Atomic Power Lecture Topic

"Prospects of Atomic Power" will be discussed by Dr. R. T. Ellickson, head of the University of Oregon's physics department, Wednesday night in the browsing room of the Erb Memorial Union.

Discussion leader for the 7:30 lecture will be Dr. F. E. Dart, assistant professor of physics.

Dr. Ellickson, who is also associate dean of the university's graduate school, has spent almost five years in research on his subject. From 1946 to 1948 he was with the Naval Research service; he won a Radiation Laboratory contract for the year 1943; he served as a research engineer for United Aircraft in 1941, and he also did research for RCA communications in 1943. In the summer of 1952, he did research at the Chicago Midway Laboratories.

Before coming to the university, Dr. Ellickson taught at the Polytechnic Institute of Brooklyn and at Reed College. He is a member of the American Assn. of Physics Teachers, the New York Academy of Science and Sigma Xi. In 1952-53 he served as chairman of the physics and mathematics section of the Oregon Academy of Science.

Voters' League Plans Civil Liberties Forum

Representatives of several businesses and professions will take part next week in a forum to inquire "Are Our Civil Liberties Endangered?" The forum, sponsored by the Eugene League of Women Voters, will be in the Wheeler Room of the First Congregational Church at 8 p.m. Wednesday, April 21.

The speakers will discuss the problem from their own points of view, but will not pose as representatives of their business professions. Fred Beard of Koke-Chapman will speak from the point of view of business; Douglas Spencer will speak from the lawyer's point of view; Howard Dean, assistant professor of political science at the University of Oregon, will speak for teachers. Representatives from the clergy, the veterans organizations and organized labor will be picked later.

Political Data Sheets Available From League

Interview sheets filled out by candidates for party nomination to public office are now available from the Eugene League of Women Voters.

The sheets contain the answers to questions posed by League Representatives. Only candidates who have opposition in the May primaries were included in the spring collection of material.

The sheets, which cost 5 cents a set, may be obtained from Mrs. William Pierron at 5-6215, or may be picked up Friday and Saturday at the League-operated registration booth at Sears.

Communicable Diseases High During March Period

Communicable diseases reported to the Lane County health department during March more than doubled the number reported for the same period a year ago.

According to a monthly report, 57 cases of measles were reported as against only 8 cases in March, 1953. Some 30 cases of mumps were reported. Only 4 cases were reported a year ago.

Infectious hepatitis continued to be high on the list with 12

reported cases. There were 125 cases of communicable diseases reported last month as against 51 during March a year ago.

Births in the county continued to exceed deaths by more than five to one. There were 383 births and 74 deaths.

Principal cause of death was heart disease which claimed 30 lives. Other main causes of death were: strokes, 9; diseases of early infancy, 6; miscellaneous accidents, 7; cancer 8.

It passed and sent to the Senate a resolution calling for a recess starting next Thursday afternoon and ending at noon Monday, April 26.

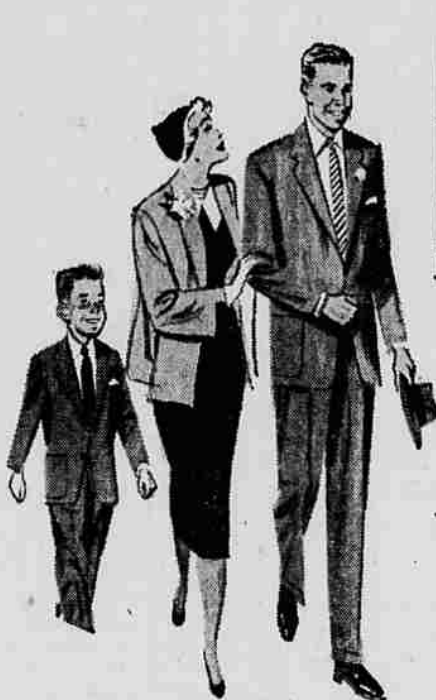
