The sum of \$200 was awarded to each camp, the money to be used by the boys for a needed central flagpole and flag. Actual proceeds of the fashion show were a little less than \$400, but the difference will be made up out of the League treasury. Members also voted to give \$100 to the Eugene symphony; \$180 will be given to the Pearl Buck School to keep one retarded child in school for the remaining months of this school year.
