Lawn Party, Report From Convention, At Willagillespie

At the Willagillespie Baptist Church evening service the Rev. Glenn E. Camper, pastor, will give an address of review of the salient points of interest in the recent sessions of the American Baptist Convention, held in Minneapolis.

The convention, which Mr. Camper attended, was supported by a large attendance. Receipts for all purposes of the unified world mission activities of the Convention totalled \$7,502,325, exceeding by \$102,325 the goal adopted for the year 1953-54. Toward the denominational program of "Churches for New Frontiers" with a goal of \$8,000,000 by November, 1954, Baptists had already made contributions and commitments totaling \$5,506,753 by May.

Reports from the various foreign mission fields was "most heartening," the Rev. Mr. Camper will say. Dr. Charles Templeton, nationally known evangelist, preached in the closing session of the convention.

"Elijah" Sung in Mendelssohn Version

"Elijah," an oratorio by Felix Mendelssohn will be sung by the Northwest Christian College Chorus on Monday, June 7th, 8:00 p.m., at the First Christian Church.

The 100 voice choir is under the direction of Maud Skaggs Woodyard, with Elwin L. Myrick at the organ, and Robert Adams at the piano. Leroy Herisher will sing the lead part of Elijah.

The dramatic oratorio, "Elijah," is among Mendelssohn's most valued works. It holds the admiration of the public to this day and is scarcely second to Handel's "Messiah."

The concert is given as a part of the annual Northwest Christian College Commencement program. About one fourth of the students of N.C.C. are enrolled in the chorus. Each year an oratorio is sung during the closing week of school.

Visitors from throughout the Northwest will be present and the public is invited to attend.

White Muscle Disease Eyed

Scientists from three departments at Oregon State College are making a coordinated effort to discover the cause of white muscle disease.

A type of muscular dystrophy found in calves and lambs, white muscle attacks the limb muscles causing a stiffness that makes it hard for the animal to get around. The animal may become paralyzed, or if the heart muscle is affected, the animal dies.

DIET EFFECTS
Research at Cornell University had suggested a diet composed entirely of legumes might be responsible for the disease. O. H. Muth, experiment station veterinarian, and J. E. Oldfield, assistant animal husbandman, fed such a ration to test groups of cows and sheep last winter. To date, none of the calves or lambs from these test animals has developed the white muscle disease.

Scientists do think, however, that white muscle is a nutritional disease. To check this, Muth has been collecting samples of blood and muscle tissue from animals that have died of the disease. These will be analyzed in an attempt to determine how they differ from normal tissue and blood. It is hoped some difference will be found that will give a clue to the cause of white muscle.

VITAMIN E
Vitamin E has also been thought to be connected with the disease in some way.

Checking the vitamin E content of samples has turned out to be a tough problem for the analytical chemist. L. F. Remmert, chemist with the experiment station, has been working on this problem and is close to a solution. He will soon be ready to start analyzing the samples Muth has collected for vitamin E and other nutritional elements.

UO Professor Named 'Writer in Residence'

James B. Hall, assistant professor of English at the University of Oregon, has been named writer in residence for the Fine Arts summer session of the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill and the Women's College of North Carolina at Greensboro.

Hall will be consultant for new writers during the six weeks session and conduct a course in "The Creative Process." Hall's summer classes will be held on the coast at Beaufort, N. C.

His first novel, "Not by the Door" was published by Random House in April. Other works, including short stories, poetry, and criticism have appeared in national magazines and anthologies.

The pastor, Claude Miller, will serve as principal of the school. The following departments will be provided: beginners (four and five years), Mrs. Claude Miller, supt.; primaries (six and seven years), Mrs. R. S. Enyart, supt.; juniors (nine, 10, 11 & 12 years), Mrs. William Wellborn, supt.; intermediates (13, 14, 15 & 16 years), Mrs. Leonard Mullens, supt. In addition, there will be teachers and helpers.

The beginners will study "The Little Children's World." The primaries will study "Working Together in God's World." The juniors will study "Living for Jesus Every Day." The intermediates will study the Book of Mark and act as helpers with the younger children during their play periods and with handwork.

The books to be studied are those of the Southern Baptist Convention Series, 13 books, one for each year four through 16. The plan is for each church in the Southern Baptist Convention to use the same four books each year in rotation so that any child attending Vacation Bible School in a Southern Baptist Church anywhere in the United States will continue through the entire series without omitting or duplicating a book. For instance, there are two beginner textbooks for four and five year old pupils; thus by attending the two years he is in that department a beginner child will study both books.
