Pope Pius XII

Although not a Roman Catholic, we share in the world-wide admiration for Pope Pius XII. During the war we had the extreme good fortune to be in one of the groups who were granted an audience with this great man. When the time came to leave his presence we weren't sure what the protocol was for a Protestant so we just shook his hand.

It is interesting to look back on this experience particularly when the hopes and prayers of millions of persons of all faiths focus in Vatican City where the Pope lies very ill.

From his sovereign State of the Vatican City, Pius XII has surveyed throughout his 15-year reign a world in disorder. Throughout the great world events of that reign, Pius XII has steadily advocated world peace.

U. S. Under Secretary of State Welles, who visited the heads of belligerent European states in 1940 as the special emissary of President Roosevelt, has commented:

What is perhaps not so well recognized is the quality of statesmanship which, at least in recent years, has distinguished the Vatican's policy. Pope Pius XII possesses that

quality in high degree. I found him profoundly saddened by the future he saw shaping so inevitably, and profoundly grieved by the barbarous inhumanity in so many regions of the world. . . . I left the Vatican with the conviction that one of the constructive forces working for the regeneration of mankind will be the present Pope and many of those about him.

Pius XII also has taken steps to "de-Italianize" the Catholic hierarchy. On Feb. 18, 1946 he created 32 new Cardinals, changing the makeup of the College of Cardinals from predominantly Italian to predominantly non-Italian for the first time in four centuries. At that time the Pope created four new U. S. Cardinals to bring the total to five. The new Cardinals were Spellman of New York City, Glennon of St. Louis, Stritch of Chicago, Mooney of Detroit. And on Jan. 12, 1953 the Pope elevated to the cardinalate John Francis McIntyre of Los Angeles, the first Cardinal from the U. S. West Coast in church history.

It is obvious great concern is felt for the life of Pius XII. We join with Roman Catholics all over the world and with others of all faiths who pray for the great man.

Central Pres. Observes Lent; Dr. Come Talks

The Rev. Byron D. Hughes, Associate Pastor, will preach at both services of Central Presbyterian Church, on "God Revealed." New members will be welcomed into the church at the 11 o'clock service.

The Senior High Westminster Fellowship meets in the Parish House at 6 p.m. for the third of a series of studies on the subject of "Jesus Christ."

Wednesday from 4:00 to 7:30 p.m. the Junior High Westminster Fellowship will meet in Fellowship Hall. Three "interest groups" will be started this week: (1) a music appreciation group, (2) a creative writing group, and (3) a workshop group. The young people have chosen the field in which they are most interested and will spend the next 10 to 12 weeks in one of these study groups.

A full schedule of activities during the Lenten season is planned at Central Presbyterian Church. Opening the series will be the Lewis and Clark College Choir of Portland which will present a sacred concert on March 7 at 8 p.m. in the church sanctuary. On March 14, an evening worship service will be conducted, with the Rev. Paul S. Mellish preaching on the subject "The Value of the Individual."

From March 21 through March 28 a Preaching Mission will be held in cooperation with the other local Presbyterian Churches—Fairmount and Westminster of Eugene, and First Presbyterian of Springfield. Dr. Arnold B. Come, Professor of Systematic Theology, San Francisco Theological Seminary, has been invited by the four churches. He will preach each evening at 7:30 with the exception of Saturday in the sanctuary of Central Presbyterian Church. Theme for the week will be "Christ, the Hope of the World." In addition to the evening meetings, Dr. Come will meet in all of the cooperating churches at specially arranged occasions.

A religious drama, "The Rock," will be presented on the evening of April 4 by the Senior High Westminster Fellowship. The group is being directed in this activity by Mr. and Mrs. Tom Colvin. On April 11, the sermon subject for the evening service will be "What Will You Do With Christ?"

Holy Week services will be held Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday nights. On Wednesday evening, Mr. Mellish will present a meditation upon "The Works of Jesus." Maundy Thursday will bring the annual Candlelight Communion service. On Good Friday, the senior choir will present the "German Requiem" by Brahms.

Ministerial Association meets again, Tuesday, Feb. 9, 10 a.m. at the Congregational Church. All ministers are welcome; this will be a routine meeting except for final plans for Good Friday and for Easter services.

Born in Ireland, Coulter moved with his parents to Canada when 11 years of age, where he resided until his educational career took him to Northwest Nazarene College, Nampa, Idaho, from which institution he received the Bachelor of Arts degree. Robert Kunz, pastor of Trinity Lutheran Church, Cottage Grove, will alternate in being guest speakers at the subsequent Sunday evening vespers.

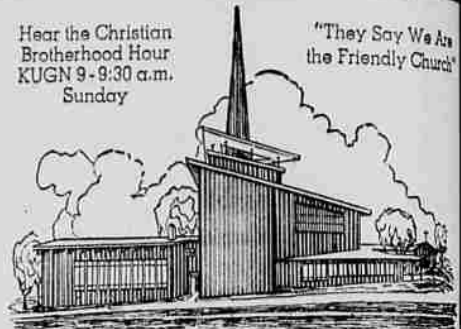

From Japan Comes Sermon At Assembly

Margaret E. Carlow, missionary to Japan, will be the 11 a.m. speaker at the First Assembly of God on 7th and B Sts., Springfield, according to the pastor, the Rev. Lester Carlsen. She will relate some of her experiences in Japan and will tell of the Assemblies of God work there.

Miss Carlow went to Japan in 1948, and was there for four years, at the city of Sendai in northern Honshu. Miss Carlow was the first evangelical missionary to be stationed in that needy city of 450,000 after the war. Sendai is the educational, industrial and strategic center of the six northern prefectures of Honshu.

During the time Miss Carlow was stationed at Sendai, a small church was opened there, as well as two outstations. There are now three completely departmentalized Sunday schools in that area in operation weekly and another monthly with a combined attendance of more than 500. At the conclusion of her furlough period, Miss Carlow plans to return to Japan and her work at Sendai.

At present Miss Carlow is visiting various churches of the Assemblies of God presenting the needs of the mission field of Japan and to raise funds for a church building and kindergarten in Sendai. At present services are being conducted in the missionary residence at Sendai.

The Rev. Lester Carlsen extends a cordial invitation to the public to hear Miss Carlow.

Lutheran Hour Doctrinal Talk Explains Faith

Answering the challenging question, "If God is Love, how can he permit so much evil, sadness and cruelty to exist in the world?" the Rev. Edwin Piepoff of Detroit will consider one of the fundamental stumbling blocks to the acceptance of the Christian faith tomorrow (Sunday, March 7) on The Lutheran Hour. His message entitled "Love, the Most Durable Power in the World" will be aired over the Mutual network and affiliated stations.

The Lutheran Hour speaker will say that while love is recognized as the greatest human value, "experiences teach us that love can fail tragically" because human beings are incapable of perfect love. "Here is a mother's love becoming unwise, over-indulgent and possessive, and the result is a spoiled child," he will illustrate.

"Christians, however, are committed to a gospel of love. While men cannot love perfectly, God does, the radio speaker will assert. "Life is not a perpetual Sunday School picnic. The diamond cannot be polished without friction, nor man perfected without trials."

Students Alert To Summer Jobs Need

If spring comes, can summer vacation be far behind? Or to come right down to earth with it: University students right now are pondering their summer vacation employment.

Immediately numerous persons and organizations bestir themselves to offer him various opportunities. The campus religious groups are active right now in arranging projects in which the working student can develop experience and earn money while serving others and intensifying his Christian knowledge.

"Vacation—so what?" is the discussion theme, for instance, at Christian House with Eileen Lindblad, campus YWCA secretary, moderating . . . the campus Y groups are presently campaigning to enlist as many students as possible in Christian work and service projects rather than spend their time and money worthless. The students are being acquainted with the opportunities in Oregon and other states as well as foreign countries, through slides and speakers who have served in the camps and other projects.

The University Chaplain association, organized and headed temporarily by Joan Hutchon, Danforth Fellow at U of O, met again this week. The group which includes chaplains of all living groups will serve as a liaison body of all religious activities in order to bring information into living organizations.

One of the current plans of the group is to organize ten minute morning devotions in all living organizations during the examination week. Another project is group study to better the religious understanding of the chaplains themselves. The first of the studies is made of comparative religions. Later the study of such questions as how to bring a higher religious tone into the living organizations during rushing week has been scheduled. This project is under the direction of Dr. Paul B. Means, head of the University religion department.

Sunday morning the program at Christian House will start with the Donut Hour, 9:15 a.m., followed by two Bible classes taught by Dr. Victor P. Morris and Clarence H. Elliott.

"Vacation—So What?" will be the theme for the 5:30 p.m. discussion with Miss Eileen Lindblad, campus YWCA executive secretary. She will review the pamphlet "How to Invest Your Summer" and will lead a panel discussion by students who have participated in such summer service projects as work with migrants, students in industry, and the inter-racial community centers.

Students from Christian House will present the evening church program at 7:45 p.m. at Junction City Christian Church with Bob Randall, president of Christian House, in charge. The 9 to 10 held March 14 through the 18th.

p.m. international fireside will be on the subject of "France."

The annual election of officers will be by ballot throughout Sunday and Monday, 10 a.m. to 10 p.m.

Sunday, at 9:45 a.m., Koinonia Klass, college student group, will meet at First Methodist Church. The 6 p.m. Sunday evening program at Wesley Foundation in Gerlinger Hall will feature a discussion of the problems surrounding inter-faith and inter-racial marriages.

Tuesday evening's program will start at 5:30 p.m. with a potluck supper followed by the concluding program in our series on "Understanding Our World Community." International students will discuss the impact of Christianity in their countries.

Wednesday, at 12:30 p.m., regular chapel services will be held in Gerlinger Hall, led by Bob Hastings, junior in speech.

Sunday, at 9 a.m., a coffee hour will be held at Westminster House after which the Bible class will continue its study of Christian doctrine under the leadership of Bob Dean. Transportation to local Presbyterian churches for the 11 a.m. service is available.
