## Greek Orthodox Bishops Not Coming

(From The Christian Century)

Here is a Religious News Service dispatch from Athens dated May 10: "Three metropolitans of the Greek Orthodox Church have declined to serve as delegates to the Second Assembly of the World Council of Churches in Evanston, Illinois. The metropolitans, Panteleimon of Salonica, Amvrosios of Phthiotis and Agathonikos of Kalavrita, had been named members of a 14-member delegation to the World Council meeting."

The R.N.S. dispatch gives no reason for the withdrawal of these Greek bishops beyond the fact that "the question as to whether bishops should represent the Greek church at World Council meetings and on its committees has been the subject of debate in holy synod circles." We have no information to supplement this not-too-enlightening comment. It is not possible, therefore, to speak with confidence regarding what is behind this regrettable decision by the bishops to leave Greek representation to laity.

Several possibilities, however, occur to mind. It could be that the bishops do not wish to face the question of alleged persecution of the Greek Evangelical Church, raised by the moderator of the General Assembly of that church in a letter published in our May 5 issue, and commented on editorially in that same issue. Our readers will remember that Dr. Hadjiantoniou specifically named Bishop Panteleimon as "the chief cause of most of our troubles."

It is also possible, as the R.N.S. dispatch hints, that back of this withdrawal is the old question, hotly debated in Greece, as to how a church claiming to be the only "one true church" can participate in the actions of an ecumenical body which recognizes all its 160 members as true churches. In any event, this decision by the bishops to stay away from Evanston casts more doubt on the always doubtful status of the relation of Orthodox churches to the World Council.

## Temple Has New Pastor, H. L. Adams

Lighthouse Temple at last Sunday's services announced the selection of a new minister, the Rev. Harold L. Adams, now of a church in Long Beach, Calif. He will arrive in Eugene for his first service, July 4.

The Rev. Harvey Klapstein, president of Bible Standard Institute, will act as supply pastor until the new pastor arrives. Lighthouse Temple founded 42 years ago, is the first and largest of three Open Bible Standard churches in the Eugene area. In all there are 10 churches in the Emerald Empire area.

The Rev. and Mrs. W. C. Cole, former co-pastors, have not announced their plans. The new pastor has traveled extensively, visiting and preaching in 11 Western European countries. For five years he was associated with the Christ for America movement as a Regional Director with offices in Detroit, Michigan and Oakland, California. During the war he was director of a Christian Service Organization in Santa Ana, Calif., for servicemen. The Rev. Mr. Adams' family, Mrs. Adams, Bob and Judy, are a help to him in the musical programs, both in vocal and instrumental selections. Bob, 19, is a pianist and Judy, 11 years old, is a vocalist as well as a marimba player.

Harold L. Adams was one of the charter members of the Open Bible Standard movement and has had ordination papers with them since its beginning.

## Baptists Will Prepare Now For 1955 Trip

The year 1955 will be a memorable one in the history of the Baptist World Alliance. The Ninth World Congress, marking the Alliance Jubilee, takes place next year in London from July 16 to 22. The New York office of Poly Tours, world-wide travel organization, is preparing to assist delegates and visitors from the United States with their travel arrangements.

Harry Gubbins, office manager of Poly's branch at 274 Madison Avenue, New York City, said his staff is available to arrange hotel space and trans-Atlantic travel by air or sea, and to advise on passports, health documents, insurance and currency formalities. The present trans-Atlantic minimum round trip tourist fares to Britain are, by ship, \$350; by air, \$522, Mr. Gubbins said.

For those who wish to combine the Congress with a vacation in Britain or in Europe, Poly Tours has composed three post-Congress tours of 20 days' duration by motor coach operating from London on July 23. Special literature describing these tours and their all-inclusive costs can be obtained by writing Mr. Gubbins.

During Congress week it is expected many visitors will want to take short trips around London to see the city, St. Paul's Cathedral, historic Westminster Abbey, or Windsor Castle. These can be arranged in advance as well as trips to Canterbury, Oxford and the Shakespeare Country, at Mr. Gubbins' office, or at the Visitors Travel Bureau to be operated jointly by Poly Tours and the Baptist Holiday Fellowship at Baptist Church House, Central Hall or Albert Hall in London.

Poly Tours' Congress Department will also prepare individual quotations and itineraries for independent travel in Britain, Europe and the Holy Land.

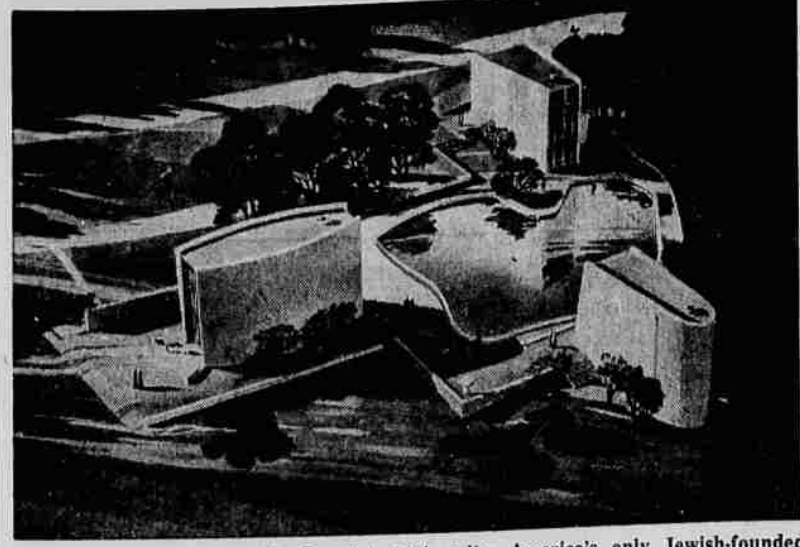
## BSI Grads Get Honors

## 'Treasurer's Report' Given On Great Charitable Drives

More than 155,000,000 pounds of United States surplus food—given by the American people through their government for free distribution to the destitute and hungry overseas—were distributed to these victims of war, famine and disaster through agencies of Protestant, Roman Catholic and Jewish faiths during the year ended April 30, 1954.

This surplus food—butter, cheese, and powdered milk valued at \$52,226,015—represented more than 87 per cent of all such surplus foods distributed abroad during the last year by all American voluntary relief agencies.

Of the remainder, 7.6 per cent—13,660,000 pounds valued at \$3,870,850—was distributed through the Cooperative for American Remittances to Everywhere, Inc. (CARE) and 5.3 per cent—9,545,000 pounds valued at \$3,424,292—through eight other non-sectarian agencies.

This was made known today in the quarterly report to its membership by the American Council of Voluntary Agencies for Foreign Service, 20 West 40th Street, New York City, in which are represented 46 agencies for overseas relief and service registered and recognized by the United States government.

Total of the surplus food released by the United States Commodity Credit Corporation for free distribution during this period was slightly in excess of 179,000,000 pounds, with a total value of \$5,521,157.

Distribution of the large amounts of foodstuffs by the faith groups was through their existing overseas networks of relief personnel and associated religious agencies in 37 countries abroad, and was carried out, religious agency leaders here said, in addition to their on-going worldwide regular schedules of relief programs.

All handling costs of the "operation surplus," they said, were defrayed by voluntary contributions of their religious constituencies—in Protestant churches largely through the United Appeal and "One Great Hour of Sharing," in the Roman Catholic Church through "The Bishops' Fund" appeal, and through the United Jewish Appeal and other relief fund programs within the Jewish faith organizations.

Commenting on the surplus distribution by the American relief agencies, religious relief agency leaders pointed to its significance in view of pending legislation in the Congress looking toward a vastly increased program of disposal abroad of the nation's huge stocks of over-abundant commodities.

Moses A. Leavitt, executive vice-chairman of the American Jewish Joint Distribution Committee and chairman of the American Council of Voluntary Agencies, said: "The successful pattern for free distribution of our surpluses, set by this experience, the careful carrying out of our programs in such manner as to preclude unfavorable effect on the economies of the recipient peoples, and the response of the American people, particularly through their religious institu-

tions, to further this achievement of true compassion and brotherhood are guide-posts clearly marking the way for the greatly enhanced free distribution of our surpluses now being contemplated by the Congress."

Monsignor Edward E. Swanson, executive director of War Relief Services, National Catholic Welfare Conference, and vice-chairman of the A.C.V.A., said:

"The Catholic Church everywhere rejoices in the increased aid to the hungry and destitute of the world made possible through this use of our excess foods for free distribution in the areas of distress to those there without means to buy, without strength or opportunity to work and earn, victims of circumstance who must eventually perish unless they are ministered to by the more fortunate of the world."

"There can be little excuse for us, blessed by God with so much more of His produce than we can use, if we fail to share it with our starving and homeless brethren in every way possible—through our governmental as well as through our personal abilities."

Dr. Wynn C. Fairfield, executive director of Church World Service, interdenominational relief arm of major Protestant churches, and honorary chairman of A.C.V.A., said:

"This sharing of our over-abundance with those in need abroad, motivated by the religious ideals upon which our nation was founded, gives expression to the ever-present spirit of thanksgiving in the hearts of our people, their gratitude to their Creator for the great goodness He has shown them."

"It is highly gratifying that they have so pointedly chosen their religious agencies to implement so largely this sharing of their good fortune."

"While our main joy, as regards the surpluses, is that they greatly increase our opportunity to relieve the suffering of people, we also recognize the services those surpluses perform for world peace, identified as they are as the gifts of the American people—freely given, people to people, with no strings attached, and without cost or obligation to the governments of the nationals concerned."

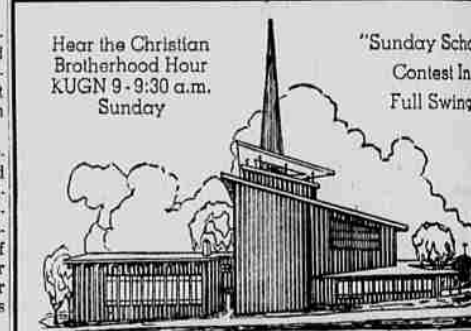

Each can is packed with emergency medical supplies.
