Church of the Holy Sepulcher

On July 7, architectural and religious experts are supposed to begin a joint, but probably mutually suspicious, survey of the Church of the Holy Sepulcher in Jerusalem. The idea is to determine if and how this holiest structure of Christendom can be preserved. The shrine, dating back to the 12th Century Crusaders, provides a focal point for Christ's crucifixion and burial. It has been falling apart through the years.

Three Christian bodies—Greek Orthodox, Armenian and Roman Catholic—jointly control the church, but the Copts, Abyssinians and Syrians share in mutually-jealous guardianship of the tiny, crumbling and scaffold-braced sections of the basilica.

The prestige of such guardianship, and the fees collected from visitors, intensify the ecclesiastical rivalries which have marred all altruistic religious thoughts since time began.

Title to the church was vested in the Ottoman Empire for centuries. Early in the 1700's, decrees of the Turkish Sultan awarded custodial rights to the varied sects,

which were retained by the Treaty of Paris in 1855. The government of Jordan has legalistic authority to force the restoration issue, and this may become necessary as it has been almost 20 years since any major repairs have been made by joint agreement.

There are probably a few people from the Willamette Valley who have visited this historic shrine. They must have first hand knowledge of the conditions to be found today. There are other millions the world over who have a spiritual interest in it and must deplore that it is literally falling apart while jurisdictional rivalries year after year have prevented either its restoration in present form or its replacement with a larger and finer edifice.

If the official surveyors, the religious groups involved and the Jordan government reach some agreement following the July 7 formal inspection, the spirit of conciliation thus symbolized will be just as commendable as the material improvements they may initiate.

Baptists to Give Music Service

The subject of the pastor's sermon for Sunday morning will be "Father and Son," in honor of Father's Day. In the evening Mrs. Robert Wilkin and her father, Mr. Leonard Plessy, who is visiting here from Iowa, will sing gospel duets. The evening expository sermon topic will be "Christian Maturity" from the fourth chapter of the Epistle to the Ephesians.

Commencement Set

The commencement program for the Vacation Bible School now in progress at First Southern Baptist Church will be held Friday, June 25 at 7 p.m. A demonstration will be given by each department showing the type of work done during the school. Handwork done by the boys and girls will be on exhibit. Pupils will receive their diplomas and recognition will be given those who have attended each day's session of the school.

Five Graduates Gain Foreign Appointments

A graduate of Northwest Christian College and the University of Oregon was appointed a Disciple of Christ missionary in a service held in Indianapolis, June 15. At the same time, four from Eugene were accepted as candidates for foreign service by the United Christian Missionary Society, a national board of the Disciples.

The new missionary is Robert F. Gipe, of Great Falls, Mont. He will go to a foreign field yet to be assigned, early in the fall, to engage in mission construction work. He is one of 18 young people who received appointments for foreign service. They will be among 236 Disciples of Christ missionaries serving in 11 foreign countries.

The newly-accepted candidates are Ralph Adams, Miss Jane Meyer, Danny Spencer and Naomi Wright. Adams is a student in the University of Oregon Medical School. Miss Meyer is an employee of the Weyerhaeuser Timber Co. in Springfield. Spencer and Miss Wright are students at Northwest Christian College.

The candidates are among 110 young people preparing for mission work abroad under the United Christian Missionary Society.

Former Hindu Guest Speaker

N. Paul V. Gupta, a converted high cast Hindu, will be the guest speaker at the River Road Baptist Chapel, Sunday at 11 a.m.

This is the annual Father's Day service at the Chapel. Several men will share in the service and all fathers will be given special recognition.

Mr. Gupta, the featured speaker, was converted from Hinduism in 1936 and labored for 21 years as an Evangelist and pastor in India.
