Hubert Urges Men to Drink Milk

Although most mothers see their children get enough they often get far less than they need themselves, according to Mrs. M. Kolstorn, Oregon College extension nutritionist. She said that women—particularly the older ones—consumed less milk than any other group in the U.S. department of agriculture study. A whole family will benefit from the liberal use of milk and products in meals, the nutritionist reminded. Among favorites she suggested for including milk in the diet are soups, custards, white ice cream, milk sherbet, these diets. The money spent, milk much food value, she said. In low cost diets, much should be included for women as well as the men and children in the family, Miss Kolstorn concluded.

THE CAMERA CORNER

Keeping your camera steady during exposure, and having it accurately focused, are two essentials in sharp pictures. . . . but there's a third ingredient that's equally important. That is correct exposure.

When you over-expose a negative, it's pretty much like using a fountain pen that feeds too much ink. You know what happens then. Instead of a fine sharp line on the paper, the ink soaks out and results in a series of small but smudgy blots. The writing lacks sharp detail or definition.

The same thing happens when too much light strikes the negative in your camera because of over-exposure. Instead of a sharp, clean image you get a heavy, blurry image on the negative. This just won't produce a good print, no matter how careful the developing.

Under-exposure results in an equally bad print from the negative, but this time because there's not enough light to make the necessary impression. If there's any picture at all, it will lack definite shadows and details. Sometimes this can be corrected a little during the developing, but only if the margin of error in the exposure was pretty small.

The question was raised if Mr. and Mrs. Fred Lowe are trying to start a new type of English Bulldog with their eight-month-old miniature, "Soda Fizz." At home "Fizz" takes the short cut by walking under her brother and sister instead of detouring around them, but she made up for a strenuous day of following them around, by snoring during the meeting after making the acquaintance of members. "Talisman's Bit of Fashion," Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Johnson's Boxer, was at the meeting to represent the many Boxer owners of the club. Another German Shepherd, "Shane," who "owns" Mr. and Mrs. Glen Bryan, was there to model how the well-mannered dog behaves at a busy meeting.

The spotlight was turned on the star of the evening, Mr. and Mrs. Alan Shelmerdine's nine-month-old Bedlington Terrier, "Mr. Tut of Valgo." Explaining the lamblike appearance of the Bedlington, Mr. Shelmerdine demonstrated how they are clipped and trimmed for show appearance. The coat is curly and silky and with maturity becomes liny, never wiry. Trimming is not as difficult as it might appear and the owner easily can learn to do it himself, the very thin ears with their silk tassels at the tip giving the trimmer the most concern. Bedlingtons are classed as Terriers and make splendid house pets, as they neither shed nor have any doggy odor and have the vim and sparkle of the Terrier breed. Also they will attack rats, badgers, otters or any other vermin with courage and enthusiasm second to none. Colors are liver, sandy and blue. Mr. Tut is a blue.

Bedlington's More Numerous In the past, Bedlingtons have not been too numerous at dog shows, but this year they are turning out in larger numbers, making competition easier to find, although most of them are young dogs. Attention was drawn to the breed in 1948 when a Bedlington owned by Mr. and Mrs. William Rockefeller, "Ch. Rock Ridge Night Rocket," made a brilliant

show record by winning Best in Show at the famed Morris and Essex Kennel Club's show, and dogdom's most-coveted crown, Best in Show at the Westminster Kennel Club's show at Madison Square Garden in New York. The club voted to include a Local Class Only again in this year's show, after the highest record entry for Northwest shows made by Lane County in the 1953 show. This class goes through the same procedure as in the regular open show, from local class winners through to group winners and on to local Best in Show. Although no points are given for this class, ribbons and trophies are awarded for most of the classes. The same judge who judges Best of Show for the regular show dogs, also judges the Best Local Dog in Show. All dogs entered for the local class must be purebred registered dogs or available for registration, which includes an additional small fee if not already registered. They must be entered in the regular show at the regular entry fee, but there will be no additional fee charged for the added entry in the local class for the Labor Day Annual Dog Show.

Final plans were made for Eugene Club's second Obedience Sanction Match May 9 in the 4H building at the Lane County Fairgrounds. R. H. Hatfield of Portland, who made many friends in Eugene when he judged the first Sanction Match here, also will judge the second match. Many local dogs are expected to participate, following a recent obedience training class held here. A small entry fee is asked for each dog to help defray expenses of the building. Further information may be had by calling the secretary, Mrs. Lowe, 6-1486.
