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THE CAMERA CORNER

We've often stressed the importance of filters in black-and-white photography, usually for scenic shots where the main purpose of the filter is to darken the sky and make white clouds stand out. Filters can serve many other purposes, and we'd like to discuss the most important ones in the next few columns.

The light green filter is one not often enough used. It can be used only with panchromatic film, and its exposure factor is about four. This means you must open your lens two stops or decrease shutter speed to one-fourth to increase exposure when using a green filter.

Green filters will light objects that are green, and cause red or blue objects to appear darker in the final print. For this reason the green filter is perfect in landscape photography where green shrubbery and trees predominate and red colors are not important. This filter gives a brighter cast to trees, grass, shrubs, etc., increasing detail. By darkening the blue sky, it also makes white clouds stand out.

The green filter is also supreme for outdoor portraiture. It darkens all the reds in flesh tones and gives the subject a healthy suntan coloring. It's good for outdoor "glamour" shots and pictures of people in general outdoors.

Film Actress Due in Court

Policeman Says
She Kicked Him

SANTA MONICA, Calif.—Marie McDonald's wealthy husband was charged with felonious assault Tuesday after two news photographers charged he tried to run them down as he was driving the actress home from the police station in nearby Beverly Hills.

BEVERLY HILLS, Calif.—Actress Marie McDonald was ordered into court Tuesday after a stormy session with police officers, who said her car struck four other autos.

Miss McDonald was booked Monday under three sections of the vehicle code: driving while under the influence of narcotics, hit-run driving and having no operator's license.

Police said the shapely movie player screamed, tried to bite two officers who took her to a cell and then removed a shoe and shattered a light fixture. Lt. John Hankins said she kicked him in the groin when he tried to remove her to another cell.

Miss McDonald said she had taken two nembutal and four second capsules, the police report showed. Her physician confirmed her statement that he had given her a prescription for the sedatives.

Police reported her car struck three parked cars and then hit a fourth auto which had been halted for a traffic light.

She was released without bond when her husband, wealthy shoe manufacturer Harry Karl, and his attorney came to the police station. A news reel cameraman and a press photographer complained to police that Karl tried to run them down when he and his party left the station.

Miss McDonald and her husband separated recently and then became reconciled.

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Annexation Vote

setting the election in the city and the Bethel area.

At the same time, the ordinance set four polling places in the city and two in the proposed annexation district.

POLLING PLACES

Voting in the city will take place at the Very Little Theater in Ward 1, Grace Lutheran Church, Ward 2, Eugene Vocational School in Ward 3 and the Eugene High School in Ward 4.

Voting in the other area will be at the Iverson Paint Store, 2780 W. 11th Ave., and the Wilma Tweedle residence, 3791 Elmira Rd.

Booth, in his capacity of mayor of Eugene, told the council that the annexation move is the "only method of action" to halt the incorporation which would be "harmful to the community."

He emphasized that the city council took every step possible to bring all of the Bethel Water District into Eugene, short of calling an election. This, he declared, is the only alternative since all negotiations have failed.

CAUCUS MEETING

Ray Siegenthaler, one of the principal backers of the city move to stop the incorporation of the proposed Bethel City, commented that "They had a caucus meeting ahead of ours (Monday night) and decided not to negotiate before we sat down. I feel last night's meeting was a blow to the whole area."

At a meeting Tuesday morning, the three Lane County commissioners heard arguments from both the city and Bethel residents.

Sam Hughes, representing the Gustina Lumber Co., presented petitions with the names of 42 owners of industrial land in the Bethel Water District. They asked to be excluded from the proposed Bethel City boundaries, and stated that if they were to be in any city, would prefer Eugene to the other.

PETITIONS CIRCULATING

The petitions circulating among the residents of the water district, calling for annexation to Eugene, were revealed at the Monday night session in the fire hall, however.

A. E. Chally, 771 Taney St., told the group he and 11 others in the area had started circulating petitions last Friday for annexation to Eugene. Since then, he said, some 200-250 names had been obtained in this district and Fairfield Village—the large housing project just west of Highway 99 in the Bethel area.

These petitions, plus others in the W. 11th Ave. area, are the basis for the council's boundary decision for the annexation plan. Harry Ray, superintendent of the water district and chairman of the Bethel committee, said he

feels he is delegated by the people to insist on an election for incorporation.

REFUSES TO BUDGE

Milton Buehler, one of the committee members, steadfastly refused to budge from this stand on the incorporation issue. "I insist they (the residents) have a chance to vote," he added. Buehler said he will "fight to the last" to keep the incorporation plan.

A. C. Berntzen, another committeeman, argued with Ray and Buehler. He told them he thinks the committee should take the entire issue back to the people and ask them what should be done in the light of new developments. He was again voted down.

Berntzen said he believes the incorporation will fail if the county commissioners change the boundaries from the present water district. He said every dollar of valuation must be kept to make a successful venture in the community's plan to solve drainage problems.

BOUNDARY CHANGES

But the county commissioners indicated Tuesday morning that boundaries will be changed if the annexation election fails. Commissioner Robert Maclay told city and Bethel officials he doubts that all of the present water district can be benefitted from a new city. He also noted petitions from residents west of Echo Hollow Dr. requesting they be omitted from Bethel City.

Maclay, Ralph Peterson and Commissioner Kenneth Nielsen then agreed to delay further consideration until after the annexation election next month. Nothing can be done, they said, until it is determined whether or not the heart of the Bethel district will become part of Eugene.

The area involved in the city's plan covers several hundred acres. It includes about half of the water district, and most of the estimated 5,000 population.

Norwegians Reject U. S. Search Request

OSLO, Norway (AP)—The Norwegian government announced Tuesday it has refused the United States' request for authority to stop Norwegian vessels on the high seas and search them for possible arms bound for Guatemala.

The government also stated that Norway itself "has no authority to prevent Norwegian ships from carrying arms to foreign countries in peace time."

It promised, however, to "support every effort aimed at ending the hostilities in Guatemala."

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Doctor Claims Case Is 'Medical Miracle'

PASADENA, Calif. (AP)—A doctor says it is a "medical miracle" that after 6½ years of unconsciousness Mrs. Ada Wrigley, widow of William Wrigley Jr., of baseball and chewing gum fame, is still alive.

Mrs. Wrigley, who keeps her age a secret but is believed to be 83 or 84, suffered a stroke at her mansion here Dec. 23, 1947. She has been in a coma since and is almost completely paralyzed.

Van Fleet Flies To Rhee's Home

SEOUL (AP)—Gen. James A. Van Fleet, special Far East military envoy for President Eisenhower, flew to Chinhae Tuesday to confer with President Syngman Rhee at his summer home.

There was speculation that Van Fleet's meeting with Rhee might be connected with the reported delivery to Rhee Monday of a letter from President Eisenhower.

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
