friday require the use of polaroid glasses by the audience. These glasses, packed individually in sterilized packages, will be issued to a spectator as he enters the theater, then collected again on his way out.

The Heilig's system is British by invention and is produced under a process of Stereo Techniques, Ltd. This and other systems require a new screen, as well as extra projectionists and interlocking equipment to synchronize two projectors which simultaneously show a reel of film each.

PRICE INCREASED

The system which will be shown at the Heilig is now installed in the Liberty Theater in Portland, but will be shipped here after 3D closes there Feb. 16.

Special admission prices of \$1 for adults, 50 cents for children, will be in effect here during the three-dimension show.

The film industry is undergoing a minor revolution because of the newness of 3D, with almost every major studio scheduling 3D pictures. Some are making the same pictures in both the old and the new system, so movie houses with or without 3D equipment can show the film.

One 3D full length feature is already being shown around the nation. It is "Bwana Devil," filmed in Africa. Others in production include "Princess of the Nile," starring Marilyn Monroe, and one starring Rita Hayworth.

Trade Unions Sign Contracts

Two Eugene building trades unions Thursday reported new wage agreements with contractors' organizations.

Ray McInnis, secretary-treasurer of Local 85, International Hod Carriers, reported that the local has renewed its contract with the Eugene Masonry Contractors without change except for wage rates. Effective on Monday this week, the new rates provide a \$2.50 per hour basic pay scale for tending plasterers, bricklayers' tenders, all mason tenders, tile setter helpers, marble and terrazzo helpers and cement finishers. Mortar mixers, machine or hand, will be paid \$2.75 per hour under the agreement, McInnis said.

Some terms are still being considered for a full contract renewal between Local 85, Building Construction General Laborers of Eugene, and the Eugene General Contractors' Assn., McInnis reported. However, wage rates have been established as follows:

For handling and mixing all insulating material of irritating nature, \$2.25 per hour; gunnite nozzle men, \$2.60, and nozzle tenders, \$2.25; sandblasting and scouring of concrete, \$2.25; building laborers, \$2.00; sign and bulletin tenders, \$2.00; pipe layers, cribbing and shoring, grading for sewer work, \$2.15; form strippers on swinging scaffold, \$2.15; jackhammer men, \$2.15; pavement breakers, chipping gun, bush manner, vibrator operators and powdermen, including all power tool operators, unless otherwise listed, \$2.25; decontamination and pest control operators, \$2.25; concrete power buggy operators, \$2.15.

The laborers' contract also has been changed, McInnis said, to provide for automatic arbitration of disputes by a labor-management committee. Decisions will be required within 14 days, he said, and there will be no work stoppages while the disputes are being settled.

GOOSE COOKED WITH ELECTRICITY

Band Sets Ice Cream Sales To Finance Vacation Trek

The Eugene High band members will conduct a benefit ice cream sale this Sunday afternoon. Another sale will be held the following Sunday, Feb. 22.

The purpose is to raise funds to send the band to Bellingham, Wash., during spring vacation for a Northwest music educators' meeting. The Eugene High Band is one of three in Oregon invited to the affair.

The ice cream for sale will all be vanilla, because most orders are for this flavor, and more flavors might be difficult to sell. Byron Miller, band director, said Friday.

The Sunday sales are necessary, Miller said because of a near impossibility in finding cold storage space during the week. It is also the only day when all students and parents are able to help, and customers, mostly at home, are most receptive, Miller added.

The band hopes to sell 1,600 quarts each week, at a profit of 25 cents a quart, Miller said. The first Sunday, the sale will be held door-to-door east of Willamette St. and across the Ferry St. Bridge. The following Sunday, the sale will be west of Willamette St. and in the River Road area.

Rights Measure Forum Subject

Unitarian Church To House Meeting

Civil rights legislation in Oregon will be the subject of a public forum Monday, Feb. 16, at 7:45 p.m. in the Unitarian Church, 11th and Ferry Sts. Charles Duncan, chairman of a Voluntary Citizens' Committee, reported Friday.

The group will discuss Senate Bill No. 169, an act relating to "discrimination by places of public accommodation, resort or amusement because of race, religion, color or national origin; and providing remedies and penalties therefor."

Phil Dreyer, Portland, member of the executive board of the Oregon Committee for Equal Rights, will be on the panel. Dreyer was a member of the Oregon legislature in 1947.

Atty. H. V. Johnson, Eugene, president of the board of directors of Lane County Fellowship for Civic Unity, will present "the attitude of the citizens of Lane County" toward this proposed legislation.

Third member of the panel, Walter Dennis, is past president of the Oregon Motor Court Assn. Moderator will be Calvin Crumbaker, member of Eugene's city council.

The law would apply only to places of public accommodation, resort or amusement. The law expressly states that this includes only hotels, motels or motor courts, places offering to the public food or drink for consumption on the premises, or places offering to the public entertainment, recreation or amusement.

Debate Team Visiting 4 Cities

The University of Oregon symposium team will make appearances in four Oregon cities within the next several weeks, according to Herman Cohen, instructor in speech in the university and director of the team.

Wednesday afternoon three members of the team were to appear at Willamette High School in Eugene. The following Wednesday, Feb. 18, members will speak at Amity High School, at a meeting of the Tillamook Kiwanis Club and at Tillamook High School. They will appear before the Cottage Grove Lions Club on Feb. 26 and a special exhibition of debate will be conducted by the team at Junction City High School Feb. 19.

In each case, team members will discuss one of two topics: how we can best combat the communist menace in the United States, or Shall the Congress of the United States enact a compulsory fair employment practices law.

Among the members of the symposium team are Richard Bronaugh, Phil Cass, Bruce Holt, Donald Mickelwait and William Ruitel, all of Eugene.

Fleming waived preliminary hearing and was bound over to the grand jury by Judge Chester N. Anderson. Bail was set at \$1,500.

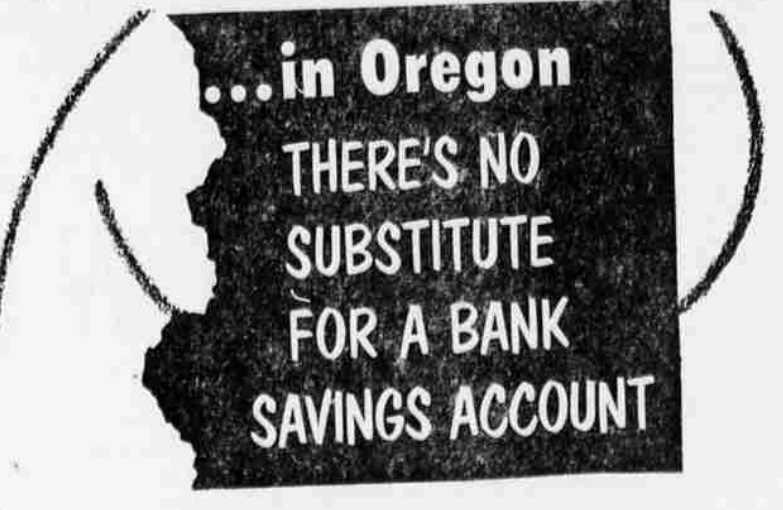
