'Round the World French Veto Power Demand Delays Agreement on Saar

BONN, Germany (AP)—A new French demand for veto power over German economic relations with the Saar has interrupted the latest effort to settle the long French-German quarrel over the rich border territory.

Disclosing this Tuesday, German officials said the two powers in secret negotiations have reached general agreement over the political future of the Saar.

But the new French demand on economic rights has created gloom here over chances of any early agreement to remove the Saar dispute as a barrier to French approval of the European army plan, they said.

The French insist on a settlement of the Saar question before they agree to vote on the project to create a one-uniform European army that would include German soldiers.

Hands-Off Policy

BUENOS AIRES, Argentina (AP)—President Juan D. Peron has announced a new hands-off policy toward labor-management wage negotiations. Speaking over a nation-wide radio hookup Monday, Peron urged quick agreement on new contracts between the powerful general confederation of labor and members of the employers' group.

Gets Belongings

MUNICH, Germany (AP)—A German court has decided Adolf Hitler's former housekeeper, Mrs. Anni Winters, is entitled to part of the personal belongings of the Nazi fuhrer confiscated from her home in 1950.

Film Strike Threatened

LONDON (AP)—A film laboratory workers' wage dispute threatened Tuesday to paralyze Britain's big movie industry. The British Film Producers Assn. announced that work on 15 major pictures will halt April 9 unless the lab workers dispute is settled before then.

Hemingway in Venice

VENICE, Italy (AP)—Author Ernest Hemingway arrived in his beloved Venice Tuesday to rest up on "wine and shrimps" from his nearly disastrous hunting trip in Africa. Hemingway and his wife escaped with only minor injuries from two successive airplane crashes in Uganda last January.

Thousands of Japanese Buried in Iwo Jima Caves

IWO JIMA (AP)—Unknown thousands of Japanese soldiers lie buried in honeycombed caves beneath Iwo Jima while American marines ironically practice on the 8-year-old battlefield to defend Japan.

An Air Force captain who has studied the fantastic underground defenses said "I've seen at least 5,000 bodies."

A Marine engineer said "There may be 10,000 bodies here. We all know there were 20,000 Japanese here and only a handful got off. It stands to reason the rest are still down in the caves."

Capital Hikers Get Early Start For Long Lap

FORT FREDERICK, Md. (AP)—After a night of camping in the open, Supreme Court Justice William O. Douglas and 22 companions hit the trail early Tuesday on their 184-mile hike along the Chesapeake and Ohio Canal to Washington.

The day's walk of about 26 miles was scheduled to take them as far as the Potomac Fish and Game Club at Falling Waters, W. Va., one of the longest single stretches since they left Cumberland, Md., last Saturday. It will put them within 100 miles of Washington, which they plan to reach by Saturday afternoon.

To keep it on the level, the starting point for Tuesday's hike was Ernstville, about four miles northwest of here where the main body stopped walking Monday at 5 p.m. and rode into camp in the truck accompanying the party.

The reason, said Douglas, was because they got a late start from the Woodmont Rod and Gun Club, where they spent the previous night. They started at 7 a.m., two hours earlier Tuesday, riding the truck back to Ernstville and walking from there.

The hike resulted from a challenge by the outdoors-loving justice to two Washington editorial writers who had favored a plan to construct a federal parkway along the route. Douglas contended it would mar the area's natural beauties and invited them to come along with him and see. They accepted.

Fire, Blasts Wreck Plant

CHICAGO (AP)—Fire and a series of explosions wrecked a chemical plant Monday and sent billowing clouds of black smoke hundreds of feet into the air. The company estimated the loss at one million dollars.

Two men lost their lives.

Firemen found the body of Robert Friedel, 29, of suburban Downers Grove, in the wreckage of the Pelron Corp. plant in Lyons, southwest of Chicago.

Lester Heavrin, 35, of suburban McCook, died of injuries several hours later.

The cause of the fire was not determined.

RANK REVEALED

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Marine Corps Monday ended published speculation about the reserve rank of Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis) by stating that he is a lieutenant colonel and has been for a year.

The bodies are not buried. They rest where the men died or were carried.

The caves have been placed off limits by the military. However, many bodies have been uncovered accidentally by demolition squads exploding old ammunition and sealing off caves for maneuvers by the 3rd Marine Division—part of the American force committed to the defense of Japan.

Marine Maj. Roland M. Daly of Spokane, Wash., reported sealing off two caves, one with 600 bodies and the second with up to 1,400. Although his estimates were hasty and probably high, demolition men report finding some bodies in almost every big cave.

The caves are littered with old and dangerous ammunition and explosives.

EXTENSIVE STUDY

Chaplain Capt. George S. Bieber, Williamsburg, Pa., has made an extensive study of the underground positions since he came to the island in October, 1953. He has mapped 18 fantastic underground honeycombs scattered over the five mile long island. He has made no effort to map the hundreds of smaller caves.

He is confident he is on the track of the General's Cave, last command post of Lt. Gen. Tadamichi Kuribayashi, who defended the island to the death. The general's fate has never been conclusively proved. With him may be documents detailing the full grim picture of the underground defense.

MANY SUICIDES

Many bodies rest where men committed suicide. Some line passageways where they were placed in an effort to keep the Marines from determining the extent of Japanese casualties. Some wounded were apparently simply abandoned to die. Some are found in the bunks in the side of the caves.

Many Japanese were buried in mass graves after the marines seized the island. Bodies later were taken from some of the caves and buried. But many caves—including the mysterious General's Cave—were never located, or even suspected.

Some of the caves extend seven levels down, literally honeycombing the volcanic island.

Bieber's studies of the caves have become more or less official.

He has had to use oxygen on one of his deep explorations. The caves are oppressively hot and sulphur fumes fill many.

The intense heat and the sulphur may have preserved some bodies.

When the island fell, Marines sealed off hundreds of caves.

Erosion and earthquakes reopen the passages. Blasting to seal one entrance may reopen others. And the depths of many of the caves have never been reached. One blast recently set off a chain reaction and explosions continued for hours.

WATCH BLACKENED

Bieber found one laboratory which had apparently been scorched by a flamethrower. The doctor was there with a blackened stethoscope and wristwatch. Burned vials, medicines and microscopes lined the cave wall.

Bieber found one Japanese wearing a uniform with no insignia. By him was a message which told the defenders of Iwo Jima to prepare themselves since much United States activity had been noticed around Okinawa.

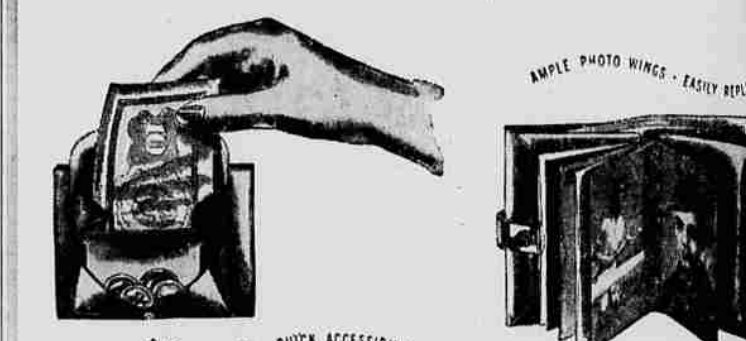
