

Kidnap Officer Guilty of Lying

KANSAS CITY (AP)—A federal court jury has convicted Louis Shoulders, the veteran police officer who broke the Greenlease kidnaping case, of lying about the handling of the ransom money.

A half year ago Shoulders, who spent more than a quarter of a century on the St. Louis police force, was hailed as a hero after he arrested Carl Austin Hall. Hall and his partner, Mrs. Bonnie Brown Heady, were executed for kidnaping and killing 6-year-old Bobby Greenlease.

Thursday the federal grand jury found Shoulders guilty of lying about his handling of two money-stuffed suitcases found in Hall's room. Shoulders was charged with committing perjury in testimony early this year before a federal grand jury. He maintained the suitcases were brought into the police station 15 to 20 minutes after Hall was booked. The government said they weren't brought in until more than an hour later.

\$300,000 MISSING
Of the \$600,000 ransom money paid to Hall by Robert C. Greenlease, wealthy Kansas City automobile dealer, \$303,720 still is missing.

The former police lieutenant was granted 15 days in which to file a motion for a new trial. Sentence was deferred pending possible filing of the motion. The maximum penalty is five years imprisonment and \$2,000 fine.

Shoulders was the second person convicted as the result of a grand jury investigation into the missing ransom money. Elmer Dolan, patrolman who aided in the arrest of Hall, also was convicted on a perjury charge. Dolan, suspended by the St. Louis police force, has filed a motion for a new trial.

While waiting for the verdict, Shoulders remarked:
SHOWS NO EMOTION
"If this jury is out more than an hour I'm fried. It wouldn't take them that long to give me an acquittal."

When the jury returned its verdict after 2 1/2 hours of deliberation, Shoulders displayed no emotion.
"See, I predicted it right, didn't I," he said. "That's what I thought would happen. What else can I say?"

Shoulders resigned in anger from the St. Louis force last year after the police board began an inquiry into Hall's arrest. The kidnaping of Bobby Greenlease took place in Kansas City Sept. 28. He was killed the same day.

Access to File Suit

Board Buys Chairs, Desks

The Eugene School Board this week purchased about \$14,000 worth of pupil chairs and desks and other furniture.

The equipment was purchased through bids, with the low bids being accepted. The Cohan Co. of Portland was awarded a bid of \$1,160.34 for 233 13-inch pupil chairs; Lowman and Hanford of Portland, \$1,806.01 for 313 pupil chairs, 17-inches; and Shearer of Portland, \$2,088.96 for 384 15-inch pupil chairs.

Cohan's also won a bid for 152 chair-desks, 17-inches, at \$1,725.20; Lowman and Hanford, \$2,733.75 to supply 675 17-inch folding chairs; Valley Stationery of Eugene, \$1,060.45 for 127 17-inch teacher chairs; Cohan's \$1,692.18 for 34 teachers' desks.

Several other bids were awarded for smaller amounts of other furniture at lesser total prices.

'Round the World Yugoslavia, Turkey Agree On Outright Military Alliance

ANKARA, Turkey (AP)—Yugoslavia's visiting President Tito has agreed tentatively to form an outright military alliance with Turkey, NATO's easternmost member. He plans to press Greece, another NATO neighbor in the Balkans, to join in the plan.

The decision was announced Thursday night by Yugoslav Foreign Minister Koca Popovic as a climax to the state visit here by the Communist leader who has defied Moscow and leagued his country with the West.

Popovic said Greece's approval is necessary for the alliance since the three Balkan neighbors, in a pact signed Feb. 2, 1953, agreed to consult each other on military matters.

In Athens, a foreign ministry spokesman confirmed that military representatives are exploring the possibility of expanding the three-nation agreement into a full-fledged military pact.

The Athens Foreign Office said Tito is expected to visit Greece in June.

Japanese Voice Fears
TOKYO (AP)—The Japan Fishery Board said Friday it feared that U.S. hydrogen bomb tests have contaminated the Pacific with radioactivity for 3,000 miles east and west of Bikini Atoll.

It said Japanese fishing boats 2,200 miles southwest and 1,000 miles northeast of the Bikini Atoll test site had become radioactive.

Snakes Invade Home
FERRARA, Italy (AP)—Mario Tabellini saw snakes Thursday night—and hadn't even had his supper wine. First, four of them crawled into his farm kitchen. He killed them, then pulled aside some bricks to see how they came up from the cellar. When he was through, he had killed 82 non-poisonous snakes, up to 4 feet long, that had awakened from winter hibernation.

Strike Averted
HAMBURG, Germany (AP)—The Transport Workers Union Thursday night announced acceptance of an arbitration wage grant averting a strike of 27,000 dock workers in all West German seaports.

The union said its members had agreed on a pay increase of about 9 1/2 cents which increases daily pay to about \$3.35 in North and Baltic Sea ports.

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Egypt Orders Crackdown On Newsmen

CAIRO, Egypt (AP)—Egypt's military regime cracked down Thursday night on its chief newspaper opposition. It abolished the press syndicate which took care of publisher-worker interests and charged papers and newsmen with taking secret pay from politicians of ex-King Farouk's time.

The ruling Revolutionary Council ordered a ministerial committee under Guidance Minister Maj. Salah Salem to take over the outlawed group's activities until regulations are drafted for a new syndicate.

The government announcement did not say what action would be taken against 14 newspapers and 24 newsmen it accused of getting secret subsidies. It was reliably reported, however, they would not be permitted to carry on journalistic work.

The council said they were paid from secret government funds.

Among those listed as having taken subsidies from the old ministers was the syndicate president, Hussein Abul Fath, director of Al Misri, one of Cairo's major morning papers and onetime organ of the now outlawed Wafdist Party.

The announcement said the Egyptian press "undoubtedly included elements affected by the corruption of the past era" of Farouk, who was forced to abdicate and exiled in 1952 by the young military leaders who now make up the Revolutionary Council.

BRITONS PAY MORE

LONDON (AP)—Britain's cost of living has climbed back to the postwar high it hit in March, 1953. The Ministry of Labor reported Thursday the index rose one point in March.

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Tablets Cleared

LANSING, Mich. (AP)—It's legal to sell vitamin tablets in vending machines in Michigan.

The attorney general's office so held Saturday in an opinion pointing out that courts in other states have approved on grounds that vitamins are food supplements and not drugs.

Choose India

NEW DELHI, India (AP)—Fifteen more North Korean and Chinese war prisoners who refused repatriation after the Korean truce will settle in India, defense ministry sources said Thursday. The future of 53 others, who have expressed preference to live in Mexico, Switzerland, Sweden and Argentina, still is unsettled.

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
