

Oregon State Beavers Open Series With Indiana Quintet

Three undefeated collegiate basketball squads clash in doubleheaders at Gill Coliseum, Corvallis, Monday and at McArthur Court here Tuesday night with a total of close to 20,000 fans expected to witness the four contests.

The schedules:

- Gill Coliseum (Monday)—Oregon vs. Nebraska 7:30 p.m. Oregon State vs. Indiana 9:15 p.m.
- McArthur Court (Tuesday)—Oregon State vs. Indiana 7:30 p.m.; Oregon vs. Nebraska 9:15 p.m.

The Corvallis games will have the SRO sign hung up. The twin bill here is expected to have several thousand general admission tickets available.

Coach Branch McCracken's Indiana Hoosiers, NCAA champions last year, and Slat's Gill's OSC Beavers, unbeaten PCC title contenders, will risk their unbeaten records in the feature skirmishes.

Coach Harry Good's Nebraska Cornhuskers, beaten by Minnesota and 83-55 by OSC last Saturday, will challenge Bill Bor-

cher's unbeaten Oregon Webfoots. Oregon will likely be without the services of Jerry Ross, who dislocated a knuckle last week.

One of the side attractions

in the Indiana-OSC series will be the individual performances of two touted centers — Don Schlundt, 6-foot, 10-inch junior who was a second-team All-American last year for Indiana's title team; Wade "Swede" Halbrook, 7-foot, 3-inch OSC sophomore.

After the Indiana fracas, the Beavers will head east for Columbus, Ohio, and a scheduled game Saturday night with Ohio State. From there they will go to Raleigh, N. C. to play in the Dixie Classic next Monday Tuesday and Wednesday.

Oregon, Washington and Idaho also will be on the road. Oregon plays UCLA at Los Angeles Saturday and Monday nights, Washington will compete in the Big U tourney at Kansas City next weekend, and Idaho goes to Missouri for games next Monday and Tuesday nights with Montana.

The Washington State Cougars, who dropped three straight on last week's trip to California, will be idle until Jan. 2 when they will be host to Eastern Washington College.

Larson, Tribe Lead Offense

LOS ANGELES — University of California back Paul Larson ground out 1,572 yards of offense play during the past football season to win total offense honors in the Pacific Coast Conference, it was announced Monday.

Statistics released by the commissioner's office here disclosed that while Larson led in total yardage, Stanford's Bob Garrett, who was second with 1,502 yards, led in touchdown responsibility. He was credited with setting up 19 scoring plays to 11 for Larson.

Cleanies Win In Tag Match

Jack Kiser used his rolling arm scissors to whip Frank Getty in the opener.

★ Tuesday night's Eugene-Corvallis struggle took its toll with delayed effect when the two teams went into action again Friday. The Axemen followed that close 50-49 victory by bowing 55-52 to Grant — a team which earlier had lost 69-37 to Hank Kuchera's lads — Corvallis' return to action was a narrow 57-56 verdict over Seaside, a team that wasn't given an outside chance. . . . That makes it evident that both the Axemen and Spartans went "all out" in their game with the resultant letdown.

Grant's court, large by Portland standards but small when compared with those in the county, bothered the Axemen no little. The Generals must be credited with making good use of their advantage. . . . Speaking of gyms, the Axemen's new court promises to be the noisiest around. It was only about half-filled for the Corvallis game, yet the din was deafening. It's a classy layout, nevertheless, and needs but one improvement—the center stripe is so narrow it's almost invisible. Why not widen the line? It won't even take much paint.

Salem coach Harold Hauk is expected to have one of his toughest seasons in Big-Six League competition. In 15 years with the Viking cagers, Hauk has never had a team finish lower than second in Big-Six action. And he's won or shared title honors for the past seven seasons. This winter Eugene, Corvallis, and Albany, in particular, are expected to sorely test Hauk's ability to keep Salem from slipping below a runner-up position.

This year's Salem team doesn't boast as many good big men, but Hauk has another aggressive, ball-hawking crew led by Gordon Domogalla, Jim Knapp, Tom Pickens and Larry Springer. . . . Hauk doesn't know if he will do any more basketball coaching when he takes over as athletic director next year at the new South Salem high. Details aren't worked out yet, but the veteran mentor gave us the impression he will give up the cage chores but will keep the baseball coaching reins.

★ A couple of low foul contests have been brought to our attention. When Oakridge nipped Crater 48-46 two weeks ago, only 20 personals were whistled—10 against each team. In Mapleton's recent 50-48 overtime decision over Mohawk, there were 22 fouls, 10 on the Sailors and 12 on the Indians. . . . Incidentally Coach Dave Woodruff, whose Mapleton team shares the "B" lead with Coburg and Lowell, became a father for the third time when his wife gave birth to a girl early Wednesday morning.

Kent Hotaling, the only senior member of the Eugene basketball team last year, is a starting guard for the Willamette University frosh and recently was high-point for his club. . . . Harley Sittner, 6-7 Axemen cager who was overshadowed by Dean Parsons during his playing days, is back from the service and has added some 35 pounds. The extra weight is likely to make him a strong college basketball prospect.

Eugene radio station KUGN is broadcasting all Springfield basketball games with Woody Slater at the mike. The cast will be heard at 8 p.m. over FM with a 10:30 rebroadcast over AM. . . . Until Willamette's 81-50 win over McMinnville Friday night, official Bob Shisler could almost expect that any game he whistled would be a torrid one. His four assignments prior to that "easy" one included Oakridge's 80-76 nod over Pleasant Hill, Triangle Lake's 34-31 overtime victory over Siuslaw, Mapleton's 50-48 overtime verdict over Mohawk, and Eugene's 80-49 squeaker over Corvallis.

Oakridge center Paul Tucharit continues as the top individual scorer in the area with 137 points in five games. Pleasant Hill's LeRoy Carlson has 85 in four starts and Creswell's Joe Burris 96 in five games. For consistency, it's hard to beat Junction City's Ralph Johnson who has made exactly 12 points in each of his three performances.

Fort Ord Raps Marines 55-19

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP)—Fort Ord's Army Warriors smashed the Quantico Marines 55-19 in the Poinsettia Bowl football game here Sunday with a powerful ground attack that sent Ollie Matson, Lawrence Segovia and Dave Mann on long scoring runs.

Mann, former Oregon State Col-services' championship for Fort Ord, which had been rated No. 1 ahead of Quantico in No. 2 spot, on the basis of regular season play.

Matson, former San Francisco University and Chicago Cardinals star, playing at fullback, ran 72 and 13 yards for touchdowns.

Segovia, a halfback who played for Monterey, Calif., Peninsula Junior College before entering the service, galloped 77 yards.

Mann, for Oregon State College halfback, raced 39 and 28 yards for scores.

The soldiers from the training center in California started piling up the convincing margin within minutes after the opening kickoff. Halfback Bill Roffler, formerly of Washington State, broke away and ran 14 yards for a touchdown.

Fort Ord's only passing touchdown came in the same period when Don Heinrich, quarterback from the University of Washington, tossed eight yards to Ed Henke, who used to play with Southern California and the San Francisco Forty-Niners, in the end zone.

Corvallis Woman Captures U-Bowl All-Events Crown

Elsie Wojciechowski of Corvallis, on the strength of her ability to pick up spares, annexed the U-Bowl women's handicap all-events bowling championship Sunday in a roll-off against Ruby Callison of Eugene. The winner had already captured the singles title and had tied Miss Callison for the aggregate scoring crown.

Sporting an edge of 15 pins per game, the Corvallis came from behind after Miss Callison had taken a 39-pin lead in the first of the eight-game series.

Miss Callison, collecting three of her 18 splits during the afternoon, dropped out of the lead for keeps in the third game as the winner rolled a net 206 to Miss Callison's 152, and a 15-pin lead. The match was close until the sixth game, when the Corvallis champ took a 40-pin lead and increased it to 94 pins going into the final game.
