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Senate Okays Interior Funds

Joint Conference To Work Over Bill

WASHINGTON (AP)—The House and Senate Tuesday were \$63,263,007 apart on recommended appropriations to finance operations of the Department of the Interior in the year beginning July 1.

The Senate completed action on the bill Monday, approving on a voice vote expenditure of \$427,801,006 by the department—as compared with House-voted appropriations of \$364,337,989. The difference will be resolved by a conference between the two bodies, unless the House agrees to the Senate version.

NO CHANGES MADE

Largest single item in the bill is for project construction by the Bureau of Reclamation. For this the Senate allowed \$132,977,127 in new money as compared with the House's \$114,479,700.

In passing the bill, the Senate made no changes in recommendations made by its Appropriations Committee in reporting the bill last week.

Several possible amendments were discussed but were not pushed to a vote.

Sen. Humphrey (D-Minn.) took the floor to assail the \$27,880,099 proposed for the Park Service as being totally inadequate.

Declaring the Park Service is the "forgotten child" of the government, he told the Senate that roads and facilities of national recreation areas are rapidly deteriorating.

\$32 MILLION FOR BPA

"Congress is not as interested in Yellowstone Park as it is in building officers' clubs and golf courses," he said.

Major appropriation items in the bill for the various offices and bureaus of the Interior Department were:

Bonneville Power Administration \$32,900,000; Bureau of Land Management \$15,413,000; Bureau of Indian Affairs \$84,417,580; Bureau of Reclamation (all activities including construction) \$164,190,127; geological survey \$25,860,000; Bureau of Mines \$19,950,000; Fish and Wildlife Service \$11,667,000 and Office of Territories \$37,800,000.

Dredge Freed At Coos Bay

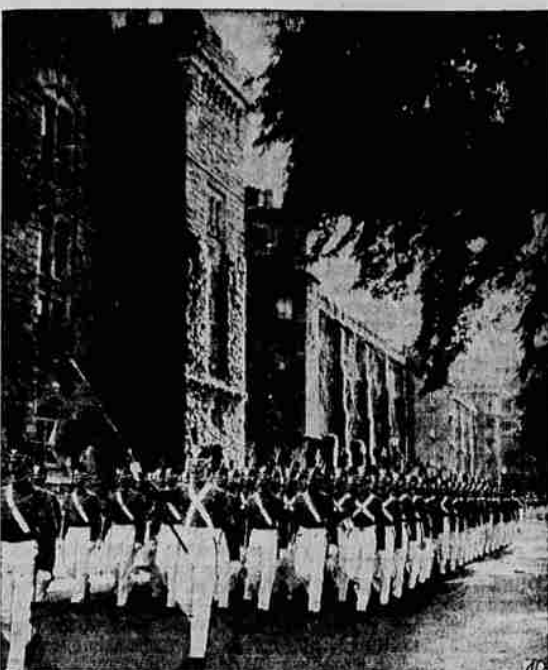
COOS BAY (AP)—The Army Engineers' dredge, Wm. G. Rossell, ran aground near the Coos Bay entrance Monday morning, but went back to work 7½ hours later.

The dredge was freed after pumping out its load of mud. The dredge, which had been clearing the channel here, was outbound to dump the mud at sea when it ran aground.

No major damage was apparent, but a diver will inspect underneath next weekend. Crew members said they thought there might be some slight vibration in the port propeller.

Stevens Speaks To Army Cadets

WEST POINT, N. Y. (AP)—Secretary of the Army Robert T. Stevens said Tuesday he has a "rough" time but has never considered turning back from his job.

Without mentioning directly his dispute with Sen. McCarthy (R-Wis.), he made unmistakable allusions to it in an address prepared for commencement exercises at the U. S. Military Academy.

HASN'T REGRETTED IT

He said he has served the Army three times, twice as an officer in the two world wars, now as secretary of the Army. Then he commented:

"This task to which the President called me has not been an easy one."

"The going has been pretty rough some times, so rough that it taxes one's endurance, but I have not for a moment regretted that I undertook it, nor once considered turning back."

Still without backgrounding his comments, Stevens told the cadets he would do everything in his power to make certain that "every one of you is respected and honored during his service," then added:

'BEAR NO SCARS'

"Your rights as individuals come first with me, and you shall bear no scars from unwarranted attack or abuse suffered during my tenure of office."

The trigger for the bitter public quarrel between McCarthy and Pentagon officials was an Army accusation that Brig. Gen. Ralph W. Zwicker had been abused during an appearance as a witness in McCarthy's investigation of alleged subversion in the service.

He also made an oblique reference to his testimony before the Senate subcommittee investigating the dispute where for two

House Commences Hearings On Workers Compensation

WASHINGTON (AP)—Undersecretary of Labor Arthur Larson said Tuesday the country is in "serious danger" of dividing workers into first and second class employees, one insured against income loss when unemployed and the other dependent on charity or relatives.

Larson was the opening witness as the House Ways and Means Committee started hearings on President Eisenhower's proposals to bring another six million workers under the unemployment compensation system.

The group proposed for inclusion include federal workers and employees of smaller employers. At present employers of less than eight workers are exempt from coverage. The proposal is to include all employers, even if they have only one employee.

The House hearings got under way on the heels of a fresh government report showing a modest, though less than expected, improvement in the over-all employment picture.

A Commerce-Labor Department report, issued late Monday, said employment increased by half a million between April and May. The new total was 61,119,000. Unemployment declined

by 160,000 to 3,305,000, a high for May since World War II.

The Ways and Means Committee expected to devote four days to hearing Eisenhower's proposals to extend unemployment compensation coverage to about 2,150,000 federal workers, 3,500,000 employees of smaller operators, and 200,800 agricultural processing workers.

H-Victims to Be Paid

TOKYO (AP)—The Japanese government soon will pay about \$58,000 — and bill the United States — as the first installment on claims by Japanese fishermen affected by the recent H-bomb tests at Bikini, Kyodo News Agency reported Monday.

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
