

Wildcat Strike Hits Waterfront

Longshore Union Closes N. Y. Port

NEW YORK (AP)—Angry longshoremen shut down virtually the entire Port of New York Friday in a wildcat strike in defiance of a federal court order.

The strike, an apparently unanimous walkout of International Longshoremen's Assn. (ILA) members without picket lines, appeared to be building up to the showdown between the ILA and the rival AFL-ILA in their six-month-old fight for domination of the New York waterfront.

AFL spokesmen, however, indicated they had no desire to close for a bloody fight with "the mob."

'VIOLATION OF LAW'

"Their battle is with the law," Ace Keeney, executive director of the AFL-ILA, said. "It's a complete violation of the law, and we expect the legal agencies to take care of it."

In the mammoth port, only a handful of piers were being worked by AFL longshoremen. Keeney said AFL dock workers could mean many of those presently closed down but "they didn't go to work, because they still have some fear."

Keeney expressed confidence that all the piers would be back at work before very long. He said some AFL men were presently presenting evidence to the National Labor Relations Board that "the mob came and told people" not to work.

FACE COURT ACTION

NLRB Regional Director Charles T. Douds said proof of any direction to strike would be taken promptly to court for contempt action.

Closed down tight were the luxury liner piers from 42nd to 57th St. on the North River, where longshoremen are still dominated by the ILA's "pistol local" 824 and passengers carried their own bags onto the Cunard liner Queen Elizabeth Friday morning.

Caracas Meeting Cheered by Talk

CARACAS, Venezuela (AP)—Delegates to the Inter-American Conference buckled down to the grind of committee work Friday in an atmosphere of optimism and unity following Secretary of State John Foster Dulles' statement of U. S. hemisphere policy.

The committees are studying political-legal matters, economic affairs, social problems and cultural topics.

Delegates from Guatemala, Argentina, Ecuador, Mexico and Nicaragua were listed to give policy statements at Friday's plenary session preceding committee meetings.

The statement from Guatemala's Foreign Minister Guillermo Toriello was awaited with particular interest since his government has been charged, particularly in the United States, with being much influenced by the Communists.

CITES RED MENACE
Dulles did not mention Guatemala, specifically in his policy address Thursday, but he hit hard at the theme that America must realize it is not immune from the Red menace. Not a single country, he declared, has been free from Communist penetration and the American republics must make clear their position to it.

Most Latin-American delegates expressed satisfaction with what they termed the frankness and earnestness of Dulles' speech, although many wished he had gone further into their specific economic problems.

Except for telling them that President Eisenhower's administration is opposed to artificial price ceilings on coffee and increases in U. S. import duties on wool, the secretary couched his economic remarks in general terms.

INCREASING FUNDS
He called on the Latin-American governments to avoid "unnecessary" obstacles to the inflow of foreign capital for economic development. He said plenty of private U. S. capital could be attracted to Latin America. Public financing, he told the delegates, should come primarily from the World Bank. He said the United States is increasing funds for technical assistance and cultural cooperation.

Dulles told the conference the U. S. Export-Import Bank also would finance sound and acceptable development projects not helped by the World Bank.

Dulles said the Communist danger for American republics mounts as long as they fail to make their position clear.

"The time has come," he asserted, "to make it clear with finality that we see that alien despotism is hostile to our ideals; that we unitedly deny it the right to prey upon our hemisphere and that if it does not heed our warning and keep away, we shall deal with it as a situation that might endanger the peace of America."

NO 'INTERFERENCE'
"What I suggest does not involve any interference in the internal affairs of any republic. There is ample room for natural differences . . . but there is no place here for political institutions which serve alien masters."

His remarks bore out reports that the U. S. delegation will press for a conference declaration calling for inter-American consultation whenever Communist infiltration appears to threaten the existence of any American government.

Six Marines Killed by Blast

Mortar Shell Explodes In Training Class

WITH 1ST MARINE DIVISION, Korea (AP)—Six U. S. Marines were killed and 25 were injured Thursday when a mortar shell exploded during a training class near the front, the division reported Friday.

The division said an instructor dropped a live shell which he apparently thought had been rendered harmless. The instructor was among those killed.

Names of the victims were withheld.

The division spokesman said the effects of the blast were magnified because the shell exploded inside a Quonset hut.

WINDOWS BLOWN OUT

Windows and doors were blown out and flying steel ripped through the curved sides of the building.

Doctors were flown to the scene. Every helicopter in the division was alerted to fly out the wounded—several of whom were in critical condition.

Some were flown to medical companies in the division, while others were flown direct to a Navy hospital ship in Inchon Harbor.

Other helicopters carried whole blood and medical supplies to help the victims.

FUSE DEMONSTRATION

Three of the men killed died en route to medical companies and a fourth died late Thursday afternoon.

The two others killed died Thursday night aboard the ship.

The Marine spokesman said the accident took place at the division's Mine Warfare School.

The instructor was demonstrating how an American fuse can be used on enemy ordnance.

VOTE ON BOND ISSUE

HERMISTON (AP)—Hermiston residents voted Friday on a \$187,000 bond issue for a new water reservoir and improvement of other water facilities.

Senators Quiz Farm Officials

WASHINGTON (AP)—Farm officials of the Eisenhower administration faced another barrage of questions Friday by senators opposed to their plan to make agricultural price supports less rigid.

But they got some takers of support, too, notably from Chairman Aiken (R-Vt.) of the Senate Agriculture Committee, who lauded Secretary of Agriculture Benson as an "honest man" and said his numerous congressional critics "are talking merely for political purposes and nothing else."

Aiken offered in support of his views voluminous charts which, he said, proved that 22 years of assorted farm programs had cost less than 500 million dollars a year.

"In my opinion it has been a good investment," he added.

Critical questions of senators about the chance of farm prices and income dropping lower under the new program took up most of a lengthy session of the committee Thursday.

True D. Morse, under secretary of agriculture, and Karl Loos, department solicitor, were called back Friday to explain a lengthy bill introduced by Aiken.

It covers main points of the Eisenhower program but Aiken said, "It is not an administration bill."

Key point of the Eisenhower proposal is to allow 90 per cent farm supports to expire at the end of this year, in favor of flexible price props at 75 to 90 per cent of parity.

Parity is a computed price aimed at giving a farm product a fair purchasing power in terms of things a farmer buys.

Sen. Young (R-ND) said in an interview that the first day's testimony and questions showed "they are a lot farther away from congressional acceptance than before."

He said he is convinced the flexible program would permit wheat prices "to drop as much as 33 cents a bushel below present
